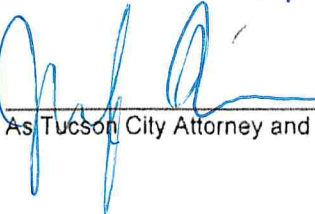

Price Change Process

Thatcher Company of Arizona, Inc. (herein referred to as “Thatcher”) has responded to all the products listed in the RFP except for liquid oxygen. The array of RFP products is a combination of chemicals Thatcher manufactures and chemicals purchased from other direct manufacturers. A 3rd party indicator does not exist that will appropriately monitor cost increases or decreases in the general chemical market without providing risk to Thatcher or City of Tucson/OMNIA. This applies to individual chemicals as well.

Our goal at Thatcher is to partner with organizations who desire the success of both entities. When our costs decrease, we want to extend the savings to our customers. When our costs increase, we do not want to risk providing chemicals at a financial loss. To accomplish this goal, we propose the following:

- Prices quoted for this RFP are firm for the first 6 months of the contract.
- After each 6-month period:
 - Prices will decrease, increase, or remain unchanged based upon the actual cost change. Most of the chemicals in the RFP typically experience minor fluctuations in price.
 - Documentation will be provided for price changes where it exists (supplier letters etc.)
 - Prices will be reviewed each 6 months throughout the duration of the contract extensions (if exercised).

We look forward to a mutually beneficial relationship with the City of Tucson and OMNIA. The process outlined will ensure Thatcher can pass along actual price savings to the contract entities and protect Thatcher from unprofitable transactions.

Thatcher looks forward to further discussion to answer your questions and develop a mutually beneficial price change process.

FEDERAL CERTIFICATIONS
ADDENDUM FOR AGREEMENT FUNDED BY U.S. FEDERAL GRANT

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Participating Agencies may elect to use federal funds to purchase under the Master Agreement. This form should be completed and returned.

DEFINITIONS

Contract means a legal instrument by which a non-Federal entity purchases property or services needed to carry out the project or program under a Federal award. The term as used in this part does not include a legal instrument, even if the non-Federal entity considers it a contract, when the substance of the transaction meets the definition of a Federal award or subaward

Contractor means an entity that receives a contract as defined in Contract.

Cooperative agreement means a legal instrument of financial assistance between a Federal awarding agency or pass-through entity and a non-Federal entity that, consistent with 31 U.S.C. 6302-6305:

- (a) Is used to enter into a relationship the principal purpose of which is to transfer anything of value from the Federal awarding agency or pass-through entity to the non-Federal entity to carry out a public purpose authorized by a law of the United States (see 31 U.S.C. 6101(3)); and not to acquire property or services for the Federal government or pass-through entity's direct benefit or use;
- (b) Is distinguished from a grant in that it provides for substantial involvement between the Federal awarding agency or pass-through entity and the non-Federal entity in carrying out the activity contemplated by the Federal award.
- (c) The term does not include:
 - (1) A cooperative research and development agreement as defined in 15 U.S.C. 3710a; or
 - (2) An agreement that provides only:
 - (i) Direct United States Government cash assistance to an individual;
 - (ii) A subsidy;
 - (iii) A loan;
 - (iv) A loan guarantee; or
 - (v) Insurance.

Federal awarding agency means the Federal agency that provides a Federal award directly to a non-Federal entity

Federal award has the meaning, depending on the context, in either paragraph (a) or (b) of this section:

- (a)(1) The Federal financial assistance that a non-Federal entity receives directly from a Federal awarding agency or indirectly from a pass-through entity, as described in § 200.101 Applicability; or
- (2) The cost-reimbursement contract under the Federal Acquisition Regulations that a non-Federal entity receives directly from a Federal awarding agency or indirectly from a pass-through entity, as described in § 200.101 Applicability.
- (b) The instrument setting forth the terms and conditions. The instrument is the grant agreement, cooperative agreement, other agreement for assistance covered in paragraph (b) of § 200.40 Federal financial assistance, or the cost-reimbursement contract awarded under the Federal Acquisition Regulations.
- (c) Federal award does not include other contracts that a Federal agency uses to buy goods or services from a contractor or a contract to operate Federal government owned, contractor operated facilities (GOCOs).
- (d) See also definitions of Federal financial assistance, grant agreement, and cooperative agreement.

Non-Federal entity means a state, local government, Indian tribe, institution of higher education (IHE), or nonprofit organization that carries out a Federal award as a recipient or subrecipient.

Nonprofit organization means any corporation, trust, association, cooperative, or other organization, not including IHEs, that:

- (a) Is operated primarily for scientific, educational, service, charitable, or similar purposes in the public interest;
- (b) Is not organized primarily for profit; and
- (c) Uses net proceeds to maintain, improve, or expand the operations of the organization.

Obligations means, when used in connection with a non-Federal entity's utilization of funds under a Federal award, orders placed for property and services, contracts and subawards made, and similar transactions during a given period that require payment by the non-Federal entity during the same or a future period.

Pass-through entity means a non-Federal entity that provides a subaward to a subrecipient to carry out part of a Federal program.

Recipient means a non-Federal entity that receives a Federal award directly from a Federal awarding agency to carry out an activity under a Federal program. The term recipient does not include subrecipients.

Simplified acquisition threshold means the dollar amount below which a non-Federal entity may purchase property or services using small purchase methods. Non-Federal entities adopt small purchase procedures in order to expedite the purchase of items costing less than the simplified acquisition threshold. The simplified acquisition threshold is set by the Federal Acquisition Regulation at 48 CFR Subpart 2.1 (Definitions) and in accordance with 41 U.S.C. 1908. As of the publication of this part, the simplified acquisition threshold is \$250,000, but this threshold is periodically adjusted for inflation. (Also see definition of § 200.67 Micro-purchase.)

Subaward means an award provided by a pass-through entity to a subrecipient for the subrecipient to carry out part of a Federal award received by the pass-through entity. It does not include payments to a contractor or payments to an individual that is a beneficiary of a Federal program. A subaward may be provided through any form of legal agreement, including an agreement that the pass-through entity considers a contract.

Subrecipient means a non-Federal entity that receives a subaward from a pass-through entity to carry out part of a Federal program; but does not include an individual that is a beneficiary of such program. A subrecipient may also be a recipient of other Federal awards directly from a Federal awarding agency.

Termination means the ending of a Federal award, in whole or in part at any time prior to the planned end of period of performance.

The following certifications and provisions may be required and apply when Participating Agency expends federal funds for any purchase resulting from this procurement process. Pursuant to 2 C.F.R. § 200.326, all contracts, including small purchases, awarded by the Participating Agency and the Participating Agency's subcontractors shall contain the procurement provisions of Appendix II to Part 200, as applicable.

Conflicts of Interest

No employee, officer, or agent may participate in the selection, award, or administration of a contract supported by a FEMA award if he or she has a real or apparent conflict of interest. Such a conflict would arise when the employee, officer, or agent, any member of his or her immediate family, his or her partner, or an organization which employs or is about to employ any of these parties, has a financial or other interest in or a tangible personal benefit from a firm considered for award. 2 C.F.R. § 200.318(c)(1); See also Standard Form 424D, ¶ 7; Standard Form 424B, ¶ 3. i. FEMA considers a "financial interest" to be the potential for gain or loss to the employee, officer, or agent, any member of his or her immediate family, his or her partner, or an organization which employs or is about to employ any of these parties as a result of the particular procurement. The prohibited financial interest may arise from ownership of certain financial instruments or investments such as stock, bonds, or real estate, or from a salary, indebtedness, job offer, or similar interest that might be affected by the particular procurement. ii. FEMA considers an "apparent" conflict of interest to exist where an actual conflict does not exist, but where a reasonable person with knowledge of the relevant facts would question the impartiality of the employee, officer, or agent participating in the procurement. c. Gifts. The officers,

1. Termination for Convenience:

The right to terminate this Contract for the convenience of the Participating Public Agency is retained by the Participating Public Agency. In the event of a termination for convenience by the Participating Public Agency, the Participating Public Agency shall, at least ten (10) calendar days in advance, deliver written notice of the termination for convenience to Contractor. Upon Contractor's receipt of such written notice, Contractor immediately shall cease the performance of the Work and shall take reasonable and appropriate action to secure and protect the Work then in place. Contractor shall then be paid by the Participating Public Agency, in accordance with the terms and provisions of the Contract Documents, an amount not to exceed the actual labor costs incurred, the actual cost of all materials installed and the actual cost of all materials stored at the project site or away from the project site, as approved in writing by the Participating Public Agency but not yet paid for and which cannot be returned, and actual, reasonable and documented demobilization costs, if any,

paid by Contractor and approved by the Participating Public Agency in connection with the Scope of Work in place which is completed as of the date of termination by the Participating Public Agency and that is in conformance with the Contract Documents, less all amounts previously paid for the Work. No amount ever shall be owed or paid to Contractor for lost or anticipated profits on any part of the Scope of Work not performed or for consequential damages of any kind.

2. Equal Employment Opportunity:

The Participating Public Agency highly encourages Contractors to implement Affirmative Action practices in their employment programs. This means Contractor should not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, pregnancy, sexual orientation, political belief or affiliation, age, disability or genetic information.

During the performance of this contract, the contractor agrees as follows:

(1) The contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin. The contractor will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment, without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following: Employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided by the contracting officer setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.

(2) The contractor will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the contractor, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin.

(3) The contractor will not discharge or in any other manner discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because such employee or applicant has inquired about, discussed, or disclosed the compensation of the employee or applicant or another employee or applicant. This provision shall not apply to instances in which an employee who has access to the compensation information of other employees or applicants as a part of such employee's essential job functions discloses the compensation of such other employees or applicants to individuals who do not otherwise have access to such information, unless such disclosure is in response to a formal complaint or charge, in furtherance of an investigation, proceeding, hearing, or action, including an investigation conducted by the employer, or is consistent with the contractor's legal duty to furnish information.

(4) The contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which it has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding, a notice to be provided by the agency contracting officer, advising the labor union or workers' representative of the contractor's commitments under section 202 of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.

(5) The contractor will comply with all provisions of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.

(6) The contractor will furnish all information and reports required by Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and by the rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to his books, records, and accounts by the contracting agency and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations, and orders.

(7) In the event of the contractor's non-compliance with the nondiscrimination clauses of this contract or with any of such rules, regulations, or orders, this contract may be canceled, terminated or suspended in whole or in part and the contractor may be declared ineligible for further Government contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and such other sanctions may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, or by rule, regulation, or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.

(8) The contractor will include the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (8) in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to section 204 of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor. The contractor will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as may be directed by the Secretary of Labor as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance: *Provided*, however, that in the event the contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such

direction, the contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.

3. "During the performance of this contract, the contractor agrees as follows:

- (1) The contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. The contractor will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following: Employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.
- (2) The contractor will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the contractor, state that all qualified applicants will receive considerations for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, or national origin.
- (3) The contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which he has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding, a notice to be provided advising the said labor union or workers' representatives of the contractor's commitments under this section, and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.
- (4) The contractor will comply with all provisions of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.
- (5) The contractor will furnish all information and reports required by Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and by rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to his books, records, and accounts by the administering agency and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations, and orders.
- (6) In the event of the contractor's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination clauses of this contract or with any of the said rules, regulations, or orders, this contract may be canceled, terminated, or suspended in whole or in part and the contractor may be declared ineligible for further Government contracts or federally assisted construction contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and such other sanctions as may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, or by rule, regulation, or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.
- (7) The contractor will include the portion of the sentence immediately preceding paragraph (1) and the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (7) in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to section 204 of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor. The contractor will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as the administering agency may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions, including sanctions for noncompliance: Provided, however, That in the event a contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction by the administering agency the contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States."

4. Davis Bacon Act and Copeland Anti-Kickback Act.

- a. Applicability of Davis-Bacon Act. The Davis-Bacon Act only applies to the emergency Management Preparedness Grant Program, Homeland Security Grant Program, Nonprofit Security Grant Program,

Tribal Homeland Security Grant Program, Port Security Grant Program, and Transit Security Grant Program. It does not apply to other FEMA grant and cooperative agreement programs, including the Public Assistance Program.

- b. All prime construction contracts in excess of \$2,000 awarded by non-Federal entities must include a provision for compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. §§ 3141-3144 and 3146-3148) as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations at 29 C.F.R. Part 5 (Labor Standards Provisions Applicable to Contracts Covering Federally Financed and Assisted Construction)). See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II, ¶ D.
- c. In accordance with the statute, contractors must be required to pay wages to laborers and mechanics at a rate not less than the prevailing wages specified in a wage determination made by the Secretary of Labor. In addition, contractors must be required to pay wages not less than once a week.
- d. The non-Federal entity must place a copy of the current prevailing wage determination issued by the Department of Labor in each solicitation. The decision to award a contract or subcontract must be conditioned upon the acceptance of the wage determination. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the Federal awarding agency.
- e. In contracts subject to the Davis-Bacon Act, the contracts must also include a provision for compliance with the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act (40 U.S.C. § 3145), as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations at 29 C.F.R. Part 3 (Contractors and Subcontractors on Public Building or Public Work Financed in Whole or in Part by Loans or Grants from the United States). The Copeland Anti- Kickback Act provides that each contractor or subrecipient must be prohibited from inducing, by any means, any person employed in the construction, completion, or repair of public work, to give up any part of the compensation to which he or she is otherwise entitled. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to FEMA.
- f. The regulation at 29 C.F.R. § 5.5(a) does provide the required contract clause that applies to compliance with both the Davis-Bacon and Copeland Acts. However, as discussed in the previous subsection, the Davis-Bacon Act does not apply to Public Assistance recipients and subrecipients. In situations where the Davis-Bacon Act does not apply, neither does the Copeland "Anti-Kickback Act." However, for purposes of grant programs where both clauses do apply, FEMA requires the following contract clause:

"Compliance with the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act.

- (1) Contractor. The contractor shall comply with 18 U.S.C. § 874, 40U.S.C. § 3145, and the requirements of 29 C.F.R. pt. 3 as may be applicable, which are incorporated by reference into this contract.
- (2) Subcontracts. The contractor or subcontractor shall insert in any subcontracts the clause above and such other clauses as the FEMA may by appropriate instructions require, and also a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime contractor shall be responsible for the compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with all of these contract clauses
- (3) Breach. A breach of the contract clauses above may be grounds for termination of the contract, and for debarment as a contractor and subcontractor as provided in 29 C.F.R. § 5.12."

5. Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act.

- a. Applicability: This requirement applies to all FEMA grant and cooperative agreement programs.
- b. Where applicable (see 40 U.S.C. § 3701), all contracts awarded by the non-Federal entity in excess of \$100,000 that involve the employment of mechanics or laborers must include a provision for compliance with 40 U.S.C. §§ 3702 and 3704, as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations at 29 C.F.R. Part 5. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II, ¶ E.

- c. Under 40 U.S.C. § 3702, each contractor must be required to compute the wages of every mechanic and laborer on the basis of a standard work week of 40 hours. Work in excess of the standard work week is permissible provided that the worker is compensated at a rate of not less than one and a half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of 40 hours in the work week.
- d. The requirements of 40 U.S.C. § 3704 are applicable to construction work and provide that no laborer or mechanic must be required to work in surroundings or under working conditions which are unsanitary, hazardous or dangerous. These requirements do not apply to the purchases of supplies or materials or articles ordinarily available on the open market, or contracts for transportation or transmission of intelligence.
- e. The regulation at 29 C.F.R. § 5.5(b) provides the required contract clause concerning compliance with the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act:

"Compliance with the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act.

- (1) Overtime requirements. No contractor or subcontractor contracting for any part of the contract work which may require or involve the employment of laborers or mechanics shall require or permit any such laborer or mechanic in any workweek in which he or she is employed on such work to work in excess of forty hours in such workweek unless such laborer or mechanic receives compensation at a rate not less than one and one-half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of forty hours in such workweek.
- (2) Violation; liability for unpaid wages; liquidated damages. In the event of any violation of the clause set forth in paragraph (1) of this section the contractor and any subcontractor responsible therefor shall be liable for the unpaid wages. In addition, such contractor and subcontractor shall be liable to the United States (in the case of work done under contract for the District of Columbia or a territory, to such District or to such territory), for liquidated damages. Such liquidated damages shall be computed with respect to each individual laborer or mechanic, including watchmen and guards, employed in violation of the clause set forth in paragraph (1) of this section, in the sum of \$10 for each calendar day on which such individual was required or permitted to work in excess of the standard workweek of forty hours without payment of the overtime wages required by the clause set forth in paragraph (1) of this section.
- (3) Withholding for unpaid wages and liquidated damages. The (write in the name of the Federal agency or the loan or grant recipient) shall upon its own action or upon written request of an authorized representative of the Department of Labor withhold or cause to be withheld, from any moneys payable on account of work performed by the contractor or subcontractor under any such contract or any other Federal contract with the same prime contractor, or any other federally-assisted contract subject to the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act, which is held by the same prime contractor, such sums as may be determined to be necessary to satisfy any liabilities of such contractor or subcontractor for unpaid wages and liquidated damages as provided in the clause set forth in paragraph (2) of this section.
- (4) Subcontracts. The contractor or subcontractor shall insert in any subcontracts the clauses set forth in paragraph (1) through (4) of this section and also a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime contractor shall be responsible for compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with the clauses set forth in paragraphs (1) through (4) of this section."

6. Rights to Inventions Made Under a Contract or Agreement.

- a. Stafford Act Disaster Grants. This requirement **does not apply to the Public Assistance**, Hazard Mitigation Grant Program, Fire Management Assistance Grant Program, Crisis Counseling Assistance and Training Grant Program, Disaster Case Management Grant Program, and Federal Assistance to Individuals and Households – Other Needs Assistance Grant Program, as

FEMA awards under these programs do not meet the definition of "funding agreement."

- b. If the FEMA award meets the definition of "funding agreement" under 37 C.F.R. § 401.2(a) and the non-Federal entity wishes to enter into a contract with a small business firm or nonprofit organization regarding the substitution of parties, assignment or performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under that "funding agreement," the non-Federal entity must comply with the requirements of 37 C.F.R. Part 401 (Rights to Inventions Made by Nonprofit Organizations and Small Business Firms Under Government Grants, Contracts and Cooperative Agreements), and any implementing regulations issued by FEMA. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II, ¶ F.
 - c. The regulation at 37 C.F.R. § 401.2(a) currently defines "funding agreement" as any contract, grant, or cooperative agreement entered into between any Federal agency, other than the Tennessee Valley Authority, and any contractor for the performance of experimental, developmental, or research work funded in whole or in part by the Federal government. This term also includes any assignment, substitution of parties, or subcontract of any type entered into for the performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under a funding agreement as defined in the first sentence of this paragraph.
7. Clean Air Act and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act. Contracts of amounts in excess of \$150,000 must contain a provision that requires the contractor to agree to comply with all applicable standards, orders, or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. §§ 7401-7671q) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33 U.S.C. §§ 1251-1387). Violations must be reported to FEMA and the Regional Office of the Environmental Protection Agency. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II, ¶ G.
- a. The following provides a sample contract clause concerning compliance for contracts of amounts in excess of \$150,000:
 - "Clean Air Act
 - (1) The contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 7401 et seq.
 - (2) The contractor agrees to report each violation to the (name of the state agency or local or Indian tribal government) and understands and agrees that the (name of the state agency or local or Indian tribal government) will, in turn, report each violation as required to assure notification to the (name of recipient), Federal Emergency Management Agency, and the appropriate Environmental Protection Agency Regional Office.
 - (3) The contractor agrees to include these requirements in each subcontract exceeding \$150,000 financed in whole or in part with Federal assistance provided by FEMA.
 - Federal Water Pollution Control Act
 - (1) The contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended, 33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.
 - (2) The contractor agrees to report each violation to the (name of the state agency or local or Indian tribal government) and understands and agrees that the (name of the state agency or local or Indian tribal government) will, in turn, report each violation as required to assure notification to the (name of recipient), Federal Emergency Management Agency, and the appropriate Environmental Protection Agency Regional Office.
 - (3) The contractor agrees to include these requirements in each subcontract exceeding \$150,000 financed in whole or in part with Federal assistance provided by FEMA."
8. Debarment and Suspension.
- a. Applicability: This requirement applies to all FEMA grant and cooperative agreement programs.

- b. Non-federal entities and contractors are subject to the debarment and suspension regulations implementing Executive Order 12549, *Debarment and Suspension* (1986) and Executive Order 12689, *Debarment and Suspension* (1989) at 2 C.F.R. Part 180 and the Department of Homeland Security's regulations at 2 C.F.R. Part 3000 (Non procurement Debarment and Suspension).
- c. These regulations restrict awards, subawards, and contracts with certain parties that are debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded from or ineligible for participation in Federal assistance programs and activities. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II, ¶ H; and *Procurement Guidance for Recipients and Subrecipients Under 2 C.F.R. Part 200 (Uniform Rules): Supplement to the Public Assistance Procurement Disaster Assistance Team (PDAT) Field Manual Chapter IV, ¶ 6.d, and Appendix C, ¶ 2 [hereinafter PDAT Supplement]*. A contract award must not be made to parties listed in the SAM Exclusions. SAM Exclusions is the list maintained by the General Services Administration that contains the names of parties debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded by agencies, as well as parties declared ineligible under statutory or regulatory authority other than Executive Order 12549. SAM exclusions can be accessed at www.sam.gov. See 2 C.F.R. § 180.530; *PDAT Supplement*, Chapter IV, ¶ 6.d and Appendix C, ¶ 2.
- d. In general, an "excluded" party cannot receive a Federal grant award or a contract within the meaning of a "covered transaction," to include subawards and subcontracts. This includes parties that receive Federal funding indirectly, such as contractors to recipients and subrecipients. The key to the exclusion is whether there is a "covered transaction," which is any non-procurement transaction (unless excepted) at either a "primary" or "secondary" tier. Although "covered transactions" do not include contracts awarded by the Federal Government for purposes of the non-procurement common rule and DHS's implementing regulations, it does include some contracts awarded by recipients and subrecipient.
- e. Specifically, a covered transaction includes the following contracts for goods or services:
- (1) The contract is awarded by a recipient or subrecipient in the amount of at least \$25,000.
 - (2) The contract requires the approval of FEMA, regardless of amount.
 - (3) The contract is for federally required audit services.

The City of Tucson is requesting proposals from qualified and experienced firms to provide **WATER TREATMENT CHEMICALS (POLYMERS AND MISC.)**.

Requirements and qualifications are defined in detail in the Scope of Services Section of this Request for Proposal (RFP). The City seeks a firm that can supply the specified supplies and materials.

National Contract

The City of Tucson, as the Principal Procurement Agency, defined in Attachment A, has partnered with OMNIA Partners to make the resultant contract (also known as the "Master Agreement" in materials distributed by OMNIA Partners) from this solicitation available to other public agencies nationally, including state and local governmental entities, public and private primary, secondary and higher education entities, non-profit entities, and agencies for the public benefit ("Public Agencies"), through OMNIA Partners' cooperative purchasing program. The City of Tucson is acting as the contracting agency for any other Public Agency that elects to utilize the resulting Master Agreement. Use of the Master Agreement by any Public Agency is preceded by their registration with OMNIA Partners (a "Participating Public Agency"). Attachment A contains additional information about OMNIA Partners and the cooperative purchasing agreement.

OMNIA Partners is the largest and most experienced purchasing organization for public and private sector procurement. This projection is based on the current annual volumes among the City of Tucson, other Participating Public Agencies anticipated to utilize the resulting Master Agreement to be made available to them through OMNIA Partners, and volume growth into other Public Agencies through a coordinated marketing approach between the Contractor and OMNIA Partners.

SCOPE OF WORK

1. WATER TREATMENT CHEMICALS

A. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

These requirements are broad for the City and Participating Public Agencies utilizing the Master Agreement outside of the City.

Contractor(s) warrant that chemicals provided as a result of this RFP:

- i. Conform to the most current NSF 60/61 and/or ANSI/AWWA standards for water and/or wastewater chemicals;
- ii. Conform to the general chemical specifications contained herein;
- iii. Are suitable for wastewater treatment;
- iv. Are free from adulterants or impurities of any kind; and
- v. The specific warranties of Merchantability and Fitness for a Particular Purpose apply to all orders placed as a result of this solicitation.

If at any time, any chemical supplied by the Contractor(s) fails to conform to the specifications of the utilizing agency, then the Contractor shall at no additional cost to the City or Participating Public Agencies, promptly replace with item that meets specifications.

Contractor(s) understand and acknowledge that the City and other Participating Public Agencies provide services essential to the health and welfare of the public. Failure of a Contractor to provide contracted chemicals may jeopardize the City and Participating Public Agencies' ability to provide timely services, which may affect the health and welfare of the public served by the City and Participating Public Agencies. In the event of product shortages at any point from production to delivery, Contractor(s) agree and affirm that the City and Participating Public Agencies will be given the earliest possible notice and the highest priority for allocation of the chemicals listed herein. To the extent the Contractor(s) must prioritize and/or allocate delivery among its customers, the requirements of the City and Participating Public Agencies under this Master Agreement will be honored before chemicals are provided to a customer with no such obligations.

The Contractor(s) is/are responsible for ensuring that state and federal regulatory compliance is maintained for any chemical and related container furnished under the Master Agreement. Failure to maintain compliance as specified in this paragraph or elsewhere in this RFP shall constitute a breach of contract.

The City and Participating Public Agencies reserve the right to have chemical shipments tested by an independent laboratory. Failure of a shipment to comply with the City and Participating Public Agencies specifications will be sufficient reason for rejection of the shipment. Should a shipment be rejected, the Contractor(s) shall remove all non-conforming chemicals at its sole cost. Upon notice of rejection of a shipment, the Contractor(s) shall furnish another shipment immediately, which shall comply in all respects with the prescribed analysis. In the event a Contractor is unable to promptly furnish the chemical of the acceptable quality; the Participating Public Agencies will obtain the chemical elsewhere. Any reasonable additional cost incurred by the City or Participating Public Agencies will be charged to the Contractor either as a credit against an outstanding invoice or billed to the Contractor for immediate payment.

B. DELIVERY

- a. **DELIVERY TIME:** Chemicals are to be delivered on an as-needed basis to the City of Tucson within two days of order by the operations staff including weekends and holidays, unless otherwise agreed upon at time of order. Sodium hypochlorite solution deliveries are expected to be required twice each week, including weekends and holidays, with the possibility of being required three times per week during high-demand periods. Minimum order quantities will be:
 - i. minimum of 4,000 (four thousand) gallons of 20% sodium hydroxide
 - ii. minimum of 3,500 (three thousand five hundred) gallons of 12% sodium hypochlorite
 - iii. minimum of 2 (two) buckets (55-lb. buckets) of calcium hypochlorite tablets
- b. **DELIVERY INSTRUCTIONS:** The Contractor shall be responsible for unloading chemicals with the supervision of plant personnel (pre-inspection of unloading facility is highly recommended). The Contractor shall provide a weight ticket with each delivery, which shows the weight of the chemical on the truck delivering the bulk shipment and the number of gallons. The Contractor shall provide a delivery truck with the capability of unloading the chemical using the truck air supply. Do not assume an air supply will be provided. Unloading air pressure shall not exceed 20 psi. The driver shall wear all appropriate PPE during the entire unloading process and is required to stay with the vehicle during the entire unloading process. The Contractor shall insure all hoses used in unloading of chemicals are in good condition. Any unauthorized discharge of chemical during the unloading process shall be contained and disposed of by the Contractor in accordance with all safety guidelines.
- c. The City and each Participating Public Agencies will establish their own delivery schedule based upon its own requirements and the Contractor's specified time to deliver after receipt of an order. Failure to honor delivery schedules may result in damages to the City or the Participating Public Agency. The City or Participating Public Agency may at their own option and convenience cure late, partial, or missing deliveries in any manner allowed to them by their terms and conditions that best resolves the shortage. The Contractor(s) is/are liable for any and all reasonable costs incurred by the City or a Participating Public Agency due to such failures and can also recover any additional losses by deducting the outstanding amount from unpaid invoices.

If the Homeland Security Advisory System places the waste/drinking water industry in Codes Orange or Red, all deliveries shall be between the designated hours at the City or Participating Public Agencies for that code status. A Contractor(s) will be required to follow prescribed delivery methods and regulations during the Code Orange or Red status.

The Contractor(s) guarantees the delivery of chemicals within the prescribed delivery schedule of the City and each Participating Public Agency. Failure to deliver at the time specified, or as amended in writing by the City or Participating Public Agency or failure to make replacements of rejected chemicals shall constitute a breach of contract.

Contractor(s) shall comply with all regulations for tank/truck unloading as established by the US Department of Transportation, as well as any State or local requirements. Chemical containers supplied by the Contractor(s) shall be the sole responsibility of the Contractor(s) at all times and in any circumstance. The City and Participating Public Agencies will not pay demurrage or other charges unless the City or Participating Public Agency requests that the Contractor(s) leave the container beyond the delivery date. The control number shall be provided to the treatment plant at the same time as the other required delivery information. A broken seal prior to acceptance of the batch by the City or Participating Public Agency may be cause for refusal of the delivery.

All deliveries under this contract shall be accompanied by a receiving ticket that shall be supported by a minimum of:

- Contractor(s) Name
- Purchase Order and Call Order Number (release number)
- Date of Delivery and Date of Order
- Materials Furnished
 - Quantity, unit price and extension of each item, and total in accordance with the contract
- Name of authorized representative ordering supplies

A Contractor's delivery ticket will be signed in duplicate by the Contractor's designated representative. One copy will be given to the employee signing for the delivery and a second copy will be retained by the Contractor. If required by the City or Participating Public Agency, the Contractor(s) will call the treatment facility prior to delivery and shall provide advance information as required by the City or Participating Public Agency which may include fax a copy of the driver's license, a chemical shipping itinerary sheet with the manifest numbers or other pertinent information.

Agencies have the right to refuse delivery if chemical packaging is damaged, appears to have been tampered with, or is deemed to be a safety hazard or potential safety hazard.

All chemicals will be delivered F.O.B. destination as prescribed by the awarded price/freight schedule. Delivery free period shall be prescribed by the City or Participating Public Agency and hours of delivery will be determined by the City or each Participating Public Agency.

C. MSDS REPORTS

The following MSDS related documentation must be furnished to the City or each Participating Public Agency upon request:

- i. A copy of the most current MSDS Report for each chemical your firm is offering pricing must be provided prior to award.
- ii. National Sanitation Foundation certification for the quoted chemical.
- iii. Chemical certificate of analysis for all chemicals.

D. GENERAL CHEMICAL DESCRIPTIONS

The type and general description of chemicals are provided in this section. These are meant to be an overview of the types of chemicals that are available under the Master Agreement. The City and/or Participating Public Agencies specifics will need to be taken into consideration on a case by case basis upon their agreement to utilize the Master Agreement.

i. Ammonia, Anhydrous

The product furnished shall be chemically pure anhydrous, 99.98% free ammonia, free from impurities, which might cause hazards or stoppage of the operation of standard ammonia feed equipment.

ii. Ammonium Hydroxide

Chemical strength shall be at a minimum 20%

iii. Chlorine

The product furnished shall be chemically pure anhydrous, 99.5% by volume free chlorine, free from impurities, which cause hazards, or stoppage in the operation of standard chlorinating equipment. The Contractor(s) at a minimum shall adhere to the recommendations in the current edition of the Chlorine Institute's Pamphlet 17 Packaging and Shipping Plant Safety and Operational guides for receiving, inspecting, testing and reconditioning chlorine cylinders, ton containers, valves and fusible plugs.

iv. Copper Sulfate

Copper Sulfate shall be standard commercial fine crystal grade of copper sulfate pentahydrate containing at least 99% of $\text{CuSo}_4.5\text{H}_2\text{O}$. The percentage of elemental copper shall not be less than 25% and insoluble matter shall not exceed 0.5%. Certification or quality assurance of mesh size must be provided.

v. Ferric Sulfate

Ferric sulfate solution is a reddish brown liquid that is manufactured from a high purity, mined magnetic iron ore, virgin sulfuric acid, water, and liquid oxygen. The solution must comply with the AWWA standard for ferric sulfate (B406) and is NSF/ANSI Standard 60 certified for use in potable water and municipal and industrial wastewater.

The following types should be provided:

vi. Sodium Fluoride

It is a white odorless material available either as a powder or in the form of crystals of various sizes.

vii. Fluorosilicic Acid

Fluorosilicic Acid is a 20 to 35 percent aqueous solution. It is a colorless to straw yellow, transparent, fuming, corrosive liquid. It has a pungent odor and irritating action on the skin.

viii. Hydorfluosilicic Acid

The product furnished shall not be less than 23% solution Hydorfluosilicic acid H₂SiF₆.

ix. Lime Foundry Quick Grade

The quick lime shall consist essentially of calcium oxide with a lesser amount of magnesium oxide. Material shall contain a minimum of 85% available calcium oxide. The insoluble matter shall not exceed 2% by weight. Material is to be crushed and screened so that none shall be retained on a 5/16" sieve. Not more than 2%, 15%, 80% by weight shall pass a No. 20, No. 14, No. 6 US standard sieve, respectively.

x. Lime Hydrated

The hydrated lime shall be white in color, dry, and the best quality. Water soluble calcium oxide equivalent shall not be less than 68% CaO by weight. Insolubles shall not exceed 5% by weight. The lime shall contain no magnesium in excess of an amount equivalent to 1-1/2% of magnesium oxide MgO.

xi. Pebble Quicklime

The quicklime shall consist essentially of calcium oxide with a lesser amount of magnesium oxide. Quick lime shall be supplied in pulverized form known as granular type. It shall be of best quality, highly reactive, freshly burned, substantially free of core, as dirt or unburned stone. The lime to be used for post lime treatment shall be high calcium granular suitable for conditioning wastewater treatment plant sludge and for pH and alkalinity control in the water treatment process. Material shall contain a minimum of 90% available calcium oxide, and shall be the quality known as "quick slaking", readily disintegrating into a suspension without objectionable amounts of un-dissolved or un-slaked materials. Insoluble matter shall not exceed 2% by weight. It shall not contain floating insoluble particles that are of a nature that cannot be captured and retained by the slaker grit removal system which operates on the basis of gravity separation. For each delivery, Contractor(s) shall provide a certification of analysis of the following: slaking test, objectionable insoluble matter test, gradation test, loss of ignition test and available calcium oxide test. The slaking rate shall be that a temperature of 40°C shall occur in 3 minutes or less and the reaction shall be complete within 6 minutes regardless of the calcium oxide content. Material is to be crushed and screened so that none shall be retained on a 1/4" sieve screen and not more than 25% passing a No. 100 US standard mesh screen and shall contain no mineral or organic substances in quantities that will adversely affect the percent available calcium oxide when tested in accordance with AWWA Standard for Quicklime and Hydrated Lime. The method employed to test materials furnished under this contract shall conform to AWWA Standard B202-93, or the latest revisions, unless otherwise noted by Participating Public Agency.

xii. Polyaluminum Chloride or Polyaluminum Hydroxychlorosulfate

Aluminum salts used in coagulation and sedimentation processes. The Polyaluminum chloride must be liquid in form and easily applied via metering pumps. It shall not contain particles of sand, grit, coke, clay or gelatinous material in sizes that will clog flow regulating valves and appurtenances or accumulate as sludge in the storage tanks. Contractor(s) will be responsible for removing (at their expense) excessive PACL residual accumulations from the storage tanks at the water treatment plants. The polyaluminum chloride (PACL) must be completely water soluble and not significantly depress the treated water pH. The pH of the liquid PACL solution must be greater than 2.3. Aluminum concentration (expressed as % of Al₂O₃) shall exceed 9%. Basicity shall exceed 70%. Sulfates (expressed as % SO₄) shall be minimum of 1.7%. Freezing temperature shall be less than -12°C. Unless Contractor supplies two approved PACL products:

- a. for the winter season with a freezing temperature less than -12°C
- b. for the rest of the contract period with a freezing temperature less than 0°C
Polyaluminum chloride shall not emit any organic odors. Poly aluminum chloride must not contain any amounts of natural or synthetic polymers. Supplier must be capable of providing technical support, including on-site jar testing and training as specified by the plant operators. The Contractor's technical support person(s) shall be available for on-site technical support within 24 hours of notification. Such technical person(s) name, experience related to using PACL, as a primary coagulant in drinking water treatment plants. Home/office address and telephone numbers will need to be provided to each Participating Public Agency for their local area. Contractor must be capable of providing technical support, including on-site jar testing and training as specified by individual plant operations.

xiii. Polyphosphate

For corrosion control and reduction of soluble lead in drinking water

xiv. Potassium Permanganate

Chemical must be free flowing grade with KMnO_4 content of 97% or higher with a bulk density of approximately 100 pounds per cubic foot. The bulk density shall be relatively dust free in handling. The specific gravity will be equal to 1.039 of a 6% solution by weight at $68^{\circ}\text{F}/20^{\circ}\text{C}$. The chemical must be stable in storage for at least three years

xv. Powder Activated Carbon

As prescribed in AWWA Standard B600-05.

xvi. Sodium Hexametaphosphate

The material shall be supplied in granular form-approximately 95% finer than US sieve #4 and 95% larger than US sieve #12.

xvii. Sodium Permanganate

Similar to potassium permanganate, liquid in form NaMnO_4

xviii. Sulfur Dioxide

The product furnished shall be chemically pure 99.98% Sulfur Dioxide, free from adulterants or impurities. Oil and other residue content shall not exceed 60°F (15.5°C) shall not exceed 100 ppm. Acidity shall not exceed 20 ppm. Typical physical and chemical properties shall be:

- a. Vapor Pressure at 60°F (15.5°C) (of gas) 40.3 psi
- b. Specific Gravity (liquid) at 60°F (15.5°C) 1.39
- c. Boiling point at 1 atm 14°F (-10°C)
- d. Solubility in water at 60°F (15.5°C) & 1 atm 11.7% by wt.
- e. Color shall be water white

xix. Sulfuric Acid

Chemical strength shall be 93% and chemical shall be 66° Baum.

xx. Zinc Orthophosphate

The product furnished shall conform to the following content:

- a. Color-water white
- b. Odor-none
- c. Density-11.4
- d. Chlorine demand-none
- e. Zinc Concentration- 3% as Zn +/-0.5%
- f. Phosphate concentration- 33% as PO₄ +/-0.5%
- g. Phosphate to Zinc ration- 11 : 1

xxi. Citric Acid

The product furnished shall conform to the following content:

- a. 50% solution, bulk delivery

xxii. Liquid Oxygen

The product furnished shall conform to the following content:

- a. Oxygen Purity: $\geq 99.5\%$ by weight
- b. Specific Gravity at 1 atmosphere: ≈ 1.14
- c. Dew Point: $< -82^{\circ}$ F
- d. Water content: < 6.6 ppmv
- e. THC (as methane): < 25 ppmv
- f. Particulate size: < 10 micron (filtered)
- g. The LOX shall conform to the American Water Works Association (AWWA) Standard B304-08, "Liquid Oxygen for Ozone Generation for Water, Wastewater, and Reclaimed Water Systems".
- h. The LOX shall conform to the Compressed Gas Association (CGA), Specification G-4.3 (most recent edition) for quality verification level of Grade D or better Type II liquid oxygen.
- i. The LOX shall contain no soluble organic or inorganic substances in quantities capable of producing deleterious or injurious effects on health of those coming into contact with the treated water.

E. TECHNICAL SPECIFICATIONS

i. For Aluminum Sulfate (Alum)

a. General

The Contractor(s) shall ensure all loads of Liquid Aluminum Sulfate meet the all requirements of this contract and these specifications. All specifications apply to the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate transferred by the Contractor(s) into the City's or Participating Public Agency's storage vessels.

If an Offeror is responding to the Water Treatment Chemical portion of this solicitation, Offeror shall provide unit cost in \$/lb. of "dry alum". For the purposes of these Specifications, "dry alum" is $Al_2(SO_4)_3 \cdot 14H_2O$.

The Contractor(s) shall bill by weight of dry alum delivered in lb. The Contractor(s) shall calculate the weight of dry alum delivered in each shipment, and the extended cost of each shipment as follows:

1. wt. of dry alum in ship, in lb = (wt. of Liq. Alum. Sulf. in ship, in lb.) (dry alum conc., in %, by wt.)
2. cost of shipment, in \$ = (wt. of dry alum in shipment, in lb)(unit cost, in \$/lb of dry alum)

The Contractor(s) shall submit invoices to the City or Participating Public Agency for each delivery that include the following (unless specified otherwise by City or Participating Public Agency):

1. date of delivery
2. Bill of Lading Number, or other mechanism to definitively link the invoice to a delivery
3. the net weight of Liquid Aluminum Sulfate delivered in pounds
4. the weight percentage of dry alum in the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate delivered
5. the weight of dry alum in the shipment, in pounds
6. the cost of the shipment, in dollars

b. Compliance with Standards

1. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall conform to the latest revision of the American Water Works Association Standard ANSI/AWWA B403, Aluminum Sulfate - Liquid, Ground, or Lump except as modified or supplemented herein. Non-conformance with ANSI/AWWA B403 shall constitute sufficient grounds for immediate termination of the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate contract for breach.
2. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall be tested and certified as meeting ANSI/NSF Standard 60, Drinking Water Treatment Chemicals - Health Effects by an American National Standards Institute (ANSI) accredited 3rd party certification organization. The Contractor(s) shall provide evidence of this certification prior to award.
3. If ANSI/NSF Standard 60 certification for Liquid Aluminum Sulfate is ever revoked or lapses, the Contractor(s) shall inform the City or Participating Public Agency within 24 hours from the time of verbal or written notification of such revocation or lapse. Loss of this certification shall constitute sufficient grounds for immediate termination of the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate contract for breach.
4. All sampling and testing shall be conducted in accordance with all AWWA/ANSI and ASTM specifications.

c. Chemical Composition/Impurities

1. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall be produced from ore, not from reclaimed aluminum metal.
2. During the life of the Master Agreement, the Contractor(s) shall notify the City or Participating Public Agency of any changes in the manufacturing of the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate that may impact quality. One item of particular concern are manufacturing processes or materials impacting the concentration of impurities. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall be of such clarity as to permit the reading of flow-measuring devices without difficulty.

3. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall contain water-soluble aluminum of not less than 4.23% as Al, or 8.0% as Al₂O₃, by weight. The literature specific gravity of Liquid Aluminum Sulfate at the minimum concentration is 1.32.
4. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall contain less than or equal to 0.2% water-insoluble matter by weight.
5. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall not contain any foreign matter or impurity that may damage or interfere with the City's or Participating Public Agency's equipment, facility, or treatment processes. This includes foreign matter or impurities that are a result of shipment or transfer into the City's or Participating Public Agency's tanks. A Contractor shall reimburse the City or Participating Public Agency(s) for any damages or costs incurred from any foreign material or impurity.
6. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall not contain any impurity in sufficient quantities that causes or may cause, by the City's or Participating Public Agency's normal usage of the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate, the City or Participating Public Agency to violate any existing permit limit or water quality standard, or any limit or standard that may be implemented during the term of this Master Agreement.

Should any permit limit or water quality standard exceedance be determined to be directly attributable to the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate supplied, the Contractor(s) shall immediately take the necessary steps to remove or reduce the containment concentrations to levels satisfactory to the City or Participating Public Agency.

7. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate supplied must not contain any impurities that cause abnormally rapid decomposition and/or gas production in the City's or Participating Public Agency's storage vessels.
8. Notwithstanding any other requirements of this specification, the concentration of certain metals in the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall be limited as follows:

9. The City and Participating Public Agencies reserves the right to add other impurity listings and maximum impurity levels to the existing listings as is required to meet all permit limits and water quality standards.
10. Any water used to make up the liquid Aluminum Sulfate must contain less than 20 µg of per chlorate/L.
11. Before the initial delivery, Contractor(s) shall sample the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate from a typical lot and determine the parameters listed below. The sampling shall conform to industry standard practices and all AWWA/ANSI and ASTM specifications. The analytical laboratory and its sample preparation and analysis methods must be acceptable to the City or Participating Public Agency.
 - A. production lot number,
 - B. date of manufacture,
 - C. specific gravity, at 20 °C
 - D. equivalent aluminum oxide concentration, in % Al₂O₃, by weight,
 - E. aluminum concentration, in % Al, by weight,
 - F. dry alum concentration, , in % Al₂(SO₄)₃•14H₂O, by weight
 - G. free acidity, in % H₂SO₄, or basicity, in % Al₂O₃, by weight
 - H. water-insoluble matter concentration, in %, by weight, and
 - I. all of the metals in the table above, in mg/kg (Note: The reporting detection limit for each metal must be less than or equal to the maximum reporting detection limit listed in the table above.)
12. The Contractor(s) shall supply the requesting Participating Public Agency a detailed report for the sampling and analysis described above. The report shall contain a statement, signed and dated by a management-level representative of the Contractor(s), certifying that the sample supplied to the laboratory was unaltered and representative of the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate (to be) delivered to the City or Participating Public Agency. The report shall also contain evidence that all water sources used to make up the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate contained less than 20 µg per chlorate/L. Contractor(s) may use analytical data generated by the Contractor(s) of the make up water(s) or may collect and analyze samples of the make up water(s). The determination of per chlorate must be performed by the ion chromatographic method.
13. The Contractor(s) shall complete the sampling and analysis process described above once per calendar quarter during the life of the contract and after any changes in the manufacturing of the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate that may impact quality or the concentration of any impurity. This requirement applies to all calendar quarters, including the first calendar quarter. The first calendar quarter will likely not be a full calendar quarter. The lot selected for the first calendar quarter compliance must be different than the lot selected to demonstrate initial compliance. The

Contractor(s) shall submit each calendar quarter's report to the City or Participating Public Agency on or before the last day of that calendar quarter.

14. The Contractor(s) shall submit the initial report before the delivery of the first shipment. Failure of a Contractor to submit a complete report on time is sufficient cause to constitute breach of contract.

d. Delivery Documents

1. The Contractor(s) shall provide a Bill of Lading/Weigh Slip with each delivery indicating the following (or as indicated by City or Participating Public Agency):
 - A. date of delivery,
 - B. bill of Lading/Weigh Slip Number
 - C. gross weight of delivery vehicle and Liquid Aluminum Sulfate in pounds,
 - D. tare weight of delivery vehicle in pounds, and
 - E. net weight of Liquid Aluminum Sulfate in the delivery vehicle in pounds

The dry weight in pounds must match what the dry weight in pounds will be on the Contractor's Invoice.

2. The Contractor(s) shall submit a Certificate of Analysis or Conformance to the City or Participating Public Agency for, and with each delivery. The Contractor(s) shall present the Certificate to the WPCF Operations personnel receiving the shipment. The Certificate shall contain the following lot-specific information:
 - A. production lot number,
 - B. date of manufacture,
 - C. specific gravity, at 20 °C
 - D. equivalent aluminum oxide concentration, in % Al_2O_3 , by weight,
 - E. aluminum concentration, in % Al, by weight,
 - F. dry alum concentration, in % $Al_2(SO_4)_3 \cdot 14H_2O$, by weight
 - G. free acidity, in % H_2SO_4 , or basicity, in % Al_2O_3 , by weight
 - H. water-insoluble matter concentration, in %, by weight,
3. Failure to supply the required Certificates, or failure to meet any specification described herein, shall be sufficient cause to reject the load.
4. Offeror(s) shall include any charges for the Certificates in their price submitted as part of their response to this solicitation.

e. Delivery Logistics

1. The Contractor(s) shall ship the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate to the City or Participating Public Agency as a "bulk" liquid in a tank truck and shall ensure all shipments comply with all US DOT regulations for marking.
2. Failure of the Contractor(s) to successfully complete a delivery is sufficient grounds to constitute a breach of the contract.

3. The Contractor(s) is/are expected to comply with reasonable requests for emergency deliveries.
4. The Contractor(s) shall measure delivery quantities as the total weight of Liquid Aluminum Sulfate delivered in pounds. Unless otherwise stated by the City or Participating Public Agency: the City and/or the Participating Public Agency shall assume the weight of the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate delivered (transferred to the City or Participating Public Agency) is equal to net weight of the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate in the delivery vehicle; and the Contractor(s) shall also ensure the complete transfer of Liquid Aluminum Sulfate from the delivery vehicle to the City's or Participating Public Agency's storage tanks.
5. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall be free from extraneous materials and shall be transported and delivered at such concentration and temperature that no freezing occurs. The liquid shall be suitable for feeding by means of metering pumps and other metering devices constructed of corrosion resistant material.
6. The tank truck must be equipped with a hose of the size and length to connect with the hose to the storage silo. The hose must have a "quick connect" to connect with the fitting on silo hose furnished by the WPCF. All appurtenant valves, pumps, and discharge hoses used for the delivery of Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall be clean and free from contaminating material. Unclean off-loading equipment shall constitute sufficient grounds for rejection of the load.
7. The tank truck must be sealed and equipped with a self-contained system to deliver all the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate in the load into aboveground storage tanks. The inputs to these tanks are above the height of the output of typical tank trucks. An example of a delivery mechanism is pressurizing the tank with an air pump. The Contractor(s) shall supply all transfer equipment and shall not use the City's or Participating Public Agency's equipment (unless stated otherwise). The transfer mechanics shall be such to allow the driver to complete the task alone under normal circumstances, without the aid of the City or Participating Public Agency. The driver shall follow the instructions posted at the unloading station.
8. The driver shall follow all City or Participating Public Agency's security procedures and requirements for personal protective equipment. The City or Participating Public Agency shall inform the Contractor of these procedures and requirements initially, and shall communicate any changes throughout the term of the contract.
9. Before unloading, the driver shall notify WPCF Operations personnel that a delivery has arrived on site. The driver shall present the Bill of Lading, Weigh Slips, the Certificate, and any other applicable order/delivery documents to the Operations representative. The City and Participating Public Agencies reserves the right to reject the delivery based on inadequate or non-conforming information in these documents. All other documentation prescribed by DOT, ICC, other regulatory bodies and statues must be provided when the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate is delivered.
10. The City and Participating Public Agencies reserve the right to subject samples of the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate to analysis to determine if the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate meets the City's specifications. The Contractor(s) shall facilitate the sampling process, when asked. Failing to comply with the City's or Participating Public

Agency's specifications shall constitute grounds for rejection of that load and is sufficient grounds to constitute a breach of contract.

If in the opinion of the City or Participating Public Agency, there is a necessity to remove non-conforming Liquid Aluminum Sulfate, the Contractor(s) shall remove and replace any and all non-conforming Liquid Aluminum Sulfate within 24 hours of being notified without additional cost to the City or Participating Public Agency. Alternatively, the City or Participating Public Agency may remove the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate and the cost for removal and disposal shall be billed to the Contractor(s). The Contractor(s) may not charge for delivered material the City or Participating Public Agency rejects.

11. All employees' drivers and subcontractors will be subject to background checks at the sole cost of the Contractor(s).

ii. For Soda Ash (Sodium Carbonate, Dry)

a. General

1. The Contractor(s) shall ensure all loads of Soda Ash meet the all requirements of this Master Agreement and these specifications. All specifications apply to the Soda Ash transferred by the Contractor(s) into the City's or Participating Public Agency's storage vessels.
2. Offeror(s) submitting for Water Treatment Chemicals, shall submit unit and extended costs in \$/lb. of Na_2CO_3 (dry) as part of their response to this solicitation.
3. Contractor(s) shall bill by weight of Na_2CO_3 delivered in lb.
4. Contractor(s) shall submit invoices to the City or Participating Public Agency for each delivery that include the following:
 - A. date of delivery,
 - B. weight of Soda Ash delivered, in lb.
 - C. unit price, and
 - D. extended cost (lb. x unit price)

b. Compliance with Standards

1. The Soda Ash shall conform to the latest revision of the American Water Works Association Standard ANSI/AWWA B201, Soda Ash, except as modified or supplemented herein. Non-conformance with ANSI/AWWA B201 shall constitute sufficient grounds for immediate termination of the Soda Ash contract for breach
2. The Soda Ash shall be tested and certified as meeting ANSI/NSF Standard 60, Drinking Water Treatment Chemicals - Health Effects by an American National Standards Institute (ANSI) accredited 3rd party certification organization. The Contractor(s) shall provide evidence of this certification prior to award. The Contractor(s) shall supply evidence of this certification throughout the term of the Master Agreement.
 - a. If ANSI/ NSF Standard 60 certification for Soda Ash is ever revoked or lapses, the Contractor(s) shall inform the City or Participating Public Agency within 24 hours from the time of verbal or written notification of such revocation or lapse. Loss of this certification shall constitute sufficient grounds for immediate termination of the Soda Ash contract for breach.

b. All sampling and testing shall be conducted in accordance with all AWWA/ANSI and ASTM specifications.

c. Chemical Composition/Impurities

1. During the life of the contract, the Contractor(s) shall notify the City or Participating Public Agency of any changes in the manufacturing of the Soda Ash that may impact quality. Of particular concern are manufacturing processes or materials impacting the concentration of impurities.

The Contractor(s) shall reimburse the City or Participating Public Agency for any damages or costs incurred from any foreign material or impurity.
7. The Soda Ash shall not contain any impurity in sufficient quantities that causes or may cause, by the City's or Participating Public Agency's normal usage of the Soda Ash, the City or Participating Public Agency to violate any existing permit limit or water quality standard, or any limit or standard that may be implemented during the term of this contract. Should any permit limit or water quality standard exceedance be determined to be directly attributable to the Soda Ash supplied, the Contractor(s) shall immediately take the necessary steps to remove or reduce the containment concentrations to levels satisfactory to the City or Participating Public Agency.

8. Notwithstanding any other requirements of this specification, the concentration of certain metals in the Soda Ash shall be limited as follows:

The Contractor(s) shall make all changes necessary to meet such listings or levels.
10. Before the initial delivery, the Contractor(s) shall sample the Soda Ash from a typical lot and determine the parameters listed below. The sampling shall conform to industry standard practices and all AWWA/ANSI and ASTM specifications. The analytical laboratory and its sample preparation and analysis methods must be acceptable to the City or Participating Public Agency.
- A. Soda Ash production lot or batch number,
 - B. date of manufacture,
 - C. apparent density, in lb/ft³,
 - D. sodium carbonate, Na₂CO₃, in percent, by weight,
 - E. insoluble matter, in percent, by weight, and
 - F. all of the total metals listed in the table above.

Note: The reporting detection limit for each metal must be less than or equal to the maximum listed in the table above.

11. A Contractor shall supply the City or Participating Public Agency a detailed report for the sampling and analysis described above (unless otherwise indicated by City or Participating Public Agency). The report shall contain a statement, signed by a

management-level representative of the Contractor, certifying that the sample supplied to the laboratory was unaltered and representative of the Soda Ash (to be) delivered to the City or Participating Public Agency.

12. A Contractor shall complete the sampling and analysis processes described above once per year in the month of the anniversary of the initial test, and after any changes in the manufacturing of the Soda Ash that may impact quality or the concentration of any impurity.
13. A Contractor shall submit the initial report before the delivery of the first shipment. Failure of the Contractor to submit a complete report on time is sufficient cause to constitute breach of contract.

d. Delivery Documents

1. The Contractor(s) shall provide a Bill of Lading and Weigh Slip with each delivery indicating the following:
 - A. date of delivery,
 - B. gross weight of delivery vehicle and Soda Ash in pounds,

2. The Contractor(s) shall submit a Certificate of Analysis or Conformance to the City for, and with each delivery. The Contractor(s) shall present the Certificate to the WPCF Operations personnel receiving the shipment. The Certificate shall contain the following lot-specific information:
 - A. Soda Ash production lot or batch number,
 - B. date of manufacture,
 - C. apparent density, in lb/ft³
 - D. sodium carbonate, Na₂CO₃, in percent, by weight,
 - E. insoluble matter, in percent, by weight, and
 - F. date of certificate.
3. Failure to supply the required Certificates, or failure to meet any specification described herein, shall be sufficient cause to reject the load.
4. A Contractor responding to the Water Treatment Chemicals portion of this solicitation shall include any charges for the Certificates in their proposal price.

e. Delivery Logistics

1. The Contractor(s) shall measure delivery quantities as the total weight of Soda Ash delivered in pounds. The City or Participating Public Agency shall assume the weight of the Soda Ash delivered (transferred to the City or Participating Public Agency) is equal to net weight of the Soda Ash in the delivery vehicle. The Contractor(s) shall ensure the complete transfer of Soda Ash from the delivery vehicle to the City's or Participating Public Agency's storage tanks.

2. Before unloading, the driver shall notify WPCF Operations personnel that a delivery has arrived on site. The driver shall present the Bill of Lading, Weigh Slips, the Certificate, and any other applicable order/delivery documents to the Operations representative. The City or Participating Public Agency reserves the right to reject the delivery based on inadequate or non-conforming information in these documents. All other documentation prescribed by DOT, ICC, other regulatory bodies and statues must be provided when the Soda Ash is delivered.
3. The City or Participating Public Agency reserves the right to subject samples of the Soda Ash collected before the chemical enters the storage tank to analysis to determine if the Soda Ash meets the City's or Participating Public Agency's specifications. The Contractor shall facilitate the sampling process, when asked. Failing to comply with the City's or Participating Public Agency's specifications shall constitute grounds for rejection of that load and is sufficient grounds to constitute a breach of contract. If in the opinion of the City or Participating Public Agency, there is a necessity to remove non-conforming Soda Ash, the Contractor(s) shall remove and replace any and all non-conforming Soda Ash within 24 hours of being notified without additional cost to the City or Participating Public Agency.

Alternatively, the City or Participating Public Agency may remove the Soda Ash and the cost for removal and disposal shall be billed to the Contractor(s). The Contractor may not charge for delivered material the City or Participating Public Agency rejects.

4. The transfer mechanics shall be such to allow the driver to complete the task alone under normal circumstances, without the aid of the City or Participating Public Agency. The driver must follow the instructions posted at the unloading station.
5. The tank truck must be sealed and equipped with a self-contained system to deliver all the Soda Ash in the load into aboveground storage tanks. 8. Failure of the Contractor(s) to successfully complete a delivery is sufficient grounds to constitute a breach of the contract.
9. The Contractor(s) is/are expected to comply with reasonable requests for emergency deliveries.
10. All employees' drivers and subcontractors will be subject to background checks at the sole cost of the Contractor(s).

iii. For Sodium Bisulfite

Note: These specifications are for 37.5-40% liquid sodium bisulfite.

a. General

1. All deliveries of liquid sodium bisulfite must conform to the specifications of this contract. All quality specifications apply to the product transferred by the Contractor(s) into the City's or Participating Public Agency's storage vessels.
2. The Contractor(s) shall measure delivery quantities as the total weight of product (solution) delivered in pounds. The Contractor(s) shall bill by weight of NaHSO₃ in pounds. The Contractor(s) shall calculate the weight of NaHSO₃ in each shipment as follows:
 - A. wt. of NaHSO₃ in shipment, in lb = (shipment wt., in lb)(NaHSO₃, in % by wt.)
 - B. cost of shipment, in \$ = (wt. of NaHSO₃ in shipment, in lb)(cost of NaHSO₃, in \$/lb of NaHSO₃)
3. The Successful Supplier(s) shall provide a Bill of Lading and Weigh Slip with each delivery indicating the following:
 - A. Date of delivery
 - B. Gross weight of delivery vehicle and product in pounds
 - C. Tare weight of delivery vehicle in pounds
 - D. Net weight of product in the delivery vehicle in pounds

The City or Participating Public Agency shall assume the weight of the product (solution) delivered (transferred to the City or Participating Public Agency) is equal to net weight of the product in the delivery vehicle. The Contractor(s) shall ensure the complete transfer of product from the delivery vehicle to the City's or Participating Public Agency's storage vessels.

The Contractor shall reimburse the City or Participating Public Agency for any damages or costs incurred from such foreign material.
6. Should any permit limit or water quality standard exceedance be determined to be directly attributable to the liquid sodium bisulfite supplied, the Contractor shall immediately take the necessary steps to remove or reduce the containment concentrations to levels satisfactory to the City or Participating Public Agency.

 9. Any water used to make up the liquid sodium bisulfite must contain less than 20 µg per chlorate/L.
 10. The Contractor(s) shall ensure all loads of the liquid sodium bisulfite meet the requirements of Items H) and I) above. Before the initial delivery, the Contractor(s) shall sample the liquid sodium bisulfite from a typical lot and determine all the constituents listed in Item I) and specific gravity. The sampling shall conform to industry standard practices. The analytical laboratory and their sample preparation and analysis methods must be acceptable to the City or Participating Public Agency. The reporting units and maximum analytical reporting detection limits are listed in Item H) above.
 11. The Contractor(s) shall supply the City or Participating Public Agency a detailed report for the sampling and analysis described above. The report shall contain a statement, signed by a management-level representative of the Contractor(s), certifying that the sample supplied to the laboratory was unaltered and representative of the typical product (to be) delivered to the City or Participating Public Agency. The report shall also contain evidence that all water sources used to make up the liquid sodium bisulfite contain less than 20 µg per chlorate/L. The Contractor(s) may use analytical data generated by the Contractor of the make up water(s) or the Contractor(s) may collect and analyze samples of the make up water(s). The determination of per chlorate must be performed by the ion chromatographic method.
 12. The Contractor(s) shall complete the sampling and analysis processes described above in Items J) and K) once per calendar quarter during the life of the contract. The requirement applies to all calendar quarters, including the first calendar quarter. The first calendar quarter will likely not be a full calendar quarter. 2. Failure to supply the required certificates shall be sufficient cause to reject the load. Failure to meet the specifications listed in Chemical Composition/Impurities, Item B above, shall also be sufficient cause to reject the load.
 3. An Offeror responding to the Water Treatment Chemicals portion of this solicitation, shall include any charges for the certificates in their proposal price.

7. The tank truck must be sealed and equipped with a self-contained system to deliver all the liquid sodium bisulfite in the load into aboveground storage tanks. All other documentation prescribed by DOT, ICC, other regulatory bodies and statues must be provided when the liquid sodium bisulfite is delivered.
10. The City or Participating Public Agency reserves the right to subject samples of the liquid sodium bisulfite to analysis to determine if the liquid sodium bisulfite meets the City's or Participating Public Agency's specifications. The Contractor(s) shall facilitate the sampling process, when asked. Failing to comply with the City's or Participating Public Agency's specifications shall constitute grounds for rejection of that load and is sufficient grounds to constitute a breach of contract.

If in the opinion of the City or Participating Public Agency, there is a necessity to remove non-conforming liquid sodium bisulfite, the Contractor shall remove and replace any and all non-conforming liquid sodium bisulfite within 24 hours of being notified without additional cost to the City or Participating Public Agency. Alternatively, the City or Participating Public Agency may remove the liquid sodium bisulfite and the cost for removal and disposal shall be billed to the Contractor(s). The Contractor(s) may not charge for delivered material the City or Participating Public Agency rejects.

11. All employees' drivers and subcontractors will be subject to background checks at the sole cost of the Contractor(s).

iv. For Sodium Hypochlorite

3. The Offeror(s) shall bill by the gallon weight of NaOCl (dry) delivered in pounds. The Offeror(s) shall calculate the volume weight of NaOCl (dry) (gallons) delivered in each shipment, and the extended cost of each shipment as follows:

If ANSI/NSF Standard 60 certification for Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite is ever revoked or lapses, the Contractor shall inform the City within 24 hours from the time of verbal or written notification of such revocation or lapse. Loss of this certification shall constitute sufficient grounds for immediate termination of the Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite contract for breach.
4. All sampling and testing shall be conducted in accordance with all AWWA/ANSI and ASTM specifications.

c. Chemical Composition/Impurities

1. During the life of the contract, the Contractor(s) shall notify the City or Participating Public Agencies of any changes in the manufacturing of the Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite that may impact quality. Of particular concern are manufacturing processes or materials impacting the concentration of impurities.
2. The Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite shall be clear.
3. The Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite shall contain greater than or equal to 12.5% sodium hypochlorite by weight. This requirement is expressed in various ways in the table below.

9. The City or Participating Public Agency reserves the right to add other specific impurity listings and maximum impurity levels to the existing listings as is required to meet all permit limits and water quality standards.
10. Any water used to make up the Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite must contain less than 20 µg of perchlorate/L.
11. Before the initial delivery, the Contractor shall sample the Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite from a typical lot and determine the parameters listed below. The sampling shall conform to industry standard practices and all AWWA/ANSI and ASTM specifications. The analytical laboratory and its sample preparation and analysis methods must be acceptable to the City or Participating Public Agency.
- A. production lot number,
 - B. date of manufacture,
 - C. sodium hypochlorite, in % NaOCl, by weight
 - D. total free alkali (excess caustic), expressed as NaOH, in %, by weight
 - E. pH, in pH units

12. The Contractor(s) shall supply the City or Participating Public Agency a detailed report for the sampling and analysis described above. The report shall contain a statement, signed by a management-level representative of the Contractor(s), certifying that the sample supplied to the laboratory was unaltered and representative of the Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite (to be) delivered to the City or Participating Public Agency. The report shall also contain evidence that all water sources used to make up the Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite contained less than 20 µg

perchlorate/L. The Contractor(s) may use analytical data generated by the Contractor of the make up water(s) or may collect and analyze samples of the make up water(s). The determination of perchlorate must be performed by the ion chromatographic method.

13. The Contractor(s) shall complete the sampling and analysis process described above once per calendar quarter during the life of the contract and after any changes in the manufacturing of the Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite that may impact quality or the concentration of any impurity. 2. The Contractor(s) shall submit a Certificate of Analysis or Conformance to the City or Participating Public Agency for, and with each delivery. The Certificate shall contain the following lot-specific information:
 - A. production lot number,
 - B. date of manufacture,
 - C. sodium hypochlorite, in % NaOCl, by weight
 - D. total free alkali (excess caustic), expressed as NaOH, by weight
 - E. specific gravity, at 20 °C
 - F. temperature of the delivered Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite, in °F, and
 - G. date of Certificate
3. Failure to supply the required Certificates, or failure to meet any specification described herein, shall be sufficient cause to reject the load.
4. Offeror(s) responding to the Water Treatment Chemicals portion of this solicitation shall include any charges for the Certificates in their price submitted as part of their proposal.

e. Delivery Logistics

1. The Contractor(s) shall ship the Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite to the City as a "bulk" liquid in a tank truck and shall ensure all shipments comply with all US DOT regulations for marking.
2. Failure of the Contractor(s) to successfully complete a delivery is sufficient grounds to constitute a breach of the contract.
3. The Contractor(s) is expected to comply with reasonable requests for emergency deliveries.
4. The temperature of the Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite upon delivery must be less than or equal to 80°F. The Contractor(s) shall measure the temperature of the product delivered just prior to, or during, transfer in to the City's or Participating Public Agency's storage vessels. The Contractor(s) shall hand write the measured temperature on the Certificate of Analysis or Conformance discussed above. The Contractor(s) shall initial and date the recorded temperature.
5. The Contractor(s) shall measure delivery quantities as the total weight of Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite delivered in pounds. The City or Participating Public Agency shall assume the weight of the Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite delivered (transferred to the City or Participating Public Agency) is equal to net weight of the Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite in the delivery vehicle. The Contractor(s) shall ensure the complete transfer of Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite from the delivery vehicle to the City's or Participating Public Agency's storage tanks.

7. The tank truck must be equipped with a hose of the size and length to connect with the hose to the storage silo. The hose must have a "quick connect" to connect with the fitting on silo hose furnished by the WPCF. All appurtenant valves, pumps, and discharge hoses used for the delivery of Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite shall be clean and free from contaminating material. Unclean off-loading equipment shall constitute sufficient grounds for rejection of the load.
8. The tank truck must be sealed and equipped with a self-contained system to deliver all the Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite in the load into aboveground storage tanks. The inputs to these tanks are above the height of the output of typical tank trucks. An example of a delivery mechanism is pressurizing the tank with an air pump. The Contractor(s) shall supply all transfer equipment. The Contractor(s) shall not use the City's or Participating Public Agency's equipment (unless noted by City or Participating Public Agency). The transfer mechanics shall be such to allow the driver to complete the task alone under normal circumstances, without the aid of the City or Participating Public Agency. The driver shall follow the instructions posted at the unloading station.

Agency shall inform the Contractor(s) of these procedures and requirements initially, and shall communicate any changes throughout the term of the contract.

10. The City or Participating Public Agency reserves the right to reject the delivery based on inadequate or non-conforming information in these documents. All other documentation prescribed by DOT, ICC, other regulatory bodies and statues must be provided when the Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite is delivered.
11. The City or Participating Public Agency reserves the right to subject samples of the Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite to analysis to determine if the Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite meets the City's specifications. The Contractor(s) shall facilitate the sampling process, when asked. Failing to comply with the City's or Participating Public Agency's specifications shall constitute grounds for rejection of that load and is sufficient grounds to constitute a breach of contract. If in the opinion of the City or Participating Public Agency, there is a necessity to remove non-conforming Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite, the Contractor(s) shall remove and replace any and all non-conforming Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite within 24 hours of being notified without additional cost to the City. Alternatively, the City or Participating Public Agency may remove the Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite and the cost for removal and disposal shall be billed to the Contractor(s). The Contractor(s) may not charge for delivered material the City or Participating Public Agency rejects.
12. All employees' drivers and subcontractors will be subject to background checks at the sole cost of the Contractor(s).

2. Offeror(s) responding to the Water Treatment Chemicals portion of this solicitation shall provide unit and extended costs in \$/lb of Na₂O (76% basis) as part of their response.
3. The Contractor(s) shall bill by weight of Na₂O (76% basis) delivered in pounds. The Contractor(s) shall calculate the weight of Na₂O (76% basis) delivered in each shipment, and the extended cost of each shipment as follows:
 - A. wt. of Na₂O in shipment = (shipment wt., in lb)(Na₂O, in % by wt.)
 - B. wt. of Na₂O (76% basis) in shipment = (wt. of Na₂O in shipment)/0.76

b. Compliance with Standards

Non-conformance with ANSI/AWWA B501 shall constitute sufficient grounds for immediate termination of the Liquid Sodium Hydroxide contract for breach.
2. The Liquid Sodium Hydroxide shall be tested and certified as meeting ANSI/NSF Standard 60, Drinking Water Treatment Chemicals - Health Effects by an American National Standards Institute (ANSI) accredited 3rd party certification organization.
3. If ANSI/NSF Standard 60 certification for Liquid Sodium Hydroxide is ever revoked or lapses, the Contractor(s) shall inform the City or Participating Public Agency within 24 hours from the time of verbal or written notification of such revocation or lapse. Loss of this certification shall constitute sufficient grounds for immediate termination of the Liquid Sodium Hydroxide contract for breach.
4. All sampling and testing shall be conducted in accordance with all AWWA/ANSI and ASTM specifications.

c. Chemical Composition/Impurities

The Liquid Sodium Hydroxide shall not contain any impurity in sufficient quantities that causes or may cause, by the City's or Participating Public Agency's normal usage of the Liquid Sodium Hydroxide, the City or Participating Public Agency to violate any existing permit limit or water quality standard, or any limit or standard that may be implemented during the term of this contract. Should any permit limit or water quality standard exceedance be determined to be directly attributable to the Liquid Sodium Hydroxide supplied, the Contractor(s) shall immediately take the necessary steps to remove or reduce the containment concentrations to levels satisfactory to the City or Participating Public Agency.
5. The Liquid Sodium Hydroxide supplied must not contain any impurities that cause abnormally rapid decomposition and/or gas production in the City's or Participating Public Agency storage vessels.
6. The City or Participating Public Agency reserves the right to add specific impurity listings and maximum impurity levels as required to meet all permit limits and water quality standards.
7. Any water used to make up the Liquid Sodium Hydroxide must contain less than 20 µg of perchlorate/L.

d. Delivery Documents

1. The Contractor(s) shall provide a Bill of Lading/Weigh Slip with each delivery indicating the following:
- A. date of delivery,
 - B. Bill of Lading/Weigh Slip Number
 - C. gross weight of delivery vehicle and Liquid Sodium Hydroxide in pounds,
 - D. tare weight of delivery vehicle in pounds, and
 - E. net weight of Liquid Sodium Hydroxide in the delivery vehicle in pounds.

2. The Contractor(s) shall submit a Certificate of Analysis or Conformance to the City or Participating Public Agency for, and with each delivery. The Contractor(s) shall present the Certificate which shall contain the following lot-specific information:

- A. production lot or batch number
- B. specific gravity, at 20 °C
- C. Na₂O, in %, by weight, determined as described in ANSI/AWWA Standard B501
- D. NaOH, in % by weight, calculated from % Na₂O
- E. date of Certificate

Note: NaOH, in % by wt. = (1.291 lb NaOH/lb Na₂O)(Na₂O, in % by wt.) Failure to supply the required Certificates, or failure to meet any specification described herein, shall be sufficient cause to reject the load.

3. Offeror(s) responding to the Water Treatment Chemicals portion of this solicitation, shall include any charges for the Certificates in the price provided in their proposal.

e. Delivery Logistics

1. The Contractor(s) shall ship the Liquid Sodium Hydroxide to the City as a “bulk” liquid in a tank truck and shall ensure all shipments comply with all US DOT regulations for marking.
2. Failure of the Contractor(s) to successfully complete a delivery is sufficient grounds to constitute a breach of the contract.
3. The Contractor(s) is expected to comply with reasonable requests for emergency deliveries.
4. The Contractor(s) shall make any necessary dilutions at external sites such that a homogeneous, well-mixed product is delivered to the City and Participating Public Agencies.
5. The Contractor(s) shall measure delivery quantities as the total weight of Liquid Sodium Hydroxide delivered in pounds. The City or Participating Public Agency shall assume the weight of the Liquid Sodium Hydroxide delivered (transferred to the City or Participating Public Agency) is equal to net weight of the Liquid Sodium Hydroxide in the delivery vehicle. The Contractor(s) shall ensure the complete transfer of Liquid Sodium Hydroxide from the delivery vehicle to the City’s or Participating Public Agency’s storage tanks.

The City or Participating Public Agency reserves the right to reject the delivery based on inadequate or non-conforming information in these documents. All other documentation prescribed by DOT, ICC, other regulatory bodies and statues must be provided when the Liquid Sodium Hydroxide is delivered.
11. The City or Participating Public Agency reserves the right to subject samples of the Liquid Sodium Hydroxide to analysis to determine if the Liquid Sodium Hydroxide meets the City's or Participating Public Agency's specifications. The Contractor(s) shall facilitate the sampling process, when asked. Failing to comply with the City's or Participating Public Agency's specifications shall constitute grounds for rejection of that load and is sufficient grounds to constitute a breach of contract. If in the opinion of the City or Participating Public Agency, there is a necessity to remove non-conforming Liquid Sodium Hydroxide, the Contractor(s) shall remove and replace any and all non-conforming Liquid Sodium Hydroxide within 24 hours of being notified without additional cost to the City or Participating Public Agency. Alternatively, the City or Participating Public Agency may remove the Liquid Sodium Hydroxide and the cost for removal and disposal shall be billed to the Contractor(s). 12. All employees' drivers and subcontractors will be subject to background checks at the sole cost of the Contractor(s).

2. POLYMERS – LIQUID AND DRY

A. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

These requirements are a broad for the City and Participating Public Agencies utilizing the Master Agreement. Contractors(s) who can and will provide Polymers – Liquid and Dry will be required to adhere to all applicable Terms and Conditions required by statutes, as well all rules and regulations governing the purchase, delivery and use of this commodity utilizing Participating Public Agencies.

- i. Contractors(s) warrant that polymer chemicals provided as a result of this RFP:
 - a. Conform to the most current NSF 60/61 and/or ANSI/AWWA standards for water and/or wastewater chemicals
 - b. Conform to the general chemical specifications contained herein
 - c. Are suitable for public drinking water supply and/or waste water treatment
 - d. Are free from adulterants or impurities of any kind, and
 - e. The specific warranties of Merchantability and Fitness for a Particular Purpose apply to all orders placed as a result of this solicitation.
- ii. If at any time, any chemical supplied by the Contractor(s) fails to conform to the specifications of the City or Participating Public Agency, then the Contractor shall at no additional cost to the City or Participating Agency, promptly replace with item that meets specifications.
- iii. Contractor(s) understand and acknowledge that the City and Participating Public Agencies provide services essential to the health and welfare of the public. Failure of a Contractor to provide contracted chemicals may jeopardize the City or Participating Public Agencies ability to provide timely services, which may affect the health and welfare of the public. In the event of product shortages at any level of production to delivery chain, Contractor(s) agree and affirm that the Participating Public Agencies will be given the earliest possible notice and the highest priority for allocation of the chemicals listed herein. To the extent the Contractor(s) must prioritize and/or allocate delivery among its customers, the requirements of the City or Participating Public Agencies under this Master Agreement will be honored before chemicals are provided to a customer with no such obligations
- iv. The Contractor(s) is/are responsible for ensuring that state and federal regulatory compliance is maintained for any chemical and related container furnished under the Master Agreement. Failure to maintain compliance as specific in this paragraph or elsewhere in this solicitation shall constitute a breach of contract.
- v. The City and Participating Public Agencies reserve the right to have chemical shipments tested by an independent laboratory. Failure of a shipment to comply with the agency specification will be sufficient reason for rejection of the shipment. Should a shipment be rejected, the Contractor(s) shall remove all non-conforming chemicals at its sole cost. Upon notice of rejection of a shipment, the Contractor(s) shall furnish another shipment immediately, which shall comply in all respects with the prescribed analysis. In the event the Contractor(s) is/are unable to promptly furnish the chemical of the acceptable quality; the City or Participating Public Agency will obtain the chemical elsewhere. Any reasonable additional cost incurred by the City or Participating Public Agency will be charged to the Contractor(s) either as a credit against an outstanding invoice or billed to the Contractor(s) for immediate payment.

B. DELIVERY

- i. The City and Participating Public Agency will establish its own delivery schedule based upon its own requirements and the Contractor(s) specified time to deliver after receipt of an order. Failure to honor delivery schedules may result in damages to the City or Participating Public Agency. The City and Participating Public Agency may at their own option and convenience cure late, partial, or missing deliveries in any manner allowed

to them by their terms and conditions that best resolves the shortage. The Contractor(s) is/are liable for any and all reasonable costs incurred by the City or Participating Public Agency due to such failures and can also recover any additional losses by deducting the outstanding amount from unpaid invoices.

- ii. If the Homeland Security Advisory System places the waste/drinking water industry in Codes Orange or Red, all deliveries shall be between the designated hours at the City or Participating Public Agency for that code status. All Contractor(s) will be required to follow prescribed delivery methods and regulations during the Code Orange or Red status.
- iii. The Contractor(s) guarantees the delivery of chemicals within the prescribed delivery schedule of the city or Participating Public Agency. Failure to deliver at time specified, or as amended in writing by the City or Participating Public Agency or failure to make replacements of rejected chemicals shall constitute a breach of contract.
- iv. Contractor(s) shall comply with all regulations for tank/truck unloading as established by the US Department of Transportation, as well as any State or local requirements. Chemical containers supplied by the Contractor(s) shall be the sole responsibility of the Contractor(s) at all times and in any circumstance. The City and Participating Public Agencies will not pay demurrage or other charges unless the City or Participating Public Agency requests that the Contractor(s) leave the container beyond the delivery date. The control number shall be provided to the treatment plant at the same time as the other required delivery information. A broken seal prior to acceptance of the batch by the City or Participating Public Agency may be cause for refusal of the delivery.
- v. All deliveries under this contract shall be accompanied by a receiving ticket that shall be supported by a minimum of:
 - a. Contractor(s) Name
 - b. Purchase Order and Call Order Number (release number)
 - c. Date of Delivery and Date of Order
 - d. Materials Furnished
 - e. Quantity, unit price and extension of each item, and total in accordance with the contract
 - f. Name of authorized representative ordering supplies
- vi. A Contractor's delivery ticket will be signed in duplicate by the Contractor designated representative. One copy will be given to the employee signing for the delivery and a second copy will be retained by the Contractor. If required by the City or Participating Public Agency, the Contractor(s) will call the treatment facility prior to delivery and shall fax a copy of the driver's license, and a chemical shipping itinerary sheet which must include the manifest numbers and above referenced information.
- vii. The City and Participating Public Agencies have the right to refuse delivery if chemical packaging is damaged, appears to have been tampered with, or is deemed to be a safety hazard or potential safety hazard.
- viii. All chemicals will be delivered F.O.B. delivered as prescribed by the awarded price/freight schedule. Delivery free period shall be prescribed by the City or Participating Public Agency and hours of delivery will be determined by the City or each Participating Public Agency.

C. MSDS REPORTS

The following MSDS related documentation must be furnished to the City or each Participating Public Agency upon request:

- i. A copy of the most current MSDS Report for each chemical your firm is offering pricing must be provided prior to award.
- ii. National Sanitation Foundation certification for the quoted chemical
- iii. Chemical certificate of analysis for all chemicals

D. GENERAL CHEMICAL DESCRIPTIONS

The type and general description of chemicals are provided in this section. These are meant to be a comprehensive overview of the chemicals that will be covered under the Master Agreement. 1. COOPERATIVE PURCHASING: Any Contract resulting from this solicitation shall be for the use of the City of Tucson. In addition, public and nonprofit agencies that have entered into a Cooperative Purchasing Agreement with the City of Tucson's Business Services Department are eligible to participate in any subsequent Contract. See http://www.tucsonprocurement.com/coop_partners.aspx and click on Cooperatives for a list of the public and nonprofit agencies that have currently entered into Cooperative Purchasing Agreements with the City of Tucson. Additionally, this contract is eligible for use by the Strategic Alliance for Volume Expenditures (SAVE) cooperative. See <http://www.mesaaz.gov/home/showdocument?id=23638> for a listing of participating agencies. The parties agree that these lists are subject to change.

Any orders placed to, or services required from, the successful Contractor(s) will be requested by each participating agency. Payment for purchases made under this agreement will be the sole responsibility of each participating agency. The Contractor may negotiate additional expenses incurred as a result of participating agencies' usage of this contract (i.e., freight charges, travel related expenses, etc.). The City shall not be responsible for any disputes arising out of transactions made by others.

The Contractor(s) will provide an electronic copy of the complete Contract to the City of Tucson Business Services Department upon receipt of the Notice of Intent to Award. At the City's request, the successful Contractor(s) may also be requested to provide an electronic copy of the complete Contract to a participating agency.

2. FOB DESTINATION FREIGHT PREPAID: Prices shall be FOB Destination Freight Prepaid to the delivery location designated. Contractor shall retain title and control of all goods until they are delivered and the Contract of coverage has been completed. All risk of transportation and all related charges shall be the responsibility of the Contractor. All claims for visible or concealed damage shall be filed by the Contractor. The City will assist the Contractor in arranging for inspection.

3. INSURANCE:

The Contractor agrees to:

A. Obtain insurance coverage of the types and amount required in this section and keep such insurance coverage in force throughout the life of this contract. All policies will contain an endorsement providing that written notice be given to the City at least thirty (30) calendar days prior to termination, cancellation, or reduction in coverage in any policy.

B. The Commercial General Liability, Commercial Automobile Liability and umbrella policies where applicable will include the City as an additional insured with respect to liability arising out of the performance of this contract. Such additional insured shall be covered to the full limits of liability purchased by the Contractor, even if those limits of liability are in excess of those required by this Contract. The Contractor agrees that the insurance hereunder will be primary and that any insurance carried by the City will be excess and not contributing.

- D. **CLAIMS MADE INSURANCE COVERAGE:** If any or part of the required insurance is written on a claims-made basis, any policy retroactive date must precede the date of the contract and the Contractor must maintain such coverage for a period not less than three (3) years following contract expiration, termination or cancellation.
- E. **ADDITIONAL INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS:** All Policies, excluding Employment Practices Liability and Professional Liability (Errors & Omissions), shall include or be endorsed to include the following provisions:
1. A waiver of subrogation endorsement in favor of the City of Tucson, for losses arising from work performed by or on behalf of the Contractor (Including Worker's Compensation).
 2. The insurance afforded the contractor shall be primary insurance and that any insurance carried by the City of Tucson and its agents, officials or employees shall be excess and not contributory.
 3. Coverage provided by the Contractor shall not be limited to the liability assumed under the indemnification provisions of this Contract.
- F. **NOTICE OF COVERAGE MODIFICATIONS:** Any changes material to compliance with this contract in the insurance policies above shall require (10) days written notice from the contractor to the City of Tucson. Such notice shall be sent directly to the Business Services Department – Procurement Division.
- G. **ACCEPTABILITY OF INSURERS:** Contractors insurance shall have an "A.M. Best" rating of not less than A-VII. The City of Tucson in no way warrants that the required minimum insurer rating is sufficient to protect the Contractor from potential insurer insolvency.

H. VERIFICATION OF COVERAGE: Contractor shall furnish the City of Tucson with certificates of insurance (ACORD form or equivalent approved by the City of Tucson) as required by this Contract. The certificates for each insurance policy are to be signed by an authorized representative.

All certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the City of Tucson before work commences. Each insurance policy required by this Contract must be in effect at or prior to commencement of work and remain in effect for the duration of the contract and two (2) years after completion. Failure to maintain the insurance policies as required by this Contract, or to provide evidence of renewal upon the City's request, is a material breach of contract.

All certificates required by this Contract shall be sent directly to the Business Services Department – Procurement Division.

The City of Tucson project/contract number and project description shall be noted on the certificate of insurance. The City of Tucson reserves the right to require complete copies of all insurance policies required by this Contract at any time.

H. SUBCONTRACTORS: Contractors' certificate(s) shall include all subcontractors as insureds under its policies **or** Contractor shall furnish to the City of Tucson separate certificates and endorsements for each subcontractor. All coverages for subcontractors shall be subject to the minimum requirements identified above.

I. EXCEPTIONS: In the event the Contractor or sub-contractor(s) is/are a public entity, then the Insurance Requirements shall not apply. Such public entity shall provide a Certificate of Self-Insurance.

4. PRICE ADJUSTMENT: The City will review fully documented requests for price adjustment after any Contract has been in effect for one (1) year. Any price adjustment will only be made at the time of Contract renewal and/or extension and will be a factor in the extension review process. The City will determine whether the requested price adjustment or an alternate option, is in the best interest of the City. Any price adjustment will be effective upon the effective date of the Contract extension.

5. TERM AND RENEWAL: The term of the Contract shall commence upon award and shall remain in effect for a period of one (1) year, unless terminated, canceled or extended as otherwise provided herein. The Contractor agrees that the City of Tucson shall have the right, at its sole option, to renew the Contract for four (4) additional one-year periods or portions thereof. In the event that the City exercises such rights, all terms, conditions and provisions of the original Contract shall remain the same and apply during the renewal period with the possible exception of price and minor scope additions and/or deletions.

STANDARD TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. **ADVERTISING:** Contractor shall not advertise or publish information concerning this Contract without prior written consent of the City's Director of Business Services.
2. **AFFIRMATIVE ACTION:** Contractor shall abide by the provisions of the Tucson Procurement Code Chapter 28, Article XII.
3. **AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT:** The Contractor shall comply with all applicable provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act (Public Law 101-336, 42 U.S.C. 12101, et seq.) and applicable Federal regulations under the Act.
4. **APPLICABLE LAW:** This Contract shall be governed, and the City and Contractor shall have all remedies afforded to each, by the Tucson Procurement Code and the law of the State of Arizona. State law claims shall be brought only in Pima County Superior Court.
5. **ASSIGNMENT-DELEGATION:** No right or interest in this Contract shall be assigned by the Contractor without prior written permission of the City, and no delegation of any duty of the Contractor shall be made without prior written permission of the City's Director of Business Services. The City shall not unreasonably withhold approval and shall notify the Contractor of the City's position by written notice.
6. **CHILD/SWEAT-FREE LABOR POLICY:** The Contractor shall comply with all applicable provisions of the United States Federal and State Child Labor and Worker's Right laws and agrees if called upon to affirm in writing, that they, and any subcontractor involved in the provision of goods to the City, are in compliance.
7. **CLEAN UP:** The Contractor shall at all times keep the contract area, including storage areas used by the Contractor, free from accumulation of waste material or rubbish and, prior to completion of the work, remove any rubbish from the premises and all tools, scaffolding, equipment and materials not property of the City. Upon completion of the repair, the Contractor shall leave the work and premises in clean, neat and workmanlike condition.
8. **COMMENCEMENT OF WORK:** The Contractor is cautioned not to commence any billable work or provide any material or service under this Contract until Contractor receives purchase order or is otherwise directed to do so, in writing, by the City.
9. **CONFIDENTIALITY OF RECORDS:** The Contractor shall establish and maintain procedures and controls that are acceptable to the City for the purpose of assuring that no information contained in its records or obtained from the City or from others in carrying out its functions under the Contract shall be used by or disclosed by it, its agents, officers, or employees, except as required to efficiently perform duties under the Contract. Persons requesting such information should be referred to the City. Information pertaining to individual persons shall not be divulged other than to employees or officers of Contractor as needed for the performance of duties under the Contract, unless otherwise agreed to in writing by the City.
10. **CONTRACT AMENDMENTS:** The Business Services Department has the sole authority to:
 - A. Amend the contract or enter into supplemental verbal or written agreements;
 - B. Grant time extensions or contract renewals;
 - C. Otherwise modify the scope or terms and provisions of the contract.

This Contract shall only be modified with the approval of the Business Services Department. Except in the case of a documented emergency, approval must be granted prior to performance. Any contract modification not explicitly approved by the Business Services Department through a written contract amendment or change order is performed at the sole risk of the Contractor and may not be eligible for payment by the City.

11. **CONTRACT:** The Contract shall be based upon the Request for Proposal issued by the City and the Offer submitted by the Contractor in response to the Request for Proposal. The offer shall substantially conform to the terms, conditions, specifications and other requirements set forth within the text of the Request for Proposal. The City reserves the right to clarify any contractual terms with the concurrence of the Contractor; however, any substantial non-conformity in the offer, as determined by the City, shall be deemed non-responsive and the offer rejected. The Contract shall contain the entire agreement between the City of Tucson and the Contractor relating to this requirement and shall prevail over any and all previous agreements, contracts, proposals, negotiations, purchase orders, or master agreements in any form.

- 12. DEFAULT IN ONE INSTALLMENT TO CONSTITUTE TOTAL BREACH:** Contractor shall deliver conforming materials in each installment or lot of this Contract and may not substitute nonconforming materials. Delivery of nonconforming materials, or default of any nature, may constitute breach of the Contract. Noncompliance may be deemed a cause for possible Contract termination.
- 13. DUPLEXED/RECYCLED PAPER:** In accordance with efficient resource procurement and utilization policies adopted by the City of Tucson, the Contractor shall ensure that, whenever practicable, all printed materials produced by the Contractor in the performance of this Contract are duplexed (two-sided copies), printed on recycled paper and labeled as such.
- 14. EQUAL PAY:** The Contractor shall comply with the applicable provisions of the Equal Pay Act of 1963 (Pub.L. 88-38, 29 U.S.C. section 206(d)); Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (Pub.L. 88-352, 42 U.S.C. 2000e *et seq.*; and, the Lily Ledbetter Fair Pay Act of 2009 (Pub.L. 111-2).
- 15. EXCLUSIVE POSSESSION:** All services, information, computer program elements, reports and other deliverables created under this Contract are the sole property of the City of Tucson and shall not be used or released by the Contractor or any other person except with prior written permission by the City.
- 16. FEDERAL IMMIGRATION LAWS AND REGULATIONS:** Contractor warrants that it complies with all Federal Immigration laws and regulations that relate to its employees and complies with A.R.S. § 23-214(A) and that it requires the same compliance of all subcontractors under this Contract. Contractor acknowledges that pursuant to A.R.S. § 41-4401 and effective September 30, 2008, a breach of this warranty is a material breach of this Contract subject to penalties up to and including termination of this Contract. The City retains the legal right to audit the records of the Contractor and inspect the papers of any employee who works for the Contractor to ensure compliance with this warranty and the Contractor shall assist in any such audit. The Contractor shall include the requirements of this paragraph in each contract with subcontractors under this Contract.

If the Contractor or subcontractor warrants that it has complied with the employment verification provisions prescribed by sections 274(a) and 274(b) of the Federal Immigration and Nationality Act and the E-verify requirements prescribed by A.R.S. § 23-214(A), the Contractor or subcontractor shall be deemed to be in compliance with this provision. The City may request proof of such compliance at any time during the term of this Contract by the Contractor and any subcontractor.

- 17. FORCE MAJEURE:** Except for payment of sums due, neither party shall be liable to the other nor deemed in default under this Contract if and to the extent that such party's performance of this Contract is prevented by reason of Force Majeure. The term "Force Majeure" means an occurrence that is beyond the control of the party affected and occurs without its fault or negligence. Force Majeure shall not include late performance by a subcontractor unless the delay arises out of a Force Majeure occurrence in accordance with this Force Majeure term and condition.

If either party is delayed at any time in the progress of the work by Force Majeure, the delayed party shall notify the other party in writing of such delay, as soon as is practical, of the commencement thereof and shall specify the causes of such delay in such notice. Such notice shall be hand-delivered or mailed certified-return receipt and shall make a specific reference to this article, thereby invoking its provisions. The delayed party shall cause such delay to cease as soon as practicable and shall notify the other party in writing when it has done so. The time of completion shall be extended by contract modification for a period of time equal to the time that results or effects of such delay prevent the delayed party from performing in accordance with this Contract.

- 18. GRATUITIES:** The City may, by written notice to the Contractor, terminate this Contract if it is found that gratuities, in the form of entertainment, gifts, meals or otherwise, were offered or given by the Contractor or any agent or representative of the Contractor, to any officer or employee of the City amending, or the making of any determinations with respect to the performing of such Contract. In the event this Contract is terminated by the City pursuant to this provision, the City shall be entitled, in addition to any other rights and remedies, to recover or withhold from the Contractor the amount of the gratuity.
- 19. HUMAN RELATIONS:** Contractor shall abide by the provisions of the Tucson City Code Chapter 28, Article XII.

- 20. INDEMNIFICATION:** To the fullest extent permitted by law, Contractor, its successors, assigns and guarantors, shall pay, defend, indemnify and hold harmless City of Tucson, its agents, representatives, officers, directors, officials and

employees from and against all allegations, demands, proceedings, suits, actions, claims, including claims of patent or copyright infringement, damages, losses, expenses, including but not limited to, attorney fees, court costs, and the cost of appellate proceedings, and all claim adjusting and handling expense, related to, arising from or out of or resulting from any actions, acts, errors, mistakes or omissions caused in whole or part by Contractor relating to work, services and/or products provided in the performance of this Contract, including but not limited to, any Subcontractor or anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them or anyone for whose acts any of them may be liable and any injury or damages claimed by any of Contractor's and Subcontractor's employees. It is agreed that Contractor will be responsible for primary loss investigation, defense and judgment costs where this indemnification is applicable. The Contractor agrees to waive all rights of subrogation against the City of Tucson, its agents, representatives, officers, directors, officials, employees and volunteers for losses arising from the work performed by the Contractor for the City of Tucson.

Contractor is responsible for compliance with the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA), for its employees in accordance with 26 CFR §54. 4980H. Additionally, Contractor is responsible for all applicable IRS reporting requirements related to ACA. If Contractor or any of Contractor's employees is certified to the City as having received a premium tax credit or cost sharing reduction which contributes to or triggers an assessed penalty against the City, or Contractor fails to meet reporting requirements pursuant to section 6056 resulting in a penalty to City, Contractor indemnifies City from and shall pay any assessed tax penalty.

21. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR: It is understood that each party shall act in its individual capacity and not as an agent, employee, partner, joint venturer, or associate of the other. An employee or agent of one party shall not be deemed or construed to be the employee or agent of the other party for any purpose.

The Contractor shall not be entitled to compensation in the form of salaries, holidays, paid vacation, sick days, or pension contributions by the City. The City of Tucson will not provide any insurance coverage to the Contractor, including Worker's Compensation coverage. The Contractor is advised that taxes, social security payments, and other withholdings shall not be withheld from a City payment issued under this Contract and that Contractor should make arrangements to directly pay such expenses. Contractor is responsible for compliance with the Affordable Care Act for Contractor and any of Contractor's employees.

22. INSPECTION AND ACCEPTANCE: All material or service is subject to final inspection and acceptance by the City. Material or service failing to conform to the specifications of this Contract shall be held at the Contractor's risk and may be returned to the Contractor. If returned, all costs are the responsibility of the Contractor. Noncompliance may be deemed a cause for possible Contract termination.

23. INTERPRETATION-PAROL EVIDENCE: This Contract is intended by the parties to be a final expression of their agreement and is intended also as a complete and exclusive statement of the terms of this agreement. No course of prior dealings between the parties and no usage of the trade shall be relevant to supplement or explain any term used in the Contract. Acceptance or consent in the course of performance under this Contract shall not be relevant to determine the meaning of this Contract even though the accepting or consenting party has knowledge of the nature of the performance and the opportunity to object.

24. ISRAEL BOYCOTT DIVESTMENTS: Acceptance of the contract warrants that the vendor is in compliance with A.R.S. § 35-393 and does not participate in a boycott of Israel as that term is defined within A.R.S. § 35-393.

25. LICENSES: Contractor shall maintain in current status all Federal, State, and local licenses and permits required for the operation of the business conducted by the Contractor as applicable to this Contract.

26. LIENS: All materials, services, and other deliverables supplied to the City under this Contract shall be free of all liens other than the security interest. Security interest shall extinguish upon full payment made by the City. Upon the City's request, the Contractor shall provide a formal release of all liens.

27. NO REPLACEMENT OF DEFECTIVE TENDER: Every tender of materials must fully comply with all provisions of this Contract. If a tender is made which does not fully comply, this shall conform to the termination clause set forth within this document.

28. NON-EXCLUSIVE CONTRACT: Any contract resulting from this solicitation shall be awarded with the understanding and agreement that it is for the sole convenience of the City of Tucson. The City reserves the right to obtain like goods or services from another source when necessary.

29. OVERCHARGES BY ANTITRUST VIOLATIONS: The City maintains that, in actual practice, overcharges resulting from antitrust violations are borne by the purchaser. Therefore, to the extent permitted by law, the Contractor hereby assigns to the City any and all claims for such overcharges as to the materials or services used to fulfill the Contract.

30. PAYMENT: The City's preferred method of payment is via credit card. The City will issue a Purchase Order and, in some cases, either provide a credit card for payment at the time of ordering or pay subsequent invoices by credit card upon receipt of goods or services in good order. However, not all City employees will possess a credit card and, therefore, the City reserves the right to make payment by check as it deems necessary.

Unless payment is made by credit card at time of order or point of sale, a separate invoice shall be issued for each shipment of material or service performed, and no payment shall be issued prior to receipt of material or service and correct invoice. The invoice shall not be dated prior to the receipt of goods or completion of services.

The City shall make every effort to process payment for the purchase of materials or services within twenty-one (21) calendar days after receipt of materials or services and a correct invoice.

The Contractor's payment terms shall apply to all purchases and to all payment methods.

31. PROTECTION OF GOVERNMENT PROPERTY: The Contractor shall use reasonable care to avoid damaging existing buildings, equipment, and vegetation (such as trees, shrubs, and grass) on City property. If the Contractor fails to do so and damages such property, the Contractor shall replace or repair the damage at no expense to the City, as determined and approved by the City's Director of Business Services. If the Contractor fails or refuses to make such repair or replacement, the City will determine a cost and the Contractor shall be liable for the cost thereof, which may be deducted from the Contract price.

32. PROVISIONS REQUIRED BY LAW: Each and every provision of law and any clause required by law to be in the Contract shall be read and enforced as though it were included herein, and if through mistake or otherwise any such provision is not inserted, or is not correctly inserted, then upon the application of either party the Contract shall be amended to make such insertion or correction.

33. RECORDS: Internal control over all financial transactions related to this Contract shall be in accordance with sound fiscal policies. Contractor shall maintain books, records, documents, and other evidence directly pertinent to the performance of the Work under this Contract in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and practices consistently applied and other applicable local, state or federal regulations.

Contractor shall, at all times during the term of this Contract and for a period of three years after the completion of this Contract, maintain such records, together with such supporting or underlying documents and materials.

Contractor shall ensure City has these rights with Contractor's employees, agents, assigns, successors, and subcontractors, and the obligations of these rights shall be explicitly included in any subcontracts or agreements formed between the Contractor and any subcontractors to the extent that those subcontracts or agreements relate to fulfillment of the Contractor's obligations to City.

34. RIGHT TO AUDIT: The City and its authorized representatives shall have the right, upon reasonable written notice to Contractor, to cause an audit to be made of the Contractor's books and records which relate to its operations under this Contract. The audit shall be limited to the term of this Contract. The City shall have the right to examine and to make copies of or extracts from all financial and related records (in whatever form they may be kept, whether written, electronic, or other) relating to or pertaining to this Contract kept by or under the control of the Contractor, including, but not limited to those kept by the Contractor, its employees, agents, assigns, successors and subcontractors. Such records shall include, but not be limited to, accounting records, subcontractor records, payment vouchers and invoices.

The Contractor shall at any time requested by City, whether during or after completion of this Contract, and at Contractor's own expense make such records available for inspection and audit (including copies and extracts of records as required) by City. Such records shall be made available to City during normal business hours at the Contractor's office, place of business, an agreed to location, mailed or provided electronically.

If, as a result of such audit, the Contractor is liable to the City for the payment of any sum, Contractor shall promptly pay such sum to the City together with interest thereon at the rate of one percent (1%) per month from the date such

sums should have been paid. Payment shall be made within 90 days from presentation of City's findings to Contractor.

If the audit discovers substantive findings related to fraud, misrepresentation, or non-performance, City may recoup the costs of the audit work from the Contractor. The City's rights under this provision shall survive the expiration or termination of the Contract.

- 35. RIGHT TO ASSURANCE:** Whenever one party to this Contract has reason to question, in good faith, the other party's intent to perform, the former party may demand that the other party give a written assurance of this intent to perform. In the event that a demand is made and no written assurance is given within five (5) days, the demanding party may treat this failure as the other party's intent not to perform and as a cause for possible Contract termination.
- 36. RIGHT TO INSPECT:** The City may, at reasonable times, and at the City's expense, inspect the place of business of a Contractor or subcontractor which is related to the performance of any Contract as awarded or to be awarded.
- 37. RIGHTS AND REMEDIES:** No provision in this document or in the Contractor's proposal shall be construed, expressly or by implication, as a waiver by either party of any existing or future right and/or remedy available by law in the event of any claim, default or breach of contract. The failure of either party to insist upon the strict performance of any term or condition of the Contract, to exercise or delay the exercise of any right or remedy provided in the Contract or by law, or to accept materials or services required by this Contract or by law shall not be deemed a waiver of any right of either party to insist upon the strict performance of the Contract.
- 38. SEVERABILITY:** The provisions of this Contract are severable to the extent that any provision or application held to be invalid shall not affect any other provision or application of the Contract which may remain in effect without the valid provision or application.
- 39. SHIPMENT UNDER RESERVATION PROHIBITED:** No tender of a bill of lading shall operate as a tender of the materials. Non-compliance shall conform to the termination clause set forth within this document.
- 40. SUBCONTRACTS:** No subcontract shall be entered into by the Contractor with any other party to furnish any of the material/service specified herein without the advance written approval of the City's Director of Business Services. All subcontracts shall comply with Federal and State laws and regulations which are applicable to the services covered by the subcontract and shall include all the terms and conditions set forth herein which shall apply with equal force to the subcontract, as if the subcontractor were the Contractor referred to herein. The Contractor is responsible for contract performance whether or not subcontractors are used.
- 41. SUBSEQUENT EMPLOYMENT:** The City may terminate this Contract without penalty or further obligation pursuant to A.R.S. Section 38-511 if any person significantly involved in initiating, negotiating, securing, drafting, or creating the Contract, on behalf of the City, is or becomes, at any time while the Contract or any extension of the Contract is in effect, an employee of, or a contractor to, any other party to this Contract with respect to the subject matter of the Contract. Termination shall be effective when written notice from the City's Director of Business Services is received by the parties to this Contract, unless the notice specifies a later time.
- 42. TERMINATION OF CONTRACT:** This Contract may be terminated at any time by mutual written consent, or by the City, with or without cause, upon giving thirty (30) days written notice. The City, at its convenience, by written notice, may terminate this Contract, in whole or in part. If this Contract is terminated, the City shall be liable only for payment under the payment provisions of this Contract for services rendered and accepted material received by the City before the effective date of termination.

The City reserves the right to terminate the whole or any part of this Contract due to the failure of the Contractor to carry out any term or condition of the Contract. The City will issue a written ten (10) day notice of default to the Contractor for acting or failing to act as specified in any of the following:

In the opinion of the City, the Contractor provides personnel that do not meet the requirements of the Contract;

In the opinion of the City, the Contractor fails to perform adequately the stipulations, conditions or services/specifications required in this Contract;

In the opinion of the City, the Contractor attempts to impose personnel, materials, products or workmanship of an unacceptable quality;

The Contractor fails to furnish the required service and/or product within the time stipulated in the Contract;

In the opinion of the City, the Contractor fails to make progress in the performance of the requirements of the Contract;

The Contractor gives the City a positive indication that the Contractor will not or cannot perform to the requirements of the Contract.

Each payment obligation of the City created by this Contract is conditioned upon the availability of City, State and Federal funds that are appropriated or allocated for the payment of such an obligation. If funds are not allocated by the City and available for the continued purchase of the services and/or materials provided under this Contract, this Contract may be terminated by the City at the end of the period for which funds are available. The City will endeavor to notify the Contractor in the event that continued service will or may be affected by non-appropriation. No penalty shall accrue to the City in the event this provision is exercised, and the City shall not be obligated or liable for any future payments due or for any damages as a result of termination under this paragraph.

43. TITLE AND RISK OF LOSS: The title and risk of loss of material or service shall not pass to the City until the City actually receives the material or service at the point of delivery, unless otherwise provided within this Contract.

44. WARRANTIES: Contractor warrants that all material or service delivered under this Contract shall conform to the specifications of this Contract. Mere receipt of shipment of the material or service specified and any inspection incidental thereto by the City shall not alter or affect the obligations of the Contractor or the rights of the City under the foregoing warranties. Additional warranty requirements may be set forth in this document.

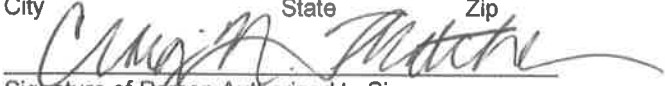

RESPONSE FOR NATIONAL COOPERATIVE CONTRACT

1.0 Scope of National Cooperative Contract

Capitalized terms not otherwise defined herein shall have the meanings given to them in the Master Agreement or in the Administration Agreement between Supplier and OMNIA Partners.

1.1 Requirement

The City of Tucson (hereinafter defined and referred to as “Principal Procurement Agency”), on behalf of itself and the National Intergovernmental Purchasing Alliance Company, a Delaware corporation d/b/a OMNIA Partners, Public Sector (“OMNIA Partners”), is requesting proposals for Water Treatment Chemicals & Polymers. The intent of this Request for Proposal is any contract between Principal Procurement Agency and Supplier resulting from this Request for Proposal (“Master Agreement”) be made available to other public agencies nationally, including state and local governmental entities, public and private primary, secondary and higher education entities, non-profit entities, and agencies for the public benefit (“Public Agencies”), through OMNIA Partners’ cooperative purchasing program. The Principal Procurement Agency has executed a Principal Procurement Agency Certificate with OMNIA Partners, an example of which is included as Exhibit D, and has agreed to pursue the Master Agreement. Use of the Master Agreement by any Public Agency is preceded by their registration with OMNIA Partners as a Participating Public Agency in OMNIA Partners’ cooperative purchasing program. Registration with OMNIA Partners as a Participating Public Agency is accomplished by Public Agencies entering into a Master Intergovernmental Cooperative Purchasing Agreement, an example of which is attached as Exhibit C, and by using the Master Agreement, any such Participating Public Agency agrees that it is registered with OMNIA Partners, whether pursuant to the terms of the Master Intergovernmental Purchasing Cooperative Agreement or as otherwise agreed to. The terms and pricing established in the resulting Master Agreement between the Supplier and the Principal Procurement Agency will be the same as that available to Participating Public Agencies through OMNIA Partners.

All transactions, purchase orders, invoices, payments etc., will occur directly between the Supplier and each Participating Public Agency individually, and neither OMNIA Partners, any Principal Procurement Agency nor any Participating Public Agency, including their respective agents, directors, employees or representatives, shall be liable to Supplier for any acts, liabilities, damages, etc., incurred by any other Participating Public Agency. Supplier is responsible for knowing the tax laws in each state.

This Exhibit A defines the expectations for qualifying Suppliers based on OMNIA Partners’ requirements to market the resulting Master Agreement nationally to Public Agencies. Each section in this Exhibit A refers to the capabilities, requirements, obligations, and prohibitions of competing Suppliers on a national level in order to serve Participating Public Agencies through OMNIA Partners.

These requirements are incorporated into and are considered an integral part of this RFP. OMNIA Partners reserves the right to determine whether or not to make the Master Agreement awarded by the Principal Procurement Agency available to Participating Public Agencies, in its sole and absolute discretion, and any party submitting a response to this RFP acknowledges that

any award by the Principal Procurement Agency does not obligate OMNIA Partners to make the Master Agreement available to Participating Procurement Agencies.

1.2 Marketing, Sales and Administrative Support

During the term of the Master Agreement OMNIA Partners intends to provide marketing, sales, partnership development and administrative support for Supplier pursuant to this section that directly promotes the Supplier's products and services to Participating Public Agencies through multiple channels, each designed to promote specific products and services to Public Agencies on a national basis.

OMNIA Partners will assign the Supplier a Director of Partner Development who will serve as the main point of contact for the Supplier and will be responsible for managing the overall relationship between the Supplier and OMNIA Partners. The Director of Partner Development will work with the Supplier to develop a comprehensive strategy to promote the Master Agreement and will connect the Supplier with appropriate stakeholders within OMNIA Partners including, Sales, Marketing, Contracting, Training, and Operations & Support.

The OMNIA Partners marketing team will work in conjunction with Supplier to promote the Master Agreement to both existing Participating Public Agencies and prospective Public Agencies through channels that may include:

- A. Marketing collateral (print, electronic, email, presentations)
- B. Website
- C. Trade shows/conferences/meetings
- D. Advertising
- E. Social Media

The OMNIA Partners sales teams will work in conjunction with Supplier to promote the Master Agreement to both existing Participating Public Agencies and prospective Public Agencies through initiatives that may include:

- A. Individual sales calls
- B. Joint sales calls
- C. Communications/customer service
- D. Training sessions for Public Agency teams
- E. Training sessions for Supplier teams

The OMNIA Partners contracting teams will work in conjunction with Supplier to promote the Master Agreement to both existing Participating Public Agencies and prospective Public Agencies through:

- A. Serving as the subject matter expert for questions regarding joint powers authority and state statutes and regulations for cooperative purchasing

- B. Training sessions for Public Agency teams
- C. Training sessions for Supplier teams
- D. Regular business reviews to monitor program success
- E. General contract administration

Suppliers are required to pay an administrative fee of 3% of the greater of the Contract Sales under the Master Agreement and Guaranteed Contract Sales under this Request for Proposal. Supplier will be required to execute the OMNIA Partners Administration Agreement (Exhibit B).

1.3 Estimated Volume

The dollar volume purchased under the Master Agreement is estimated to be approximately \$65M annually. While no minimum volume is guaranteed to Supplier, the estimated annual volume is projected based on the current annual volumes among the Principal Procurement Agency, other Participating Public Agencies that are anticipated to utilize the resulting Master Agreement to be made available to them through OMNIA Partners, and volume growth into other Public Agencies through a coordinated marketing approach between Supplier and OMNIA Partners.

1.4 Award Basis

The basis of any contract award resulting from this RFP made by Principal Procurement Agency will, at OMNIA Partners' option, be the basis of award on a national level through OMNIA Partners. If multiple Suppliers are awarded by Principal Procurement Agency under the Master Agreement, those same Suppliers will be required to extend the Master Agreement to Participating Public Agencies through OMNIA Partners. Utilization of the Master Agreement by Participating Public Agencies will be at the discretion of the individual Participating Public Agency. Certain terms of the Master Agreement specifically applicable to the Principal Procurement Agency (e.g. governing law) are subject to modification for each Participating Public Agency as Supplier, such Participating Public Agency and OMNIA Partners shall agree without being in conflict with the Master Agreement. Participating Agencies may request to enter into a separate supplemental agreement to further define the level of service requirements over and above the minimum defined in the Master Agreement (i.e. invoice requirements, order requirements, specialized delivery, diversity requirements such as minority and woman owned businesses, historically underutilized business, governing law, etc.) ("Supplemental Agreement"). It shall be the responsibility of the Supplier to comply, when applicable, with the prevailing wage legislation in effect in the jurisdiction of the Participating Agency. It shall further be the responsibility of the Supplier to monitor the prevailing wage rates as established by the appropriate department of labor for any increase in rates during the term of the Master Agreement and adjust wage rates accordingly. Any supplemental agreement developed as a result of the Master Agreement is exclusively between the Participating Agency and the Supplier (Contract Sales are reported to OMNIA Partners).

All signed Supplemental Agreements and purchase orders issued and accepted by the Supplier may survive expiration or termination of the Master Agreement. Participating Agencies' purchase orders may exceed the term of the Master Agreement if the purchase order is issued prior to the expiration of the Master Agreement. Supplier is responsible for reporting all sales

and paying the applicable administrative fee for sales that use the Master Agreement as the basis for the purchase order, even though Master Agreement may have expired.

1.5 Objectives of Cooperative Program

This RFP is intended to achieve the following objectives regarding availability through OMNIA Partners' cooperative program:

- A. Provide a comprehensive competitively solicited and awarded national agreement offering the Products covered by this solicitation to Participating Public Agencies;
- B. Establish the Master Agreement as the Supplier's primary go to market strategy to Public Agencies nationwide;
- C. Achieve cost savings for Supplier and Public Agencies through a single solicitation process that will reduce the Supplier's need to respond to multiple solicitations and Public Agencies need to conduct their own solicitation process;
- D. Combine the aggregate purchasing volumes of Participating Public Agencies to achieve cost effective pricing.

2.0 REPRESENTATIONS AND COVENANTS

As a condition to Supplier entering into the Master Agreement, which would be available to all Public Agencies, Supplier must make certain representations, warranties and covenants to both the Principal Procurement Agency and OMNIA Partners designed to ensure the success of the Master Agreement for all Participating Public Agencies as well as the Supplier.

2.1 Corporate Commitment

Supplier commits that (1) the Master Agreement has received all necessary corporate authorizations and support of the Supplier's executive management, (2) the Master Agreement is Supplier's primary "go to market" strategy for Public Agencies, (3) the Master Agreement will be promoted to all Public Agencies, including any existing customers, and Supplier will transition existing customers, upon their request, to the Master Agreement, and (4) that the Supplier has read and agrees to the terms and conditions of the Administration Agreement with OMNIA Partners and will execute such agreement concurrent with and as a condition of its execution of the Master Agreement with the Principal Procurement Agency. Supplier will identify an executive corporate sponsor and a separate national account manager within the RFP response that will be responsible for the overall management of the Master Agreement.

2.2 Pricing Commitment

Supplier commits the not-to-exceed pricing provided under the Master Agreement pricing is its lowest available (net to buyer) to Public Agencies nationwide and further commits that if a Participating Public Agency is eligible for lower pricing through a national, state, regional or local or cooperative contract, the Supplier will match such lower pricing to that Participating Public Agency under the Master Agreement.

2.3 Sales Commitment

Supplier commits to aggressively market the Master Agreement as its go to market strategy in this defined sector and that its sales force will be trained, engaged and committed to offering the Master Agreement to Public Agencies through OMNIA Partners nationwide. Supplier commits that all Master Agreement sales will be accurately and timely reported to OMNIA Partners in accordance with the OMNIA Partners Administration Agreement. Supplier also commits its sales force will be compensated, including sales incentives, for sales to Public Agencies under the Master Agreement in a consistent or better manner compared to sales to Public Agencies if the Supplier were not awarded the Master Agreement.

3.0 SUPPLIER RESPONSE

Supplier must supply the following information in order for the Principal Procurement Agency to determine Supplier's qualifications to extend the resulting Master Agreement to Participating Public Agencies through OMNIA Partners.

3.1 Company

- F. Describe any diversity programs or partners supplier does business with and how Participating Agencies may use diverse partners through the Master Agreement.

Indicate how, if at all, pricing changes when using the diversity program. If there are any diversity programs, provide a list of diversity alliances and a copy of their certifications.

- G. Indicate if supplier holds any of the below certifications in any classified areas and include proof of such certification in the response:

Commitment to attendance and participation with OMNIA Partners at national (i.e. NIGP Annual Forum, NPI Conference, etc.), regional (i.e. Regional NIGP Chapter Meetings, Regional Cooperative Summits, etc.) and supplier-specific trade shows, conferences and meetings throughout the term of the Master Agreement
 - v. Commitment to attend, exhibit and participate at the NIGP Annual Forum in an area reserved by OMNIA Partners for partner suppliers. Booth space will be purchased and staffed by Supplier. In addition, Supplier commits to provide reasonable assistance to the overall promotion and marketing efforts for the NIGP Annual Forum, as directed by OMNIA Partners.
 - vi. Design and publication of national and regional advertising in trade publications throughout the term of the Master Agreement
 - vii. Ongoing marketing and promotion of the Master Agreement throughout its term (case studies, collateral pieces, presentations, promotions, etc.)
 - viii. Dedicated OMNIA Partners internet web-based homepage on Supplier's website with:
 - OMNIA Partners standard logo;
 - Copy of original Request for Proposal;
 - Copy of Master Agreement and amendments between Principal Procurement Agency and Supplier;
 - Summary of Products and pricing;
 - Marketing Materials
 - Electronic link to OMNIA Partners' website including the online registration page;

- A dedicated toll-free number and email address for OMNIA Partners
- C. Describe how Supplier will transition any existing Public Agency customers' accounts to the Master Agreement available nationally through OMNIA Partners. Include a list of current cooperative contracts (regional and national) Supplier holds and describe how the Master Agreement will be positioned among the other cooperative agreements.
- D. Acknowledge Supplier agrees to provide its logo(s) to OMNIA Partners and agrees to provide permission for reproduction of such logo in marketing communications and promotions. Acknowledge that use of OMNIA Partners logo will require permission for reproduction, as well.
- E. Confirm Supplier will be proactive in direct sales of Supplier's goods and services to Public Agencies nationwide and the timely follow up to leads established by OMNIA Partners. All sales materials are to use the OMNIA Partners logo. At a minimum, the Supplier's sales initiatives should communicate:
- i. Master Agreement was competitively solicited and publicly awarded by a Principal Procurement Agency
 - ii. Best government pricing
 - iii. No cost to participate
 - iv. Non-exclusive
- F. Confirm Supplier will train its national sales force on the Master Agreement. At a minimum, sales training should include:
- i. Key features of Master Agreement
 - ii. Working knowledge of the solicitation process
 - iii. Awareness of the range of Public Agencies that can utilize the Master Agreement through OMNIA Partners
 - iv. Knowledge of benefits of the use of cooperative contracts
- G. Provide the name, title, email and phone number for the person(s), who will be responsible for:
- i. Executive Support
 - ii. Marketing
 - iii. Sales
 - iv. Sales Support
 - v. Financial Reporting
 - vi. Accounts Payable
 - vii. Contracts
- H. Describe in detail how Supplier's national sales force is structured, including contact information for the highest-level executive in charge of the sales team.

- I. Explain in detail how the sales teams will work with the OMNIA Partners team to implement, grow and service the national program.
- J. Explain in detail how Supplier will manage the overall national program throughout the term of the Master Agreement, including ongoing coordination of marketing and sales efforts, timely new Participating Public Agency account set-up, timely contract administration, etc.
- K. State the amount of Supplier's Public Agency sales for the previous fiscal year. Provide a list of Supplier's top 10 Public Agency customers, the total purchases for each for the previous fiscal year along with a key contact for each.
- L. Describe Supplier's information systems capabilities and limitations regarding order management through receipt of payment, including description of multiple platforms that may be used for any of these functions.
- M. Provide the Contract Sales (as defined in Section 10 of the OMNIA Partners Administration Agreement) that Supplier will guarantee each year under the Master Agreement for the initial three years of the Master Agreement ("Guaranteed Contract Sales").

To the extent Supplier guarantees minimum Contract Sales, the administration fee shall be calculated based on the greater of the actual Contract Sales and the Guaranteed Contract Sales.

- N. Even though it is anticipated many Public Agencies will be able to utilize the Master Agreement without further formal solicitation, there may be circumstances where Public Agencies will issue their own solicitations. The following options are available when responding to a solicitation for Products covered under the Master Agreement.
 - i. Respond with Master Agreement pricing (Contract Sales reported to OMNIA Partners).
 - ii. If competitive conditions require pricing lower than the standard Master Agreement not-to-exceed pricing, Supplier may respond with lower pricing through the Master Agreement. If Supplier is awarded the contract, the sales are reported as Contract Sales to OMNIA Partners under the Master Agreement.
 - iii. Respond with pricing higher than Master Agreement only in the unlikely event that the Public Agency refuses to utilize Master Agreement (Contract Sales are not reported to OMNIA Partners).
 - iv. If alternative or multiple proposals are permitted, respond with pricing higher than Master Agreement, and include Master Agreement as the alternate or additional proposal.

ADMINISTRATION AGREEMENT

THIS ADMINISTRATION AGREEMENT (this “**Agreement**”) is made this ___ day of _____, 20___, between National Intergovernmental Purchasing Alliance Company, a Delaware corporation d/b/a OMNIA Partners, Public Sector (“**OMNIA Partners**”), and _____ (“**Supplier**”).

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the _____ (the “**Principal Procurement Agency**”) has entered into a Master Agreement effective _____, Agreement No _____, by and between the Principal Procurement Agency and Supplier, (as may be amended from time to time in accordance with the terms thereof, the “**Master Agreement**”), as attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by reference as though fully set forth herein, for the purchase of _____ (the “**Product**”);

WHEREAS, said Master Agreement provides that any or all public agencies, including state and local governmental entities, public and private primary, secondary and higher education entities, non-profit entities, and agencies for the public benefit (collectively, “**Public Agencies**”), that register (either via registration on the OMNIA Partners website or execution of a Master Intergovernmental Cooperative Purchasing Agreement, attached hereto as Exhibit B) (each, hereinafter referred to as a “**Participating Public Agency**”) may purchase Product at prices stated in the Master Agreement;

WHEREAS, Participating Public Agencies may access the Master Agreement which is offered through OMNIA Partners to Public Agencies;

WHEREAS, OMNIA Partners serves as the contract administrator of the Master Agreement on behalf of Principal Procurement Agency;

WHEREAS, Principal Procurement Agency desires OMNIA Partners to proceed with administration of the Master Agreement; and

WHEREAS, OMNIA Partners and Supplier desire to enter into this Agreement to make available the Master Agreement to Participating Public Agencies and to set forth certain terms and conditions governing the relationship between OMNIA Partners and Supplier.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the payments to be made hereunder and the mutual covenants contained in this Agreement, OMNIA Partners and Supplier hereby agree as follows:

DEFINITIONS

1. Capitalized terms used in this Agreement and not otherwise defined herein shall have the meanings given to them in the Master Agreement.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

2. The Master Agreement and the terms and conditions contained therein shall apply to this Agreement except as expressly changed or modified by this Agreement. Supplier acknowledges and agrees that the covenants and agreements of Supplier set forth in the solicitation and Supplier’s response thereto resulting in the Master Agreement are incorporated herein and are an integral part hereof.

3. OMNIA Partners shall be afforded all of the rights, privileges and indemnifications afforded to Principal Procurement Agency by or from Supplier under the Master Agreement, and such rights, privileges and indemnifications shall accrue and apply with equal effect to OMNIA Partners, its agents, employees, directors, and representatives under this Agreement including, but not limited to, Supplier's obligation to obtain appropriate insurance.

4. OMNIA Partners shall perform all of its duties, responsibilities and obligations as contract administrator of the Master Agreement on behalf of Principal Procurement Agency as set forth herein, and Supplier hereby acknowledges and agrees that all duties, responsibilities and obligations will be undertaken by OMNIA Partners solely in its capacity as the contract administrator under the Master Agreement.

5. With respect to any purchases by Principal Procurement Agency or any Participating Public Agency pursuant to the Master Agreement, OMNIA Partners shall not be: (i) construed as a dealer, re-marketer, representative, partner or agent of any type of the Supplier, Principal Procurement Agency or any Participating Public Agency; (ii) obligated, liable or responsible for any order for Product made by Principal Procurement Agency or any Participating Public Agency or any employee thereof under the Master Agreement or for any payment required to be made with respect to such order for Product; and (iii) obligated, liable or responsible for any failure by Principal Procurement Agency or any Participating Public Agency to comply with procedures or requirements of applicable law or the Master Agreement or to obtain the due authorization and approval necessary to purchase under the Master Agreement. OMNIA Partners makes no representation or guaranty with respect to any minimum purchases by Principal Procurement Agency or any Participating Public Agency or any employee thereof under this Agreement or the Master Agreement.

6. OMNIA Partners shall not be responsible for Supplier's performance under the Master Agreement, and Supplier shall hold OMNIA Partners harmless from any liability that may arise from the acts or omissions of Supplier in connection with the Master Agreement.

7. WITHOUT LIMITING THE GENERALITY OF THE FOREGOING, OMNIA PARTNERS EXPRESSLY DISCLAIMS ALL EXPRESS OR IMPLIED REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES REGARDING OMNIA PARTNERS' PERFORMANCE AS A CONTRACT ADMINISTRATOR OF THE MASTER AGREEMENT. OMNIA PARTNERS SHALL NOT BE LIABLE IN ANY WAY FOR ANY SPECIAL, INCIDENTAL, INDIRECT, CONSEQUENTIAL, EXEMPLARY, PUNITIVE, OR RELIANCE DAMAGES, EVEN IF OMNIA PARTNERS IS ADVISED OF THE POSSIBILITY OF SUCH DAMAGES.

TERM OF AGREEMENT; TERMINATION

8. This Agreement shall be in effect so long as the Master Agreement remains in effect, provided, however, that the provisions of Sections 3 – 8 and 12 – 23, hereof and the indemnifications afforded by the Supplier to OMNIA Partners in the Master Agreement, to the extent such provisions survive any expiration or termination of the Master Agreement, shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

NATIONAL PROMOTION

9. OMNIA Partners and Supplier shall publicize and promote the availability of the Master Agreement's products and services to Public Agencies and such agencies' employees. Supplier shall require each Public Agency to register its participation in the OMNIA Partners program by either registering on the OMNIA Partners website (www.omniapartners.com/publicsector), or executing a Master Intergovernmental Cooperative Purchasing Agreement prior to processing the Participating Public Agency's first sales order.

Upon request, Supplier shall make available to interested Public Agencies a copy of the Master Agreement and such price lists or quotes as may be necessary for such Public Agencies to evaluate potential purchases.

10. Supplier shall provide such marketing and administrative support as set forth in the solicitation resulting in the Master Agreement, including assisting in development of marketing materials as reasonably requested by Principal Procurement Agency and OMNIA Partners. Supplier shall be responsible for obtaining permission or license of use and payment of any license fees for all content and images Supplier provides to OMNIA Partners or posts on the OMNIA Partners website. Supplier shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless OMNIA Partners for use of all such content and images including copyright infringement claims. Supplier and OMNIA Partners each hereby grant to the other party a limited, revocable, non-transferable, non-sublicensable right to use such party's logo (each, the "**Logo**") solely for use in marketing the Master Agreement. Each party shall provide the other party with the standard terms of use of such party's Logo, and such party shall comply with such terms in all material respects. Both parties shall obtain approval from the other party prior to use of such party's Logo. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the parties understand and agree that except as provided herein neither party shall have any right, title or interest in the other party's Logo. Upon termination of this Agreement, each party shall immediately cease use of the other party's Logo.

ADMINISTRATIVE FEE, REPORTING & PAYMENT

11. An "Administrative Fee" shall be defined and due to OMNIA Partners from Supplier in the amount of ___ percent (___%) ("**Administrative Fee Percentage**") multiplied by the total purchase amount paid to Supplier, less refunds, credits on returns, rebates and discounts, for the sale of products and/or services to Principal Procurement Agency and Participating Public Agencies pursuant to the Master Agreement (as amended from time to time and including any renewal thereof) ("**Contract Sales**"). From time to time the parties may mutually agree in writing to a lower Administrative Fee Percentage for a specifically identified Participating Public Agency's Contract Sales.

12. Supplier shall provide OMNIA Partners with an electronic accounting report monthly, in the format prescribed by OMNIA Partners, summarizing all Contract Sales for each calendar month. The Contract Sales reporting format is provided as Exhibit C ("**Contract Sales Report**"), attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. Contract Sales Reports for each calendar month shall be provided by Supplier to OMNIA Partners by the 10th day of the following month. Failure to provide a Contract Sales Report within the time and manner specified herein shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement and if not cured within thirty (30) days of written notice to Supplier shall be deemed a cause for termination of the Master Agreement, at Principal Procurement Agency's sole discretion, and/or this Agreement, at OMNIA Partners' sole discretion.

13. Administrative Fee payments are to be paid by Supplier to OMNIA Partners at the frequency and on the due date stated in Section 12, above, for Supplier's submission of corresponding Contract Sales Reports. Administrative Fee payments are to be made via Automated Clearing House (ACH) to the OMNIA Partners designated financial institution identified in Exhibit D. Failure to provide a payment of the Administrative Fee within the time and manner specified herein shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement and if not cured within thirty (30) days of written notice to Supplier shall be deemed a cause for termination of the Master Agreement, at Principal Procurement Agency's sole discretion, and/or this Agreement, at OMNIA Partners' sole discretion. All Administrative Fees not paid when due shall bear interest at a rate equal to the lesser of one and one-half percent (1 1/2%) per month or the maximum rate permitted by law until paid in full.

14. Supplier shall maintain an accounting of all purchases made by Participating Public Agencies under the Master Agreement. OMNIA Partners, or its designee, in OMNIA Partners' sole discretion, reserves the right to compare Participating Public Agency records with Contract Sales Reports submitted by Supplier for a period of four (4) years from the date OMNIA Partners receives such report. In addition, OMNIA Partners

may engage a third party to conduct an independent audit of Supplier's monthly reports. In the event of such an audit, Supplier shall provide all materials reasonably requested relating to such audit by OMNIA Partners at the location designated by OMNIA Partners. In the event an underreporting of Contract Sales and a resulting underpayment of Administrative Fees is revealed, OMNIA Partners will notify the Supplier in writing. Supplier will have thirty (30) days from the date of such notice to resolve the discrepancy to OMNIA Partners' reasonable satisfaction, including payment of any Administrative Fees due and owing, together with interest thereon in accordance with Section 13, and reimbursement of OMNIA Partners' costs and expenses related to such audit.

GENERAL PROVISIONS

15. This Agreement, the Master Agreement and the exhibits referenced herein supersede any and all other agreements, either oral or in writing, between the parties hereto with respect to the subject matter hereto and no other agreement, statement, or promise relating to the subject matter of this Agreement which is not contained or incorporated herein shall be valid or binding. In the event of any conflict between the provisions of this Agreement and the Master Agreement, as between OMNIA Partners and Supplier, the provisions of this Agreement shall prevail.

16. If any action at law or in equity is brought to enforce or interpret the provisions of this Agreement or to recover any Administrative Fee and accrued interest, the prevailing party shall be entitled to reasonable attorney's fees and costs in addition to any other relief to which it may be entitled.

17. This Agreement and OMNIA Partners' rights and obligations hereunder may be assigned at OMNIA Partners' sole discretion to an affiliate of OMNIA Partners, any purchaser of any or all or substantially all of the assets of OMNIA Partners, or the successor entity as a result of a merger, reorganization, consolidation, conversion or change of control, whether by operation of law or otherwise. Supplier may not assign its obligations hereunder without the prior written consent of OMNIA Partners.

18. All written communications given hereunder shall be delivered by first-class mail, postage prepaid, or overnight delivery on receipt to the addresses as set forth below.

19. If any provision of this Agreement shall be deemed to be, or shall in fact be, illegal, inoperative or unenforceable, the same shall not affect any other provision or provisions herein contained or render the same invalid, inoperative or unenforceable to any extent whatever, and this Agreement will be construed by limiting or invalidating such provision to the minimum extent necessary to make such provision valid, legal and enforceable.

20. This Agreement may not be amended, changed, modified, or altered without the prior written consent of the parties hereto, and no provision of this Agreement may be discharged or waived, except by a writing signed by the parties. A waiver of any particular provision will not be deemed a waiver of any other provision, nor will a waiver given on one occasion be deemed to apply to any other occasion.

21. This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and shall be binding upon OMNIA Partners, the Supplier and any respective successor and assign thereto; subject, however, to the limitations contained herein.

22. This Agreement will be construed under and governed by the laws of the State of Delaware, excluding its conflicts of law provisions and any action arising out of or related to this Agreement shall be commenced solely and exclusively in the state or federal courts in Williamson County Tennessee.

23. This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which is an original but all of which, together, shall constitute but one and the same instrument. The exchange of copies of this Agreement and of signature pages by facsimile, or by .pdf or similar electronic transmission, will constitute effective execution and delivery of this Agreement as to the parties and may be used in lieu of the original Agreement for all purposes. Signatures of the parties transmitted by facsimile, or by .pdf or similar electronic transmission, will be deemed to be their original signatures for any purpose whatsoever.

MASTER INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATIVE PURCHASING AGREEMENT

This Master Intergovernmental Cooperative Purchasing Agreement (this “**Agreement**”) is entered into by and between those certain government agencies that execute a Principal Procurement Agency Certificate (“**Principal Procurement Agencies**”) with National Intergovernmental Purchasing Alliance Company, a Delaware corporation d/b/a OMNIA Partners, Public Sector and/or Communities Program Management, LLC, a California limited liability company d/b/a U.S. Communities (collectively, “**OMNIA Partners**”) to be appended and made a part hereof and such other public agencies (“**Participating Public Agencies**”) who register to participate in the cooperative purchasing programs administered by OMNIA Partners and its affiliates and subsidiaries (collectively, the “**OMNIA Partners Parties**”) by either registering on the OMNIA Partners website (www.omniapartners.com/publicsector or any successor website), or by executing a copy of this Agreement.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, after a competitive solicitation and selection process by Principal Procurement Agencies, in compliance with their own policies, procedures, rules and regulations, a number of suppliers have entered into “**Master Agreements**” (herein so called) to provide a variety of goods, products and services (“**Products**”) to the applicable Principal Procurement Agency and the Participating Public Agencies;

WHEREAS, Master Agreements are made available by Principal Procurement Agencies through the OMNIA Partners Parties and provide that Participating Public Agencies may purchase Products on the same terms, conditions and pricing as the Principal Procurement Agency, subject to any applicable federal and/or local purchasing ordinances and the laws of the State of purchase; and

WHEREAS, in addition to Master Agreements, the OMNIA Partners Parties may from time to time offer Participating Public Agencies the opportunity to acquire Products through other group purchasing agreements.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises contained in this Agreement, and of the mutual benefits to result, the parties hereby agree as follows:

1. Each party will facilitate the cooperative procurement of Products.
2. The Participating Public Agencies shall procure Products in accordance with and subject to the relevant federal, state and local statutes, ordinances, rules and regulations that govern Participating Public Agency’s procurement practices. The Participating Public Agencies hereby acknowledge and agree that it is the intent of the parties that all provisions of this Agreement and that Principal Procurement Agencies’ participation in the program described herein comply with all applicable laws, including but not limited to the requirements of 42 C.F.R. § 1001.952(j), as may be amended from time to time. The Participating Public Agencies further acknowledge and agree that they are solely responsible for their compliance with all applicable “safe harbor” regulations, including but not limited to any and all obligations to fully and accurately report discounts and incentives.

3. The Participating Public Agency represents and warrants that the Participating Public Agency is not a hospital or other healthcare provider and is not purchasing Products on behalf of a hospital or healthcare provider.

4. The cooperative use of Master Agreements shall be in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Master Agreements, except as modification of those terms and conditions is otherwise required by applicable federal, state or local law, policies or procedures.

5. The Principal Procurement Agencies will make available, upon reasonable request, Master Agreement information which may assist in improving the procurement of Products by the Participating Public Agencies.

6. The Participating Public Agency agrees the OMNIA Partners Parties may provide access to group purchasing organization ("**GPO**") agreements directly or indirectly by enrolling the Participating Public Agency in another GPO's purchasing program provided the purchase of Products through the OMNIA Partners Parties or any other GPO shall be at the Participating Public Agency's sole discretion.

7. The Participating Public Agencies (each a "**Procuring Party**") that procure Products through any Master Agreement or GPO Product supply agreement (each a "**GPO Contract**") will make timely payments to the distributor, manufacturer or other vendor (collectively, "**Supplier**") for Products received in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Master Agreement or GPO Contract, as applicable. Payment for Products and inspections and acceptance of Products ordered by the Procuring Party shall be the exclusive obligation of such Procuring Party. Disputes between Procuring Party and any Supplier shall be resolved in accordance with the law and venue rules of the State of purchase unless otherwise agreed to by the Procuring Party and Supplier.

8. The Procuring Party shall not use this Agreement as a method for obtaining additional concessions or reduced prices for purchase of similar products or services outside of the Master Agreement. Master Agreements may be structured with not-to-exceed pricing, in which cases the Supplier may offer the Procuring Party and the Procuring Party may accept lower pricing or additional concessions for purchase of Products through a Master Agreement.

9. The Procuring Party shall be responsible for the ordering of Products under this Agreement. A non-procuring party shall not be liable in any fashion for any violation by a Procuring Party, and, to the extent permitted by applicable law, the Procuring Party shall hold non-procuring party harmless from any liability that may arise from the acts or omissions of the Procuring Party.

10. WITHOUT LIMITING THE GENERALITY OF THE FOREGOING, THE OMNIA PARTNERS PARTIES EXPRESSLY DISCLAIM ALL EXPRESS OR IMPLIED REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES REGARDING ANY PRODUCT, MASTER AGREEMENT AND GPO CONTRACT. THE OMNIA PARTNERS PARTIES SHALL NOT BE LIABLE IN ANY WAY FOR ANY SPECIAL, INCIDENTAL, INDIRECT, CONSEQUENTIAL, EXEMPLARY, PUNITIVE, OR RELIANCE DAMAGES, EVEN IF THE OMNIA PARTNERS PARTIES ARE ADVISED OF THE POSSIBILITY OF SUCH DAMAGES. FURTHER, THE PROCURING PARTY ACKNOWLEDGES AND AGREES THAT THE OMNIA PARTNERS PARTIES SHALL HAVE NO LIABILITY FOR ANY ACT OR OMISSION BY A SUPPLIER OR OTHER PARTY UNDER A MASTER AGREEMENT OR GPO CONTRACT.

11. This Agreement shall remain in effect until termination by either party giving thirty (30) days' written notice to the other party. The provisions of Paragraphs 6 - 10 hereof shall survive any such termination.

12. This Agreement shall take effect upon (i) execution of the Principal Procurement Agency Certificate, or (ii) registration on the OMNIA Partners website or the execution of this Agreement by a Participating Public Agency, as applicable.

Federal award has the meaning, depending on the context, in either paragraph (a) or (b) of this section:

- (a)(1) The Federal financial assistance that a non-Federal entity receives directly from a Federal awarding agency or indirectly from a pass-through entity, as described in § 200.101 Applicability; or
- (2) The cost-reimbursement contract under the Federal Acquisition Regulations that a non-Federal entity receives directly from a Federal awarding agency or indirectly from a pass-through entity, as described in § 200.101 Applicability.
- (b) The instrument setting forth the terms and conditions. The instrument is the grant agreement, cooperative agreement, other agreement for assistance covered in paragraph (b) of § 200.40 Federal financial assistance, or the cost-reimbursement contract awarded under the Federal Acquisition Regulations.
- (c) Federal award does not include other contracts that a Federal agency uses to buy goods or services from a contractor or a contract to operate Federal government owned, contractor operated facilities (GOCOs).
- (d) See also definitions of Federal financial assistance, grant agreement, and cooperative agreement.

Non-Federal entity means a state, local government, Indian tribe, institution of higher education (IHE), or nonprofit organization that carries out a Federal award as a recipient or subrecipient.

Nonprofit organization means any corporation, trust, association, cooperative, or other organization, not including IHEs, that:

- (a) Is operated primarily for scientific, educational, service, charitable, or similar purposes in the public interest;
- (b) Is not organized primarily for profit; and
- (c) Uses net proceeds to maintain, improve, or expand the operations of the organization.

Obligations means, when used in connection with a non-Federal entity's utilization of funds under a Federal award, orders placed for property and services, contracts and subawards made, and similar transactions during a given period that require payment by the non-Federal entity during the same or a future period.

Pass-through entity means a non-Federal entity that provides a subaward to a subrecipient to carry out part of a Federal program.

Recipient means a non-Federal entity that receives a Federal award directly from a Federal awarding agency to carry out an activity under a Federal program. The term recipient does not include subrecipients.

Simplified acquisition threshold means the dollar amount below which a non-Federal entity may purchase property or services using small purchase methods. A subaward may be provided through any form of legal agreement, including an agreement that the pass-through entity considers a contract.

Subrecipient means a non-Federal entity that receives a subaward from a pass-through entity to carry out part of a Federal program; but does not include an individual that is a beneficiary of such program. A subrecipient may also be a recipient of other Federal awards directly from a Federal awarding agency.

Termination means the ending of a Federal award, in whole or in part at any time prior to the planned end of period of performance.

The following certifications and provisions may be required and apply when Participating Agency expends federal funds for any purchase resulting from this procurement process. Pursuant to 2 C.F.R. § 200.326, all contracts, including small purchases, awarded by the Participating Agency and the Participating Agency's subcontractors shall contain the procurement provisions of Appendix II to Part 200, as applicable.

FEMA SPECIAL CONDITIONS

Awarded Supplier(s) may need to respond to events and losses where products and services are needed for the immediate and initial response to emergency situations such as, but not limited to, water damage, fire damage, vandalism cleanup, biohazard cleanup, sewage decontamination, deodorization, and/or wind damage during a disaster or emergency situation. By submitting a proposal, the Supplier is accepted these FEMA Special Conditions required by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

"Contract" in the below pages under FEMA SPECIAL CONDITIONS is also referred to and defined as the "Master Agreement".

"Contractor" in the below pages under FEMA SPECIAL CONDITIONS is also referred to and defined as "Supplier" or "Awarded Supplier".

Conflicts of Interest

No employee, officer, or agent may participate in the selection, award, or administration of a contract supported by a FEMA award if he or she has a real or apparent conflict of interest. Such a conflict would arise when the employee, officer, or agent, any member of his or her immediate family, his or her partner, or an organization which employs or is about to employ any of these parties, has a financial or other interest in or a tangible personal benefit from a firm considered for award. 2 C.F.R. § 200.318(c)(1); See also Standard Form 424D, ¶ 7; Standard Form 424B, ¶ 3. i. FEMA considers a "financial interest" to be the potential for gain or loss to the employee, officer, or agent, any member of his or her immediate family, his or her partner, or an organization which employs or is about to employ any of these parties as a result of the particular procurement. The prohibited financial interest may arise from ownership of certain financial instruments or investments such as stock, bonds, or real estate, or from a salary, indebtedness, job offer, or similar interest that might be affected by the particular procurement. ii. FEMA considers an "apparent" conflict of interest to exist where an actual conflict does not exist, but where a reasonable person with knowledge of the relevant facts would question the impartiality of the employee, officer, or agent participating in the procurement. c. Gifts. The officers,

employees, and agents of the Participating Public Agency nor the Participating Public Agency ("NFE") must neither solicit nor accept gratuities, favors, or anything of monetary value from contractors or parties to subcontracts. However, NFE's may set standards for situations in which the financial interest is de minimus, not substantial, or the gift is an unsolicited item of nominal value. 2 C.F.R. § 200.318(c)(1). d. Violations. The NFE's written standards of conduct must provide for disciplinary actions to be applied for violations of such standards by officers, employees, or agents of the NFE. 2 C.F.R. § 200.318(c)(1). For example, the penalty for a NFE's employee may be dismissal, and the penalty for a contractor might be the termination of the contract.

Contractor Integrity

A contractor must have a satisfactory record of integrity and business ethics. Contractors that are debarred or suspended as described in Chapter III, ¶ 6.d must be rejected and cannot receive contract awards at any level.

Public Policy

A contractor must comply with the public policies of the Federal Government and state, local government, or tribal government. This includes, among other things, past and current compliance with the:

- a. Equal opportunity and nondiscrimination laws
- b. Five affirmative steps described at 2 C.F.R. § 200.321(b) for all subcontracting under contracts supported by FEMA financial assistance; and FEMA Procurement Guidance June 21, 2016 Page IV- 7
- c. Applicable prevailing wage laws, regulations, and executive orders

Affirmative Steps

For any subcontracting opportunities, Contractor must take the following Affirmative steps:

1. Placing qualified small and minority businesses and women's business enterprises on solicitation lists;
2. Assuring that small and minority businesses, and women's business enterprises are solicited whenever they are potential sources;
3. Dividing total requirements, when economically feasible, into smaller tasks or quantities to permit maximum participation by small and minority businesses, and women's business enterprises;
4. Establishing delivery schedules, where the requirement permits, which encourage participation by small and minority businesses, and women's business enterprises; and
5. Using the services and assistance, as appropriate, of such organizations as the Small Business Administration and the Minority Business Development Agency of the Department of Commerce.

Prevailing Wage Requirements

When applicable, the awarded Contractor (s) and any and all subcontractor(s) agree to comply with all laws regarding prevailing wage rates including the Davis-Bacon Act, applicable to this solicitation and/or Participating Public Agencies. The Participating Public Agency shall notify the Contractor of the applicable pricing/prevailing wage rates and must apply any local wage rates requested. The Contractor and any subcontractor(s) shall comply with the prevailing wage rates set by the Participating Public Agency.

Federal Requirements

If products and services are issued in response to an emergency or disaster recovery the items below, located in this FEMA Special Conditions section of the Federal Funds Certifications, are activated and required when federal funding may be utilized.

2 C.F.R. § 200.326 and 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II, Required Contract Clauses

1. Termination for Convenience:

The right to terminate this Contract for the convenience of the Participating Public Agency is retained by the Participating Public Agency. In the event of a termination for convenience by the Participating Public Agency, the Participating Public Agency shall, at least ten (10) calendar days in advance, deliver written notice of the termination for convenience to Contractor. Upon Contractor's receipt of such written notice, Contractor immediately shall cease the performance of the Work and shall take reasonable and appropriate action to secure and protect the Work then in place. Contractor shall then be paid by the Participating Public Agency, in accordance with the terms and provisions of the Contract Documents, an amount not to exceed the actual labor costs incurred, the actual cost of all materials installed and the actual cost of all materials stored at the project site or away from the project site, as approved in writing by the Participating Public Agency but not yet paid for and which cannot be returned, and actual, reasonable and documented demobilization costs, if any,

paid by Contractor and approved by the Participating Public Agency in connection with the Scope of Work in place which is completed as of the date of termination by the Participating Public Agency and that is in conformance with the Contract Documents, less all amounts previously paid for the Work. No amount ever shall be owed or paid to Contractor for lost or anticipated profits on any part of the Scope of Work not performed or for consequential damages of any kind.

2. Equal Employment Opportunity:

The Participating Public Agency highly encourages Contractors to implement Affirmative Action practices in their employment programs. This means Contractor should not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, pregnancy, sexual orientation, political belief or affiliation, age, disability or genetic information.

During the performance of this contract, the contractor agrees as follows:

(1) The contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin. The contractor will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment, without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following: Employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided by the contracting officer setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.

(2) The contractor will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the contractor, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin.

(3) The contractor will not discharge or in any other manner discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because such employee or applicant has inquired about, discussed, or disclosed the compensation of the employee or applicant or another employee or applicant. This provision shall not apply to instances in which an employee who has access to the compensation information of other employees or applicants as a part of such employee's essential job functions discloses the compensation of such other employees or applicants to individuals who do not otherwise have access to such information, unless such disclosure is in response to a formal complaint or charge, in furtherance of an investigation, proceeding, hearing, or action, including an investigation conducted by the employer, or is consistent with the contractor's legal duty to furnish information.

(4) The contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which it has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding, a notice to be provided by the agency contracting officer, advising the labor union or workers' representative of the contractor's commitments under section 202 of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.

(5) The contractor will comply with all provisions of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.

(6) The contractor will furnish all information and reports required by Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and by the rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to his books, records, and accounts by the contracting agency and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations, and orders.

(7) In the event of the contractor's non-compliance with the nondiscrimination clauses of this contract or with any of such rules, regulations, or orders, this contract may be canceled, terminated or suspended in whole or in part and the contractor may be declared ineligible for further Government contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and such other sanctions may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, or by rule, regulation, or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.

(8) The contractor will include the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (8) in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to section 204 of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor. The contractor will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as may be directed by the Secretary of Labor as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance: *Provided*, however, that in the event the contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such

direction, the contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.

3. "During the performance of this contract, the contractor agrees as follows:

- (1) The contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. The contractor will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following: Employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.
- (2) The contractor will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the contractor, state that all qualified applicants will receive considerations for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, or national origin.
- (3) The contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which he has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding, a notice to be provided advising the said labor union or workers' representatives of the contractor's commitments under this section, and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.
- (4) The contractor will comply with all provisions of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.
- (5) The contractor will furnish all information and reports required by Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and by rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to his books, records, and accounts by the administering agency and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations, and orders.
- (6) In the event of the contractor's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination clauses of this contract or with any of the said rules, regulations, or orders, this contract may be canceled, terminated, or suspended in whole or in part and the contractor may be declared ineligible for further Government contracts or federally assisted construction contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and such other sanctions as may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, or by rule, regulation, or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.
- (7) The contractor will include the portion of the sentence immediately preceding paragraph (1) and the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (7) in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to section 204 of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor. The contractor will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as the administering agency may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions, including sanctions for noncompliance: Provided, however, That in the event a contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction by the administering agency the contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States."

4. Davis Bacon Act and Copeland Anti-Kickback Act.

- a. Applicability of Davis-Bacon Act. The Davis-Bacon Act only applies to the emergency Management Preparedness Grant Program, Homeland Security Grant Program, Nonprofit Security Grant Program,

Tribal Homeland Security Grant Program, Port Security Grant Program, and Transit Security Grant Program. **It does not apply to other FEMA grant and cooperative agreement programs, including the Public Assistance Program.**

- b. All prime construction contracts in excess of \$2,000 awarded by non-Federal entities must include a provision for compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. §§ 3141-3144 and 3146-3148) as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations at 29 C.F.R. Part 5 (Labor Standards Provisions Applicable to Contracts Covering Federally Financed and Assisted Construction)). See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II, ¶ D.
- c. In accordance with the statute, contractors must be required to pay wages to laborers and mechanics at a rate not less than the prevailing wages specified in a wage determination made by the Secretary of Labor. In addition, contractors must be required to pay wages not less than once a week.
- d. The non-Federal entity must place a copy of the current prevailing wage determination issued by the Department of Labor in each solicitation. The decision to award a contract or subcontract must be conditioned upon the acceptance of the wage determination. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the Federal awarding agency.
- e. In contracts subject to the Davis-Bacon Act, the contracts must also include a provision for compliance with the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act (40 U.S.C. § 3145), as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations at 29 C.F.R. Part 3 (Contractors and Subcontractors on Public Building or Public Work Financed in Whole or in Part by Loans or Grants from the United States). The Copeland Anti- Kickback Act provides that each contractor or subrecipient must be prohibited from inducing, by any means, any person employed in the construction, completion, or repair of public work, to give up any part of the compensation to which he or she is otherwise entitled. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to FEMA.
- f. The regulation at 29 C.F.R. § 5.5(a) does provide the required contract clause that applies to compliance with both the Davis-Bacon and Copeland Acts. However, as discussed in the previous subsection, the Davis-Bacon Act does not apply to Public Assistance recipients and subrecipients. **In situations where the Davis-Bacon Act does not apply, neither does the Copeland "Anti-Kickback Act."** However, for purposes of grant programs where both clauses do apply, FEMA requires the following contract clause:

"Compliance with the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act.

- (1) Contractor. The contractor shall comply with 18 U.S.C. § 874, 40U.S.C. § 3145, and the requirements of 29 C.F.R. pt. 3 as may be applicable, which are incorporated by reference into this contract.
- (2) Subcontracts. The contractor or subcontractor shall insert in any subcontracts the clause above and such other clauses as the FEMA may by appropriate instructions require, and also a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime contractor shall be responsible for the compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with all of these contract clauses
- (3) Breach. A breach of the contract clauses above may be grounds for termination of the contract, and for debarment as a contractor and subcontractor as provided in 29 C.F.R. § 5.12."

5. Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act.

- a. Applicability: This requirement applies to all FEMA grant and cooperative agreement programs.
- b. Where applicable (see 40 U.S.C. § 3701), all contracts awarded by the non-Federal entity in excess of \$100,000 that involve the employment of mechanics or laborers must include a provision for compliance with 40 U.S.C. §§ 3702 and 3704, as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations at 29 C.F.R. Part 5. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II, ¶ E.

- c. Under 40 U.S.C. § 3702, each contractor must be required to compute the wages of every mechanic and laborer on the basis of a standard work week of 40 hours. Work in excess of the standard work week is permissible provided that the worker is compensated at a rate of not less than one and a half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of 40 hours in the work week.
- d. The requirements of 40 U.S.C. § 3704 are applicable to construction work and provide that no laborer or mechanic must be required to work in surroundings or under working conditions which are unsanitary, hazardous or dangerous. These requirements do not apply to the purchases of supplies or materials or articles ordinarily available on the open market, or contracts for transportation or transmission of intelligence.
- e. The regulation at 29 C.F.R. § 5.5(b) provides the required contract clause concerning compliance with the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act:

“Compliance with the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act.

- (1) Overtime requirements. No contractor or subcontractor contracting for any part of the contract work which may require or involve the employment of laborers or mechanics shall require or permit any such laborer or mechanic in any workweek in which he or she is employed on such work to work in excess of forty hours in such workweek unless such laborer or mechanic receives compensation at a rate not less than one and one-half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of forty hours in such workweek.
- (2) Violation; liability for unpaid wages; liquidated damages. In the event of any violation of the clause set forth in paragraph (1) of this section the contractor and any subcontractor responsible therefor shall be liable for the unpaid wages. In addition, such contractor and subcontractor shall be liable to the United States (in the case of work done under contract for the District of Columbia or a territory, to such District or to such territory), for liquidated damages. Such liquidated damages shall be computed with respect to each individual laborer or mechanic, including watchmen and guards, employed in violation of the clause set forth in paragraph (1) of this section, in the sum of \$10 for each calendar day on which such individual was required or permitted to work in excess of the standard workweek of forty hours without payment of the overtime wages required by the clause set forth in paragraph (1) of this section.
- (3) Withholding for unpaid wages and liquidated damages. The (write in the name of the Federal agency or the loan or grant recipient) shall upon its own action or upon written request of an authorized representative of the Department of Labor withhold or cause to be withheld, from any moneys payable on account of work performed by the contractor or subcontractor under any such contract or any other Federal contract with the same prime contractor, or any other federally-assisted contract subject to the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act, which is held by the same prime contractor, such sums as may be determined to be necessary to satisfy any liabilities of such contractor or subcontractor for unpaid wages and liquidated damages as provided in the clause set forth in paragraph (2) of this section.
- (4) Subcontracts. The contractor or subcontractor shall insert in any subcontracts the clauses set forth in paragraph (1) through (4) of this section and also a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime contractor shall be responsible for compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with the clauses set forth in paragraphs (1) through (4) of this section.”

6. Rights to Inventions Made Under a Contract or Agreement.

- a. Stafford Act Disaster Grants. This requirement **does not apply to the Public Assistance**, Hazard Mitigation Grant Program, Fire Management Assistance Grant Program, Crisis Counseling Assistance and Training Grant Program, Disaster Case Management Grant Program, and Federal Assistance to Individuals and Households – Other Needs Assistance Grant Program, as

FEMA awards under these programs do not meet the definition of "funding agreement."

- b. If the FEMA award meets the definition of "funding agreement" under 37 C.F.R. § 401.2(a) and the non-Federal entity wishes to enter into a contract with a small business firm or nonprofit organization regarding the substitution of parties, assignment or performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under that "funding agreement," the non-Federal entity must comply with the requirements of 37 C.F.R. Part 401 (Rights to Inventions Made by Nonprofit Organizations and Small Business Firms Under Government Grants, Contracts and Cooperative Agreements), and any implementing regulations issued by FEMA. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II, ¶ F.
 - c. The regulation at 37 C.F.R. § 401.2(a) currently defines "funding agreement" as any contract, grant, or cooperative agreement entered into between any Federal agency, other than the Tennessee Valley Authority, and any contractor for the performance of experimental, developmental, or research work funded in whole or in part by the Federal government. This term also includes any assignment, substitution of parties, or subcontract of any type entered into for the performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under a funding agreement as defined in the first sentence of this paragraph.
7. Clean Air Act and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act. Contracts of amounts in excess of \$150,000 must contain a provision that requires the contractor to agree to comply with all applicable standards, orders, or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. §§ 7401-7671q) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33 U.S.C. §§ 1251-1387). Violations must be reported to FEMA and the Regional Office of the Environmental Protection Agency. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II, ¶ G.
- a. The following provides a sample contract clause concerning compliance for contracts of amounts in excess of \$150,000:

"Clean Air Act
 - (1) The contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 7401 et seq.
 - (2) The contractor agrees to report each violation to the (name of the state agency or local or Indian tribal government) and understands and agrees that the (name of the state agency or local or Indian tribal government) will, in turn, report each violation as required to assure notification to the (name of recipient), Federal Emergency Management Agency, and the appropriate Environmental Protection Agency Regional Office.
 - (3) The contractor agrees to include these requirements in each subcontract exceeding \$150,000 financed in whole or in part with Federal assistance provided by FEMA.
Federal Water Pollution Control Act
 - (1) The contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended, 33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.
 - (2) The contractor agrees to report each violation to the (name of the state agency or local or Indian tribal government) and understands and agrees that the (name of the state agency or local or Indian tribal government) will, in turn, report each violation as required to assure notification to the (name of recipient), Federal Emergency Management Agency, and the appropriate Environmental Protection Agency Regional Office.
 - (3) The contractor agrees to include these requirements in each subcontract exceeding \$150,000 financed in whole or in part with Federal assistance provided by FEMA."
8. Debarment and Suspension.
- a. Applicability: This requirement applies to all FEMA grant and cooperative agreement programs.

- b. Non-federal entities and contractors are subject to the debarment and suspension regulations implementing Executive Order 12549, *Debarment and Suspension* (1986) and Executive Order 12689, *Debarment and Suspension* (1989) at 2 C.F.R. Part 180 and the Department of Homeland Security's regulations at 2 C.F.R. Part 3000 (Non procurement Debarment and Suspension).
- c. These regulations restrict awards, subawards, and contracts with certain parties that are debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded from or ineligible for participation in Federal assistance programs and activities. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II, ¶ H; and *Procurement Guidance for Recipients and Subrecipients Under 2 C.F.R. Part 200 (Uniform Rules): Supplement to the Public Assistance Procurement Disaster Assistance Team (PDAT) Field Manual* Chapter IV, ¶ 6.d, and Appendix C, ¶ 2 [hereinafter *PDAT Supplement*]. A contract award must not be made to parties listed in the SAM Exclusions. SAM Exclusions is the list maintained by the General Services Administration that contains the names of parties debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded by agencies, as well as parties declared ineligible under statutory or regulatory authority other than Executive Order 12549. SAM exclusions can be accessed at www.sam.gov. See 2 C.F.R. § 180.530; *PDAT Supplement*, Chapter IV, ¶ 6.d and Appendix C, ¶ 2.
- d. In general, an "excluded" party cannot receive a Federal grant award or a contract within the meaning of a "covered transaction," to include subawards and subcontracts. This includes parties that receive Federal funding indirectly, such as contractors to recipients and subrecipients. The key to the exclusion is whether there is a "covered transaction," which is any non-procurement transaction (unless excepted) at either a "primary" or "secondary" tier. Although "covered transactions" do not include contracts awarded by the Federal Government for purposes of the non-procurement common rule and DHS's implementing regulations, it does include some contracts awarded by recipients and subrecipient.
- e. Specifically, a covered transaction includes the following contracts for goods or services:
 - (1) The contract is awarded by a recipient or subrecipient in the amount of at least \$25,000.
 - (2) The contract requires the approval of FEMA, regardless of amount.
 - (3) The contract is for federally required audit services.
 - (4) A subcontract is also a covered transaction if it is awarded by the contractor of a recipient or subrecipient and requires either the approval of FEMA or is in excess of \$25,000.
- d. The following provides a debarment and suspension clause. It incorporates an optional method of verifying that contractors are not excluded or disqualified:

"Suspension and Debarment

- (1) This contract is a covered transaction for purposes of 2 C.F.R. pt. 180 and 2 C.F.R. pt. 3000. 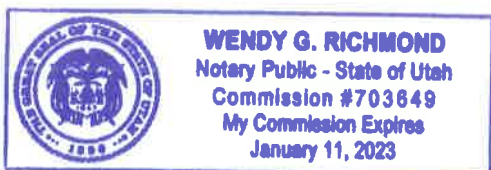

This page provides guidance to public agencies entering into contracts with business entities that are required to file Political Contribution Disclosure forms with the agency. **It is not intended to be provided to contractors.** What follows are instructions on the use of form local units can provide to contractors that are required to disclose political contributions pursuant to N.J.S.A. 19:44A-20.26 (P.L. 2005, c. 271, s.2). Additional information on the process is available in Local Finance Notice 2006-1 (http://www.nj.gov/dca/divisions/dlgs/resources/lfns_2006.html). Please refer back to these instructions for the appropriate links, as the Local Finance Notices include links that are no longer operational.

1. The disclosure is required for all contracts in excess of \$17,500 that are **not awarded** pursuant to a “fair and open” process (N.J.S.A. 19:44A-20.7).
2. Due to the potential length of some contractor submissions, the public agency should consider allowing data to be submitted in electronic form (i.e., spreadsheet, pdf file, etc.). Submissions must be kept with the contract documents or in an appropriate computer file and be available for public access. **The form is worded to accept this alternate submission.** The text should be amended if electronic submission will not be allowed.
3. The submission must be **received from the contractor and** on file at least 10 days prior to award of the contract. Resolutions of award should reflect that the disclosure has been received and is on file.
4. The contractor must disclose contributions made to candidate and party committees covering a wide range of public agencies, including all public agencies that have elected officials in the county of the public agency, state legislative positions, and various state entities. The Division of Local Government Services recommends that contractors be provided a list of the affected agencies. This will assist contractors in determining the campaign and political committees of the officials and candidates affected by the disclosure.
 - a. The Division has prepared model disclosure forms for each county. They can be downloaded from the “County PCD Forms” link on the Pay-to-Play web site at <http://www.nj.gov/dca/divisions/dlgs/programs/lpcl.html#12>. They will be updated from time-to-time as necessary.
 - b. A public agency using these forms **should edit them to properly reflect the correct legislative district(s)**. As the forms are county-based, **they list all legislative districts** in each county. **Districts that do not represent the public agency should be removed from the lists.**
 - c. Some contractors may find it easier to provide a single list that covers all contributions, regardless of the county. These submissions are appropriate and should be accepted.
 - d. The form may be used “as-is”, subject to edits as described herein.
 - e. The “Contractor Instructions” sheet is intended to be provided with the form. It is recommended that the Instructions and the form be printed on the same piece of paper. The form notes that the Instructions are printed on the back of the form; where that is not the case, the text should be edited accordingly.
 - f. The form is a Word document and can be edited to meet local needs, and posted for download on web sites, used as an e-mail attachment, or provided as a printed document.
5. It is recommended that the contractor also complete a “Stockholder Disclosure Certification.” This will assist the local unit in its obligation to ensure that contractor did not make any prohibited contributions to the committees listed on the Business Entity Disclosure Certification in the 12 months prior to the contract (See Local Finance Notice 2006-7 for additional information on this obligation at http://www.nj.gov/dca/divisions/dlgs/resources/lfns_2006.html). A sample Certification form is part of this package and the instruction to complete it is included in the Contractor Instructions. NOTE: This section is not applicable to Boards of Education.

- any candidate committee of a candidate for, or holder of, an elective office:
 - of the public entity awarding the contract
 - of that county in which that public entity is located
 - of another public entity within that county
 - or of a legislative district in which that public entity is located or, when the public entity is a county, of any legislative district which includes all or part of the county

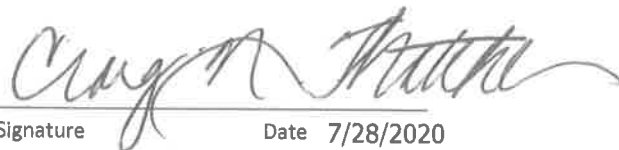

Requirements and qualifications are defined in detail in the Scope of Services Section of this Request for Proposal (RFP). The City seeks a firm that can supply the specified supplies and materials.

National Contract

The City of Tucson, as the Principal Procurement Agency, defined in Attachment A, has partnered with OMNIA Partners to make the resultant contract (also known as the "Master Agreement" in materials distributed by OMNIA Partners) from this solicitation available to other public agencies nationally, including state and local governmental entities, public and private primary, secondary and higher education entities, non-profit entities, and agencies for the public benefit ("Public Agencies"), through OMNIA Partners' cooperative purchasing program. This projection is based on the current annual volumes among the City of Tucson, other Participating Public Agencies anticipated to utilize the resulting Master Agreement to be made available to them through OMNIA Partners, and volume growth into other Public Agencies through a coordinated marketing approach between the Contractor and OMNIA Partners.

SCOPE OF WORK

1. WATER TREATMENT CHEMICALS

A. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

These requirements are broad for the City and Participating Public Agencies utilizing the Master Agreement outside of the City.

Contractor(s) warrant that chemicals provided as a result of this RFP:

- i. Conform to the most current NSF 60/61 and/or ANSI/AWWA standards for water and/or wastewater chemicals;
- ii. Conform to the general chemical specifications contained herein;
- iii. Are suitable for wastewater treatment;
- iv. Are free from adulterants or impurities of any kind; and
- v. The specific warranties of Merchantability and Fitness for a Particular Purpose apply to all orders placed as a result of this solicitation.

If at any time, any chemical supplied by the Contractor(s) fails to conform to the specifications of the utilizing agency, then the Contractor shall at no additional cost to the City or Participating Public Agencies, promptly replace with item that meets specifications.

Contractor(s) understand and acknowledge that the City and other Participating Public Agencies provide services essential to the health and welfare of the public. Failure of a Contractor to provide contracted chemicals may jeopardize the City and Participating Public Agencies' ability to provide timely services, which may affect the health and welfare of the public served by the City and Participating Public Agencies. In the event of product shortages at any point from production to delivery, Contractor(s) agree and affirm that the City and Participating Public Agencies will be given the earliest possible notice and the highest priority for allocation of the chemicals listed herein. To the extent the Contractor(s) must prioritize and/or allocate delivery among its customers, the requirements of the City and Participating Public Agencies under this Master Agreement will be honored before chemicals are provided to a customer with no such obligations.

The Contractor(s) is/are responsible for ensuring that state and federal regulatory compliance is maintained for any chemical and related container furnished under the Master Agreement. Failure to maintain compliance as specified in this paragraph or elsewhere in this RFP shall constitute a breach of contract.

The City and Participating Public Agencies reserve the right to have chemical shipments tested by an independent laboratory. Failure of a shipment to comply with the City and Participating Public Agencies specifications will be sufficient reason for rejection of the shipment. Should a shipment be rejected, the Contractor(s) shall remove all non-conforming chemicals at its sole cost. Upon notice of rejection of a shipment, the Contractor(s) shall furnish another shipment immediately, which shall comply in all respects with the prescribed analysis. In the event a Contractor is unable to promptly furnish the chemical of the acceptable quality; the Participating Public Agencies will obtain the chemical elsewhere. Any reasonable additional cost incurred by the City or Participating Public Agencies will be charged to the Contractor either as a credit against an outstanding invoice or billed to the Contractor for immediate payment.

B. DELIVERY

- a. **DELIVERY TIME:** Chemicals are to be delivered on an as-needed basis to the City of Tucson within two days of order by the operations staff including weekends and holidays, unless otherwise agreed upon at time of order. Sodium hypochlorite solution deliveries are expected to be required twice each week, including weekends and holidays, with the possibility of being required three times per week during high-demand periods. Minimum order quantities will be:
 - i. minimum of 4,000 (four thousand) gallons of 20% sodium hydroxide
 - ii. minimum of 3,500 (three thousand five hundred) gallons of 12% sodium hypochlorite
 - iii. minimum of 2 (two) buckets (55-lb. buckets) of calcium hypochlorite tablets
- b. **DELIVERY INSTRUCTIONS:** The Contractor shall be responsible for unloading chemicals with the supervision of plant personnel (pre-inspection of unloading facility is highly recommended). The Contractor shall provide a weight ticket with each delivery, which shows the weight of the chemical on the truck delivering the bulk shipment and the number of gallons. The Contractor shall provide a delivery truck with the capability of unloading the chemical using the truck air supply. Do not assume an air supply will be provided. Unloading air pressure shall not exceed 20 psi. The driver shall wear all appropriate PPE during the entire unloading process and is required to stay with the vehicle during the entire unloading process. The Contractor shall insure all hoses used in unloading of chemicals are in good condition. Any unauthorized discharge of chemical during the unloading process shall be contained and disposed of by the Contractor in accordance with all safety guidelines.
- c. The City and each Participating Public Agencies will establish their own delivery schedule based upon its own requirements and the Contractor's specified time to deliver after receipt of an order. Failure to honor delivery schedules may result in damages to the City or the Participating Public Agency. The City or Participating Public Agency may at their own option and convenience cure late, partial, or missing deliveries in any manner allowed to them by their terms and conditions that best resolves the shortage. The Contractor(s) is/are liable for any and all reasonable costs incurred by the City or a Participating Public Agency due to such failures and can also recover any additional losses by deducting the outstanding amount from unpaid invoices.

If the Homeland Security Advisory System places the waste/drinking water industry in Codes Orange or Red, all deliveries shall be between the designated hours at the City or Participating Public Agencies for that code status. A Contractor(s) will be required to follow prescribed delivery methods and regulations during the Code Orange or Red status.

The Contractor(s) guarantees the delivery of chemicals within the prescribed delivery schedule of the City and each Participating Public Agency. Failure to deliver at the time specified, or as amended in writing by the City or Participating Public Agency or failure to make replacements of rejected chemicals shall constitute a breach of contract.

Contractor(s) shall comply with all regulations for tank/truck unloading as established by the US Department of Transportation, as well as any State or local requirements. Chemical containers supplied by the Contractor(s) shall be the sole responsibility of the Contractor(s) at all times and in any circumstance. The City and Participating Public Agencies will not pay demurrage or other charges unless the City or Participating Public Agency requests that the Contractor(s) leave the container beyond the delivery date. The control number shall be provided to the treatment plant at the same time as the other required delivery information. A broken seal prior to acceptance of the batch by the City or Participating Public Agency may be cause for refusal of the delivery.

All deliveries under this contract shall be accompanied by a receiving ticket that shall be supported by a minimum of:

- Contractor(s) Name
- Purchase Order and Call Order Number (release number)
- Date of Delivery and Date of Order
- Materials Furnished
 - Quantity, unit price and extension of each item, and total in accordance with the contract
- Name of authorized representative ordering supplies

A Contractor's delivery ticket will be signed in duplicate by the Contractor's designated representative. One copy will be given to the employee signing for the delivery and a second copy will be retained by the Contractor. If required by the City or Participating Public Agency, the Contractor(s) will call the treatment facility prior to delivery and shall provide advance information as required by the City or Participating Public Agency which may include fax a copy of the driver's license, a chemical shipping itinerary sheet with the manifest numbers or other pertinent information.

Agencies have the right to refuse delivery if chemical packaging is damaged, appears to have been tampered with, or is deemed to be a safety hazard or potential safety hazard.

All chemicals will be delivered F.O.B. destination as prescribed by the awarded price/freight schedule. Delivery free period shall be prescribed by the City or Participating Public Agency and hours of delivery will be determined by the City or each Participating Public Agency.

C. MSDS REPORTS

The following MSDS related documentation must be furnished to the City or each Participating Public Agency upon request:

- i. A copy of the most current MSDS Report for each chemical your firm is offering pricing must be provided prior to award.
- ii. National Sanitation Foundation certification for the quoted chemical.
- iii. Chemical certificate of analysis for all chemicals.

D. GENERAL CHEMICAL DESCRIPTIONS

The type and general description of chemicals are provided in this section. These are meant to be an overview of the types of chemicals that are available under the Master Agreement. The City and/or Participating Public Agencies specifics will need to be taken into consideration on a case by case basis upon their agreement to utilize the Master Agreement.

i. Ammonia, Anhydrous

The product furnished shall be chemically pure anhydrous, 99.98% free ammonia, free from impurities, which might cause hazards or stoppage of the operation of standard ammonia feed equipment.

ii. Ammonium Hydroxide

Chemical strength shall be at a minimum 20%

iii. Chlorine

The product furnished shall be chemically pure anhydrous, 99.5% by volume free chlorine, free from impurities, which cause hazards, or stoppage in the operation of standard chlorinating equipment. The Contractor(s) at a minimum shall adhere to the recommendations in the current edition of the Chlorine Institute's Pamphlet 17 Packaging and Shipping Plant Safety and Operational guides for receiving, inspecting, testing and reconditioning chlorine cylinders, ton containers, valves and fusible plugs.

iv. Copper Sulfate

Copper Sulfate shall be standard commercial fine crystal grade of copper sulfate pentahydrate containing at least 99% of $\text{CuSo}_4.5\text{H}_2\text{O}$. The percentage of elemental copper shall not be less than 25% and insoluble matter shall not exceed 0.5%. Certification or quality assurance of mesh size must be provided.

v. Ferric Sulfate

Ferric sulfate solution is a reddish brown liquid that is manufactured from a high purity, mined magnetic iron ore, virgin sulfuric acid, water, and liquid oxygen. The solution must comply with the AWWA standard for ferric sulfate (B406) and is NSF/ANSI Standard 60 certified for use in potable water and municipal and industrial wastewater.

The following types should be provided:

vi. Sodium Fluoride

It is a white odorless material available either as a powder or in the form of crystals of various sizes.

vii. Fluorosilicic Acid

Fluorosilicic Acid is a 20 to 35 percent aqueous solution. It is a colorless to straw yellow, transparent, fuming, corrosive liquid. It has a pungent odor and irritating action on the skin.

viii. Hydorfluosilicic Acid

The product furnished shall not be less than 23% solution Hydorfluosilicic acid H₂SiF₆.

ix. Lime Foundry Quick Grade

The quick lime shall consist essentially of calcium oxide with a lesser amount of magnesium oxide. Material shall contain a minimum of 85% available calcium oxide. The insoluble matter shall not exceed 2% by weight. Material is to be crushed and screened so that none shall be retained on a 5/16" sieve. Not more than 2%, 15%, 80% by weight shall pass a No. 20, No. 14, No. 6 US standard sieve, respectively.

x. Lime Hydrated

The hydrated lime shall be white in color, dry, and the best quality. Water soluble calcium oxide equivalent shall not be less than 68% CaO by weight. Insolubles shall not exceed 5% by weight. The lime shall contain no magnesium in excess of an amount equivalent to 1-1/2% of magnesium oxide MgO.

xi. Pebble Quicklime

The quicklime shall consist essentially of calcium oxide with a lesser amount of magnesium oxide. Quick lime shall be supplied in pulverized form known as granular type. It shall be of best quality, highly reactive, freshly burned, substantially free of core, as dirt or unburned stone. The lime to be used for post lime treatment shall be high calcium granular suitable for conditioning wastewater treatment plant sludge and for pH and alkalinity control in the water treatment process. Material shall contain a minimum of 90% available calcium oxide, and shall be the quality known as "quick slaking", readily disintegrating into a suspension without objectionable amounts of un-dissolved or un-slaked materials. Insoluble matter shall not exceed 2% by weight. It shall not contain floating insoluble particles that are of a nature that cannot be captured and retained by the slaker grit removal system which operates on the basis of gravity separation. For each delivery, Contractor(s) shall provide a certification of analysis of the following: slaking test, objectionable insoluble matter test, gradation test, loss of ignition test and available calcium oxide test. The slaking rate shall be that a temperature of 40°C shall occur in 3 minutes or less and the reaction shall be complete within 6 minutes regardless of the calcium oxide content. Material is to be crushed and screened so that none shall be retained on a 1/4" sieve screen and not more than 25% passing a No. 100 US standard mesh screen and shall contain no mineral or organic substances in quantities that will adversely affect the percent available calcium oxide when tested in accordance with AWWA Standard for Quicklime and Hydrated Lime. The method employed to test materials furnished under this contract shall conform to AWWA Standard B202-93, or the latest revisions, unless otherwise noted by Participating Public Agency.

xii. Polyaluminum Chloride or Polyaluminum Hydroxychlorosulfate

Aluminum salts used in coagulation and sedimentation processes. The Polyaluminum chloride must be liquid in form and easily applied via metering pumps. It shall not contain particles of sand, grit, coke, clay or gelatinous material in sizes that will clog flow regulating valves and appurtenances or accumulate as sludge in the storage tanks. Contractor(s) will be responsible for removing (at their expense) excessive PACL residual accumulations from the storage tanks at the water treatment plants. The polyaluminum chloride (PACL) must be completely water soluble and not significantly depress the treated water pH. The pH of the liquid PACL solution must be greater than 2.3. Aluminum concentration (expressed as % of Al₂O₃) shall exceed 9%. Basicity shall exceed 70%. Sulfates (expressed as % SO₄) shall be minimum of 1.7%. Freezing temperature shall be less than -12°C. Unless Contractor supplies two approved PACL products:

- a. for the winter season with a freezing temperature less than -12°C
- b. for the rest of the contract period with a freezing temperature less than 0°C
Polyaluminum chloride shall not emit any organic odors. Poly aluminum chloride must not contain any amounts of natural or synthetic polymers. Supplier must be capable of providing technical support, including on-site jar testing and training as specified by the plant operators. The Contractor's technical support person(s) shall be available for on-site technical support within 24 hours of notification. Such technical person(s) name, experience related to using PACL, as a primary coagulant in drinking water treatment plants. Home/office address and telephone numbers will need to be provided to each Participating Public Agency for their local area. Contractor must be capable of providing technical support, including on-site jar testing and training as specified by individual plant operations.

xiii. Polyphosphate

For corrosion control and reduction of soluble lead in drinking water

xiv. Potassium Permanganate

Chemical must be free flowing grade with KMnO_4 content of 97% or higher with a bulk density of approximately 100 pounds per cubic foot. The bulk density shall be relatively dust free in handling. The specific gravity will be equal to 1.039 of a 6% solution by weight at $68^{\circ}\text{F}/20^{\circ}\text{C}$. The chemical must be stable in storage for at least three years

xv. Powder Activated Carbon

As prescribed in AWWA Standard B600-05.

xvi. Sodium Hexametaphosphate

The material shall be supplied in granular form-approximately 95% finer than US sieve #4 and 95% larger than US sieve #12.

xvii. Sodium Permanganate

Similar to potassium permanganate, liquid in form NaMnO_4

xviii. Sulfur Dioxide

The product furnished shall be chemically pure 99.98% Sulfur Dioxide, free from adulterants or impurities. Oil and other residue content shall not exceed 60°F (15.5°C) shall not exceed 100 ppm. Acidity shall not exceed 20 ppm. Typical physical and chemical properties shall be:

- a. Vapor Pressure at 60°F (15.5°C) (of gas) 40.3 psi
- b. Specific Gravity (liquid) at 60°F (15.5°C) 1.39
- c. Boiling point at 1 atm 14°F (-10°C)
- d. Solubility in water at 60°F (15.5°C) & 1 atm 11.7% by wt.
- e. Color shall be water white

xix. Sulfuric Acid

Chemical strength shall be 93% and chemical shall be 66° Baum.

xx. Zinc Orthophosphate

The product furnished shall conform to the following content:

- a. Color-water white
- b. Odor-none
- c. Density-11.4
- d. Chlorine demand-none
- e. Zinc Concentration- 3% as Zn +/-0.5%
- f. Phosphate concentration- 33% as PO₄ +/-0.5%
- g. Phosphate to Zinc ration- 11 : 1

xxi. Citric Acid

The product furnished shall conform to the following content:

- a. 50% solution, bulk delivery

xxii. Liquid Oxygen

The product furnished shall conform to the following content:

- a. Oxygen Purity: $\geq 99.5\%$ by weight
- b. Specific Gravity at 1 atmosphere: ≈ 1.14
- c. Dew Point: $< -82^\circ \text{ F}$
- d. Water content: $< 6.6 \text{ ppmv}$
- e. THC (as methane): $< 25 \text{ ppmv}$
- f. Particulate size: $< 10 \text{ micron (filtered)}$
- g. The LOX shall conform to the American Water Works Association (AWWA) Standard B304-08, "Liquid Oxygen for Ozone Generation for Water, Wastewater, and Reclaimed Water Systems".
- h. The LOX shall conform to the Compressed Gas Association (CGA), Specification G-4.3 (most recent edition) for quality verification level of Grade D or better Type II liquid oxygen.
- i. The LOX shall contain no soluble organic or inorganic substances in quantities capable of producing deleterious or injurious effects on health of those coming into contact with the treated water.

E. TECHNICAL SPECIFICATIONS

i. For Aluminum Sulfate (Alum)

a. General

The Contractor(s) shall ensure all loads of Liquid Aluminum Sulfate meet the all requirements of this contract and these specifications. All specifications apply to the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate transferred by the Contractor(s) into the City's or Participating Public Agency's storage vessels.

If an Offeror is responding to the Water Treatment Chemical portion of this solicitation, Offeror shall provide unit cost in \$/lb. of "dry alum". For the purposes of these Specifications, "dry alum" is $\text{Al}_2(\text{SO}_4)_3 \cdot 14\text{H}_2\text{O}$.

The Contractor(s) shall bill by weight of dry alum delivered in lb. The Contractor(s) shall calculate the weight of dry alum delivered in each shipment, and the extended cost of each shipment as follows:

1. wt. of dry alum in ship, in lb = (wt. of Liq. Alum. Sulf. in ship, in lb.) (dry alum conc., in %, by wt.)
2. cost of shipment, in \$ = (wt. of dry alum in shipment, in lb)(unit cost, in \$/lb of dry alum)

The Contractor(s) shall submit invoices to the City or Participating Public Agency for each delivery that include the following (unless specified otherwise by City or Participating Public Agency):

1. date of delivery
2. Bill of Lading Number, or other mechanism to definitively link the invoice to a delivery
3. the net weight of Liquid Aluminum Sulfate delivered in pounds
4. the weight percentage of dry alum in the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate delivered
5. the weight of dry alum in the shipment, in pounds
6. the cost of the shipment, in dollars

b. Compliance with Standards

1. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall conform to the latest revision of the American Water Works Association Standard ANSI/AWWA B403, Aluminum Sulfate - Liquid, Ground, or Lump except as modified or supplemented herein. Non-conformance with ANSI/AWWA B403 shall constitute sufficient grounds for immediate termination of the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate contract for breach.
2. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall be tested and certified as meeting ANSI/NSF Standard 60, Drinking Water Treatment Chemicals - Health Effects by an American National Standards Institute (ANSI) accredited 3rd party certification organization. The Contractor(s) shall provide evidence of this certification prior to award.
3. If ANSI/NSF Standard 60 certification for Liquid Aluminum Sulfate is ever revoked or lapses, the Contractor(s) shall inform the City or Participating Public Agency within 24 hours from the time of verbal or written notification of such revocation or lapse. Loss of this certification shall constitute sufficient grounds for immediate termination of the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate contract for breach.
4. All sampling and testing shall be conducted in accordance with all AWWA/ANSI and ASTM specifications.

c. Chemical Composition/Impurities

1. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall be produced from ore, not from reclaimed aluminum metal.
2. During the life of the Master Agreement, the Contractor(s) shall notify the City or Participating Public Agency of any changes in the manufacturing of the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate that may impact quality. One item of particular concern are manufacturing processes or materials impacting the concentration of impurities. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall be of such clarity as to permit the reading of flow-measuring devices without difficulty.

3. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall contain water-soluble aluminum of not less than 4.23% as Al, or 8.0% as Al₂O₃, by weight. The literature specific gravity of Liquid Aluminum Sulfate at the minimum concentration is 1.32.
4. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall contain less than or equal to 0.2% water-insoluble matter by weight.
5. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall not contain any foreign matter or impurity that may damage or interfere with the City's or Participating Public Agency's equipment, facility, or treatment processes. This includes foreign matter or impurities that are a result of shipment or transfer into the City's or Participating Public Agency's tanks. A Contractor shall reimburse the City or Participating Public Agency(s) for any damages or costs incurred from any foreign material or impurity.
6. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall not contain any impurity in sufficient quantities that causes or may cause, by the City's or Participating Public Agency's normal usage of the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate, the City or Participating Public Agency to violate any existing permit limit or water quality standard, or any limit or standard that may be implemented during the term of this Master Agreement.

Should any permit limit or water quality standard exceedance be determined to be directly attributable to the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate supplied, the Contractor(s) shall immediately take the necessary steps to remove or reduce the containment concentrations to levels satisfactory to the City or Participating Public Agency.

7. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate supplied must not contain any impurities that cause abnormally rapid decomposition and/or gas production in the City's or Participating Public Agency's storage vessels.
8. Notwithstanding any other requirements of this specification, the concentration of certain metals in the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall be limited as follows:

9. The City and Participating Public Agencies reserves the right to add other impurity listings and maximum impurity levels to the existing listings as is required to meet all permit limits and water quality standards.
10. Any water used to make up the liquid Aluminum Sulfate must contain less than 20 µg of per chlorate/L.
11. Before the initial delivery, Contractor(s) shall sample the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate from a typical lot and determine the parameters listed below. The sampling shall conform to industry standard practices and all AWWA/ANSI and ASTM specifications. The analytical laboratory and its sample preparation and analysis methods must be acceptable to the City or Participating Public Agency.
 - A. production lot number,
 - B. date of manufacture,
 - C. specific gravity, at 20 °C
 - D. equivalent aluminum oxide concentration, in % Al₂O₃, by weight,
 - E. aluminum concentration, in % Al, by weight,
 - F. dry alum concentration, , in % Al₂(SO₄)₃•14H₂O, by weight
 - G. free acidity, in % H₂SO₄, or basicity, in % Al₂O₃, by weight
 - H. water-insoluble matter concentration, in %, by weight, and
 - I. all of the metals in the table above, in mg/kg (Note: The reporting detection limit for each metal must be less than or equal to the maximum reporting detection limit listed in the table above.)
12. The Contractor(s) shall supply the requesting Participating Public Agency a detailed report for the sampling and analysis described above. The report shall contain a statement, signed and dated by a management-level representative of the Contractor(s), certifying that the sample supplied to the laboratory was unaltered and representative of the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate (to be) delivered to the City or Participating Public Agency. The report shall also contain evidence that all water sources used to make up the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate contained less than 20 µg per chlorate/L. Contractor(s) may use analytical data generated by the Contractor(s) of the make up water(s) or may collect and analyze samples of the make up water(s). The determination of per chlorate must be performed by the ion chromatographic method.
13. The Contractor(s) shall complete the sampling and analysis process described above once per calendar quarter during the life of the contract and after any changes in the manufacturing of the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate that may impact quality or the concentration of any impurity. This requirement applies to all calendar quarters, including the first calendar quarter. The first calendar quarter will likely not be a full calendar quarter. The lot selected for the first calendar quarter compliance must be different than the lot selected to demonstrate initial compliance. The

Contractor(s) shall submit each calendar quarter's report to the City or Participating Public Agency on or before the last day of that calendar quarter.

14. The Contractor(s) shall submit the initial report before the delivery of the first shipment. Failure of a Contractor to submit a complete report on time is sufficient cause to constitute breach of contract.

d. Delivery Documents

1. The Contractor(s) shall provide a Bill of Lading/Weigh Slip with each delivery indicating the following (or as indicated by City or Participating Public Agency):
 - A. date of delivery,
 - B. bill of Lading/Weigh Slip Number
 - C. gross weight of delivery vehicle and Liquid Aluminum Sulfate in pounds,
 - D. tare weight of delivery vehicle in pounds, and
 - E. net weight of Liquid Aluminum Sulfate in the delivery vehicle in pounds

The dry weight in pounds must match what the dry weight in pounds will be on the Contractor's Invoice.

2. The Contractor(s) shall submit a Certificate of Analysis or Conformance to the City or Participating Public Agency for, and with each delivery. The Contractor(s) shall present the Certificate to the WPCF Operations personnel receiving the shipment. The Certificate shall contain the following lot-specific information:

 - D. equivalent aluminum oxide concentration, in % Al_2O_3 , by weight,
 - E. aluminum concentration, in % Al, by weight,

 - G. free acidity, in % H_2SO_4 , or basicity, in % Al_2O_3 , by weight
 - H. water-insoluble matter concentration, in %, by weight,
3. Failure to supply the required Certificates, or failure to meet any specification described herein, shall be sufficient cause to reject the load.
4. Offeror(s) shall include any charges for the Certificates in their price submitted as part of their response to this solicitation.

e. Delivery Logistics

1. The Contractor(s) shall ship the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate to the City or Participating Public Agency as a "bulk" liquid in a tank truck and shall ensure all shipments comply with all US DOT regulations for marking.
2. Failure of the Contractor(s) to successfully complete a delivery is sufficient grounds to constitute a breach of the contract.

3. The Contractor(s) is/are expected to comply with reasonable requests for emergency deliveries.
4. The Contractor(s) shall measure delivery quantities as the total weight of Liquid Aluminum Sulfate delivered in pounds. Unless otherwise stated by the City or Participating Public Agency: the City and/or the Participating Public Agency shall assume the weight of the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate delivered (transferred to the City or Participating Public Agency) is equal to net weight of the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate in the delivery vehicle; and the Contractor(s) shall also ensure the complete transfer of Liquid Aluminum Sulfate from the delivery vehicle to the City's or Participating Public Agency's storage tanks.
5. The Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall be free from extraneous materials and shall be transported and delivered at such concentration and temperature that no freezing occurs. The liquid shall be suitable for feeding by means of metering pumps and other metering devices constructed of corrosion resistant material.
6. The tank truck must be equipped with a hose of the size and length to connect with the hose to the storage silo. The hose must have a "quick connect" to connect with the fitting on silo hose furnished by the WPCF. All appurtenant valves, pumps, and discharge hoses used for the delivery of Liquid Aluminum Sulfate shall be clean and free from contaminating material. Unclean off-loading equipment shall constitute sufficient grounds for rejection of the load.
7. The tank truck must be sealed and equipped with a self-contained system to deliver all the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate in the load into aboveground storage tanks. The inputs to these tanks are above the height of the output of typical tank trucks. An example of a delivery mechanism is pressurizing the tank with an air pump. The Contractor(s) shall supply all transfer equipment and shall not use the City's or Participating Public Agency's equipment (unless stated otherwise). The transfer mechanics shall be such to allow the driver to complete the task alone under normal circumstances, without the aid of the City or Participating Public Agency. The driver shall follow the instructions posted at the unloading station.
8. The driver shall follow all City or Participating Public Agency's security procedures and requirements for personal protective equipment. The City and Participating Public Agencies reserves the right to reject the delivery based on inadequate or non-conforming information in these documents. All other documentation prescribed by DOT, ICC, other regulatory bodies and statues must be provided when the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate is delivered.
10. The City and Participating Public Agencies reserve the right to subject samples of the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate to analysis to determine if the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate meets the City's specifications. The Contractor(s) shall facilitate the sampling process, when asked. Failing to comply with the City's or Participating Public

Agency's specifications shall constitute grounds for rejection of that load and is sufficient grounds to constitute a breach of contract.

If in the opinion of the City or Participating Public Agency, there is a necessity to remove non-conforming Liquid Aluminum Sulfate, the Contractor(s) shall remove and replace any and all non-conforming Liquid Aluminum Sulfate within 24 hours of being notified without additional cost to the City or Participating Public Agency. Alternatively, the City or Participating Public Agency may remove the Liquid Aluminum Sulfate and the cost for removal and disposal shall be billed to the Contractor(s). The Contractor(s) may not charge for delivered material the City or Participating Public Agency rejects.

11. All employees' drivers and subcontractors will be subject to background checks at the sole cost of the Contractor(s).

ii. For Soda Ash (Sodium Carbonate, Dry)

a. General

1. The Contractor(s) shall ensure all loads of Soda Ash meet the all requirements of this Master Agreement and these specifications. All specifications apply to the Soda Ash transferred by the Contractor(s) into the City's or Participating Public Agency's storage vessels.
2. Offeror(s) submitting for Water Treatment Chemicals, shall submit unit and extended costs in \$/lb. of Na_2CO_3 (dry) as part of their response to this solicitation.
3. Contractor(s) shall bill by weight of Na_2CO_3 delivered in lb.
4. Contractor(s) shall submit invoices to the City or Participating Public Agency for each delivery that include the following:
 - A. date of delivery,
 - B. weight of Soda Ash delivered, in lb.
 - C. unit price, and
 - D. extended cost (lb. x unit price)

b. Compliance with Standards

1. The Soda Ash shall conform to the latest revision of the American Water Works Association Standard ANSI/AWWA B201, Soda Ash, except as modified or supplemented herein. Non-conformance with ANSI/AWWA B201 shall constitute sufficient grounds for immediate termination of the Soda Ash contract for breach
2. The Soda Ash shall be tested and certified as meeting ANSI/NSF Standard 60, Drinking Water Treatment Chemicals - Health Effects by an American National Standards Institute (ANSI) accredited 3rd party certification organization. The Contractor(s) shall provide evidence of this certification prior to award. The Contractor(s) shall supply evidence of this certification throughout the term of the Master Agreement.
 - a. If ANSI/ NSF Standard 60 certification for Soda Ash is ever revoked or lapses, the Contractor(s) shall inform the City or Participating Public Agency within 24 hours from the time of verbal or written notification of such revocation or lapse. Loss of this certification shall constitute sufficient grounds for immediate termination of the Soda Ash contract for breach.

b. All sampling and testing shall be conducted in accordance with all AWWA/ANSI and ASTM specifications.

c. Chemical Composition/Impurities

1. During the life of the contract, the Contractor(s) shall notify the City or Participating Public Agency of any changes in the manufacturing of the Soda Ash that may impact quality. Of particular concern are manufacturing processes or materials impacting the concentration of impurities.
2. The Soda Ash shall be a dry, white powder containing no large lumps or crystals. It shall be free flowing and suitable for storage in closed vessels and for feeding with a standard dry feeder.
3. The apparent density of the Soda Ash shall be 0.9 to 1.1 g/cm³ (56.2 to 68.7 lb/ft³), dense soda ash.
4. The Soda Ash shall contain greater than 99 percent sodium carbonate (Na₂CO₃) by weight.
5. The Soda Ash shall contain less than 0.05 percent insoluble matter by weight.
6. The Soda Ash shall not contain any foreign matter or impurity that may damage or interfere with the City's or Participating Public Agency's equipment, facility, or treatment processes. This includes foreign matter or impurities that are a result of shipment or transfer into the City's or Participating Public Agency's tanks. The Contractor(s) shall reimburse the City or Participating Public Agency for any damages or costs incurred from any foreign material or impurity.
7. The Soda Ash shall not contain any impurity in sufficient quantities that causes or may cause, by the City's or Participating Public Agency's normal usage of the Soda Ash, the City or Participating Public Agency to violate any existing permit limit or water quality standard, or any limit or standard that may be implemented during the term of this contract. Should any permit limit or water quality standard exceedance be determined to be directly attributable to the Soda Ash supplied, the Contractor(s) shall immediately take the necessary steps to remove or reduce the containment concentrations to levels satisfactory to the City or Participating Public Agency.

8. Notwithstanding any other requirements of this specification, the concentration of certain metals in the Soda Ash shall be limited as follows:

The City or Participating Public Agency reserves the right to add specific impurity listings and maximum impurity levels to protect the treatment process and facility, and to meet all permit limits and water quality standards. The Contractor(s) shall make all changes necessary to meet such listings or levels.
10. Before the initial delivery, the Contractor(s) shall sample the Soda Ash from a typical lot and determine the parameters listed below. The sampling shall conform to industry standard practices and all AWWA/ANSI and ASTM specifications. The analytical laboratory and its sample preparation and analysis methods must be acceptable to the City or Participating Public Agency.
- A. Soda Ash production lot or batch number,
 - B. date of manufacture,
 - C. apparent density, in lb/ft³,
 - D. sodium carbonate, Na₂CO₃, in percent, by weight,
 - E. insoluble matter, in percent, by weight, and
 - F. all of the total metals listed in the table above.

Note: The reporting detection limit for each metal must be less than or equal to the maximum listed in the table above.

11. A Contractor shall supply the City or Participating Public Agency a detailed report for the sampling and analysis described above (unless otherwise indicated by City or Participating Public Agency). The report shall contain a statement, signed by a

management-level representative of the Contractor, certifying that the sample supplied to the laboratory was unaltered and representative of the Soda Ash (to be) delivered to the City or Participating Public Agency.

12. A Contractor shall complete the sampling and analysis processes described above once per year in the month of the anniversary of the initial test, and after any changes in the manufacturing of the Soda Ash that may impact quality or the concentration of any impurity.
13. A Contractor shall submit the initial report before the delivery of the first shipment. Failure of the Contractor to submit a complete report on time is sufficient cause to constitute breach of contract.

d. Delivery Documents

1. The Contractor(s) shall provide a Bill of Lading and Weigh Slip with each delivery indicating the following:

3. Failure to supply the required Certificates, or failure to meet any specification described herein, shall be sufficient cause to reject the load.
4. A Contractor responding to the Water Treatment Chemicals portion of this solicitation shall include any charges for the Certificates in their proposal price.

e. Delivery Logistics

1. The Contractor(s) shall measure delivery quantities as the total weight of Soda Ash delivered in pounds. The City or Participating Public Agency shall assume the weight of the Soda Ash delivered (transferred to the City or Participating Public Agency) is equal to net weight of the Soda Ash in the delivery vehicle. The Contractor(s) shall ensure the complete transfer of Soda Ash from the delivery vehicle to the City's or Participating Public Agency's storage tanks.

2. Before unloading, the driver shall notify WPCF Operations personnel that a delivery has arrived on site. The driver shall present the Bill of Lading, Weigh Slips, the Certificate, and any other applicable order/delivery documents to the Operations representative. The City or Participating Public Agency reserves the right to reject the delivery based on inadequate or non-conforming information in these documents. 3. The City or Participating Public Agency reserves the right to subject samples of the Soda Ash collected before the chemical enters the storage tank to analysis to determine if the Soda Ash meets the City's or Participating Public Agency's specifications. The Contractor shall facilitate the sampling process, when asked. Failing to comply with the City's or Participating Public Agency's specifications shall constitute grounds for rejection of that load and is sufficient grounds to constitute a breach of contract. If in the opinion of the City or Participating Public Agency, there is a necessity to remove non-conforming Soda Ash, the Contractor(s) shall remove and replace any and all non-conforming Soda Ash within 24 hours of being notified without additional cost to the City or Participating Public Agency.

Alternatively, the City or Participating Public Agency may remove the Soda Ash and the cost for removal and disposal shall be billed to the Contractor(s). The Contractor may not charge for delivered material the City or Participating Public Agency rejects.

4. The transfer mechanics shall be such to allow the driver to complete the task alone under normal circumstances, without the aid of the City or Participating Public Agency. The driver must follow the instructions posted at the unloading station.
5. The tank truck must be sealed and equipped with a self-contained system to deliver all the Soda Ash in the load into aboveground storage tanks. The inputs to these tanks are above the height of the output of typical tank trucks. An example of a delivery mechanism is pressurizing the tank with an air pump. The Contractor(s) shall supply all transfer equipment. iii. For Sodium Bisulfite

Note: These specifications are for 37.5-40% liquid sodium bisulfite.

a. General

1. All deliveries of liquid sodium bisulfite must conform to the specifications of this contract. All quality specifications apply to the product transferred by the Contractor(s) into the City's or Participating Public Agency's storage vessels.
2. The Contractor(s) shall measure delivery quantities as the total weight of product (solution) delivered in pounds. The Contractor(s) shall bill by weight of NaHSO₃ in pounds. The Contractor(s) shall calculate the weight of NaHSO₃ in each shipment as follows:
 - A. wt. of NaHSO₃ in shipment, in lb = (shipment wt., in lb)(NaHSO₃, in % by wt.)
 - B. cost of shipment, in \$ = (wt. of NaHSO₃ in shipment, in lb)(cost of NaHSO₃, in \$/lb of NaHSO₃)
3. The Successful Supplier(s) shall provide a Bill of Lading and Weigh Slip with each delivery indicating the following:
 - A. Date of delivery
 - B. Gross weight of delivery vehicle and product in pounds
 - C. Tare weight of delivery vehicle in pounds
 - D. Net weight of product in the delivery vehicle in pounds

The City or Participating Public Agency shall assume the weight of the product (solution) delivered (transferred to the City or Participating Public Agency) is equal to net weight of the product in the delivery vehicle. The Contractor(s) shall ensure the complete transfer of product from the delivery vehicle to the City's or Participating Public Agency's storage vessels.

All employees' drivers and subcontractors will be subject to background checks at the sole cost of the Contractor(s).

4. The Contractor shall submit invoices to the City or Participating Public Agency that include the following:
 - A. Date of delivery
 - B. The weight of product (solution) delivered in pounds
 - C. The weight of percentage of NaHSO₃ in the solution delivered
 - D. Calculation of the weight of NaHSO₃ in the shipment, in pounds
 - E. Calculation of the cost of the shipment, in dollars
5. Offeror(s) shall bid unit and extended costs in \$/lb of NaHSO₃

b. Chemical Composition/Impurities

1. The liquid sodium bisulfite shall be clear and shall contain less than or equal to .5% insoluble matter by weight.

2. 37.5-40% liquid sodium bisulfite, the liquid sodium bisulfite shall contain 37.5% to 40% sodium bisulfite (23.1% to 24.69% available sulfur dioxide) by weight. The specific gravity of the liquid sodium bisulfite shall be 1.307 to 1.330 (at 60 °F).

This includes foreign matter that may be present as a result of shipment or transfer from the Contractor's equipment. The Contractor shall reimburse the City or Participating Public Agency for any damages or costs incurred from such foreign material.
6. Should any permit limit or water quality standard exceedance be determined to be directly attributable to the liquid sodium bisulfite supplied, the Contractor shall immediately take the necessary steps to remove or reduce the containment concentrations to levels satisfactory to the City or Participating Public Agency.

8. Notwithstanding any other requirements of this specification, impurities in the liquid sodium bisulfite shall be limited as follows:
 9. Any water used to make up the liquid sodium bisulfite must contain less than 20 µg per chlorate/L.
 10. The Contractor(s) shall ensure all loads of the liquid sodium bisulfite meet the requirements of Items H) and I) above. Before the initial delivery, the Contractor(s) shall sample the liquid sodium bisulfite from a typical lot and determine all the constituents listed in Item I) and specific gravity. The sampling shall conform to industry standard practices. The analytical laboratory and their sample preparation and analysis methods must be acceptable to the City or Participating Public Agency. The reporting units and maximum analytical reporting detection limits are listed in Item H) above.
 11. The Contractor(s) shall supply the City or Participating Public Agency a detailed report for the sampling and analysis described above. The report shall contain a statement, signed by a management-level representative of the Contractor(s), certifying that the sample supplied to the laboratory was unaltered and representative of the typical product (to be) delivered to the City or Participating Public Agency. The report shall also contain evidence that all water sources used to make up the liquid sodium bisulfite contain less than 20 µg per chlorate/L. The Contractor(s) may use analytical data generated by the Contractor of the make up water(s) or the Contractor(s) may collect and analyze samples of the make up water(s). The determination of per chlorate must be performed by the ion chromatographic method.
 12. The Contractor(s) shall complete the sampling and analysis processes described above in Items J) and K) once per calendar quarter during the life of the contract. The requirement applies to all calendar quarters, including the first calendar quarter. The first calendar quarter will likely not be a full calendar quarter. The City or Participating Public Agency reserves the right to subject samples of the liquid sodium bisulfite to analysis to determine if the liquid sodium bisulfite meets the City's or Participating Public Agency's specifications. The Contractor(s) shall facilitate the sampling process, when asked. Failing to comply with the City's or Participating Public Agency's specifications shall constitute grounds for rejection of that load and is sufficient grounds to constitute a breach of contract.

If in the opinion of the City or Participating Public Agency, there is a necessity to remove non-conforming liquid sodium bisulfite, the Contractor shall remove and replace any and all non-conforming liquid sodium bisulfite within 24 hours of being notified without additional cost to the City or Participating Public Agency. Alternatively, the City or Participating Public Agency may remove the liquid sodium bisulfite and the cost for removal and disposal shall be billed to the Contractor(s). The Contractor(s) may not charge for delivered material the City or Participating Public Agency rejects.

11. All employees' drivers and subcontractors will be subject to background checks at the sole cost of the Contractor(s).

 - C. the weight of liquid sodium hypochlorite delivered in pounds.
 - D. calculation of the volume of liquid sodium hypochlorite in the shipment (weight percentage of NaOCL in the liquid sodium hypochlorite delivered).
 - E. calculation of the cost of the shipment in pounds.

4. All sampling and testing shall be conducted in accordance with all AWWA/ANSI and ASTM specifications.

3. Failure to supply the required Certificates, or failure to meet any specification described herein, shall be sufficient cause to reject the load.

The Contractor(s) shall facilitate the sampling process, when asked. Failing to comply with the City's or Participating Public Agency's specifications shall constitute grounds for rejection of that load and is sufficient grounds to constitute a breach of contract. If in the opinion of the City or Participating Public Agency, there is a necessity to remove non-conforming Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite, the Contractor(s) shall remove and replace any and all non-conforming Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite within 24 hours of being notified without additional cost to the City. Alternatively, the City or Participating Public Agency may remove the Liquid Sodium Hypochlorite and the cost for removal and disposal shall be billed to the Contractor(s). 3. The Contractor(s) shall bill by weight of Na₂O (76% basis) delivered in pounds. The Contractor(s) shall calculate the weight of Na₂O (76% basis) delivered in each shipment, and the extended cost of each shipment as follows:
 - A. wt. of Na₂O in shipment = (shipment wt., in lb)(Na₂O, in % by wt.)

2. POLYMERS – LIQUID AND DRY

Contractors(s) who can and will provide Polymers – Liquid and Dry will be required to adhere to all applicable Terms and Conditions required by statutes, as well all rules and regulations governing the purchase, delivery and use of this commodity utilizing Participating Public Agencies.

- i. Contractors(s) warrant that polymer chemicals provided as a result of this RFP:
 - a. Conform to the most current NSF 60/61 and/or ANSI/AWWA standards for water and/or wastewater chemicals
 - b. Conform to the general chemical specifications contained herein
 - c. Are suitable for public drinking water supply and/or waste water treatment
 - d. Are free from adulterants or impurities of any kind, and
 - e. The specific warranties of Merchantability and Fitness for a Particular Purpose apply to all orders placed as a result of this solicitation.
- ii. If at any time, any chemical supplied by the Contractor(s) fails to conform to the specifications of the City or Participating Public Agency, then the Contractor shall at no additional cost to the City or Participating Agency, promptly replace with item that meets specifications.
- iii. Contractor(s) understand and acknowledge that the City and Participating Public Agencies provide services essential to the health and welfare of the public. Failure of a Contractor to provide contracted chemicals may jeopardize the City or Participating Public Agencies ability to provide timely services, which may affect the health and welfare of the public. In the event of product shortages at any level of production to delivery chain, Contractor(s) agree and affirm that the Participating Public Agencies will be given the earliest possible notice and the highest priority for allocation of the chemicals listed herein. To the extent the Contractor(s) must prioritize and/or allocate delivery among its customers, the requirements of the City or Participating Public Agencies under this Master Agreement will be honored before chemicals are provided to a customer with no such obligations
- iv. The Contractor(s) is/are responsible for ensuring that state and federal regulatory compliance is maintained for any chemical and related container furnished under the Master Agreement. Failure to maintain compliance as specific in this paragraph or elsewhere in this solicitation shall constitute a breach of contract.
- v. The City and Participating Public Agencies reserve the right to have chemical shipments tested by an independent laboratory. Failure of a shipment to comply with the agency specification will be sufficient reason for rejection of the shipment. Should a shipment be rejected, the Contractor(s) shall remove all non-conforming chemicals at its sole cost. Upon notice of rejection of a shipment, the Contractor(s) shall furnish another shipment immediately, which shall comply in all respects with the prescribed analysis. In the event the Contractor(s) is/are unable to promptly furnish the chemical of the acceptable quality; the City or Participating Public Agency will obtain the chemical elsewhere. Any reasonable additional cost incurred by the City or Participating Public Agency will be charged to the Contractor(s) either as a credit against an outstanding invoice or billed to the Contractor(s) for immediate payment.

B. DELIVERY

- i. The City and Participating Public Agency will establish its own delivery schedule based upon its own requirements and the Contractor(s) specified time to deliver after receipt of an order. Failure to honor delivery schedules may result in damages to the City or Participating Public Agency. The City and Participating Public Agency may at their own option and convenience cure late, partial, or missing deliveries in any manner allowed

to them by their terms and conditions that best resolves the shortage. The Contractor(s) is/are liable for any and all reasonable costs incurred by the City or Participating Public Agency due to such failures and can also recover any additional losses by deducting the outstanding amount from unpaid invoices.

- ii. If the Homeland Security Advisory System places the waste/drinking water industry in Codes Orange or Red, all deliveries shall be between the designated hours at the City or Participating Public Agency for that code status. All Contractor(s) will be required to follow prescribed delivery methods and regulations during the Code Orange or Red status.
- iii. The Contractor(s) guarantees the delivery of chemicals within the prescribed delivery schedule of the city or Participating Public Agency. Failure to deliver at time specified, or as amended in writing by the City or Participating Public Agency or failure to make replacements of rejected chemicals shall constitute a breach of contract.
- iv. Contractor(s) shall comply with all regulations for tank/truck unloading as established by the US Department of Transportation, as well as any State or local requirements. Chemical containers supplied by the Contractor(s) shall be the sole responsibility of the Contractor(s) at all times and in any circumstance. The City and Participating Public Agencies will not pay demurrage or other charges unless the City or Participating Public Agency requests that the Contractor(s) leave the container beyond the delivery date. The control number shall be provided to the treatment plant at the same time as the other required delivery information. A broken seal prior to acceptance of the batch by the City or Participating Public Agency may be cause for refusal of the delivery.
- v. All deliveries under this contract shall be accompanied by a receiving ticket that shall be supported by a minimum of:
 - a. Contractor(s) Name
 - b. Purchase Order and Call Order Number (release number)
 - c. Date of Delivery and Date of Order
 - d. Materials Furnished
 - e. Quantity, unit price and extension of each item, and total in accordance with the contract
 - f. Name of authorized representative ordering supplies
- vi. A Contractor's delivery ticket will be signed in duplicate by the Contractor designated representative. One copy will be given to the employee signing for the delivery and a second copy will be retained by the Contractor. If required by the City or Participating Public Agency, the Contractor(s) will call the treatment facility prior to delivery and shall fax a copy of the driver's license, and a chemical shipping itinerary sheet which must include the manifest numbers and above referenced information.
- vii. The City and Participating Public Agencies have the right to refuse delivery if chemical packaging is damaged, appears to have been tampered with, or is deemed to be a safety hazard or potential safety hazard.
- viii. All chemicals will be delivered F.O.B. delivered as prescribed by the awarded price/freight schedule. Delivery free period shall be prescribed by the City or Participating Public Agency and hours of delivery will be determined by the City or each Participating Public Agency.

C. MSDS REPORTS

The following MSDS related documentation must be furnished to the City or each Participating Public Agency upon request:

- i. A copy of the most current MSDS Report for each chemical your firm is offering pricing must be provided prior to award.
- ii. National Sanitation Foundation certification for the quoted chemical
- iii. Chemical certificate of analysis for all chemicals

D. GENERAL CHEMICAL DESCRIPTIONS

The type and general description of chemicals are provided in this section. These are meant to be a comprehensive overview of the chemicals that will be covered under the Master Agreement. The City or Participating Public Agency specifics will need to be taken into consideration on a case by case basis upon their agreement to utilize the Master Agreement.

- i. Polymers, Liquid and Dry

Some polymer properties desired in this product are:

- a. High molecular weight
- b. Chlorine resistant
 1. Change density not pH sensitive. Supplied in liquid form
 2. Reduces or eliminates the need for inorganic flocculent chemicals

 7. Ability to be fed full strength, or diluted in-line to the point of application
 8. Evaluation of the polymer's ingredients under OSHA's Hazard Communication Rule 29 CFR 1910.1200 demonstrating none of the ingredients hazardous
 9. Free from monomers
 10. Non-TTHM forming upon being chlorinated, at concentrations encountered in normal water purification

Contractor(s) must be capable of providing technical support, including on-site jar testing and training as specified by individual plant operations.

3. Additional Water Treatment Products and Services

- A. An Offeror may submit and respond with any other products or services related to Water Treatment Products and Services.

4. Complete Product and Service Offering/Balance of Line

1. Each Contractor awarded an item under this solicitation may offer their complete product and service offering/a balance of line for Water Treatment Chemicals & Polymers for all products and services they can provide. Pricing for complete product and service offering/balance of line items

will be determined by a percentage discount off the Contractor's standard pricing or product list. The pricing percentage discount offered must be entered as part of the Price Proposal section of the Offeror's response.

INSTRUCTIONS TO OFFERORS

1. DEFINITION OF KEY WORDS USED IN THE SOLICITATION:

For purposes of this solicitation and subsequent contract, the following definitions shall apply:

City: The City of Tucson, Arizona

Contract: The legal agreement executed between the City and the Contractor/Consultant. The Contract shall include this RFP document incorporated herein by reference, all terms, conditions, specifications, scope of work, Amendments, the Contractor's offer and negotiated items as accepted by the City.

Contractor/Consultant: The individual, partnership, or corporation who, as a result of the competitive solicitation process, is awarded a contract by the City.

Contract Representative: The City employee or employees who have specifically been designated to act as a contact person or persons to the Contractor, and is responsible for monitoring and overseeing the Contractor's performance under this Contract.

Director of Business Services: The contracting authority for the City, authorized to sign contracts and amendments thereto on behalf of the City.

May: Indicates something that is not mandatory but permissible.

Offeror: The individual, partnership, or corporation who submits a proposal in response to a solicitation.

Shall, Will, Must: Indicates a mandatory requirement. Failure to meet these mandatory requirements, if they constitute a substantive requirement, may, at the City's sole discretion, result in the rejection of a proposal as non-responsive.

Should: Indicates something that is recommended but not mandatory. If the Offeror fails to provide recommended information, the City may, at its sole option, ask the Offeror to provide the information or evaluate the proposal without the information.

2. **PRE-PROPOSAL CONFERENCE:** If scheduled, the date and time of a Pre-Proposal conference is indicated on the cover page of this document. Attendance at this conference is not mandatory. Written minutes and/or notes will not be available, therefore attendance is encouraged. If an Offeror is unable to attend the Pre-Proposal Conference questions may be submitted in writing. Offerors are encouraged to submit written questions, via electronic mail at least nine days prior to the Request for Proposal due date to the Contract Officer listed above. The purpose of this conference will be to clarify the contents of this Request for Proposal in order to prevent any misunderstanding of the City's position. Any doubt as to the requirements of this Request for Proposal or any apparent omission or discrepancy should be presented to the City at this conference. The City will then determine the appropriate action necessary, if any, and may issue a written amendment to the Request for Proposal. Oral statements or instructions will not constitute an amendment to this Request for Proposal.

3. **INQUIRIES:** Any question related to the Request for Proposal shall be directed to the Contract Officer whose name appears above. An offeror shall not contact or ask questions of the department for whom the requirement is being procured. The Contract Officer may require any and all questions be submitted in writing. Offerors are encouraged to submit written questions via electronic mail at least nine days prior to the proposal due date. Any correspondence related to a solicitation should refer to the appropriate Request for Proposal number, page and paragraph number. Oral interpretations or clarifications will be without legal effect. Only questions answered by a formal written amendment to the Request for Proposal will be binding.

4. **AMENDMENT OF REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL:** The Offeror shall acknowledge receipt of a Request for Proposal Amendment by signing and submitting the document through the City's online bidding system by the specified due date and time.

5. **FAMILIARIZATION OF SCOPE OF WORK:** Before submitting a proposal, each offeror shall familiarize itself with the Scope of Work, laws, regulations and other factors affecting contract performance. The Offeror shall be responsible for fully understanding the requirements of the subsequent Contract and otherwise satisfy itself as to the expense and difficulties accompanying the fulfillment of contract requirements. The submission of a proposal will constitute a representation of compliance by the Offeror. There will be no subsequent financial adjustment, other than that provided by the subsequent Contract, for lack of such familiarization.

6. PREPARATION OF PROPOSAL:

A. All proposals shall be on the forms provided in this Request for Proposal package. It is permissible to copy these forms as required. Facsimiles or electronic mail proposals shall not be considered.

Offerors who wish to propose modifications to the contract provisions must clearly identify the proposed deviations and any proposed substitute language. The provisions of the Request for Proposal cannot be modified without the express written approval of the Director or his designee. If a proposal or offer is returned with modifications to the contract provisions that are not expressly approved in writing by the Director or his designee, the contract provisions contained in the City's Request for Proposal shall prevail.
- 11. PUBLIC RECORD:** All proposals submitted in response to this Request for Proposal shall become the property of the City and shall become a matter of public record available for review subsequent to the award notification.
- 12. CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION:** The City of Tucson is obligated to abide by all public information laws. If an Offeror believes that any portion of a proposal, offer, specification, protest or correspondence contains information that should be withheld, a statement advising the Contract Officer of this fact should accompany the submission and the information shall be so identified wherever it appears. The City shall review all requests for confidentiality and may provide a written determination to designate specified documents confidential or the request may be denied. Price is not confidential and will not be withheld. If the confidential request is denied, such information shall be disclosed as public information, unless the offeror submits a formal written objection.
- 13. CERTIFICATION:** By signature on the Offer and Acceptance page, solicitation Amendment(s), or cover letter accompanying the submittal documents, Offeror certifies:
- A. The submission of the offer did not involve collusion or other anti-competitive practices.
 - B. The Offeror shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment in violation of Federal or State law.
 - C. The Offeror has not given, offered to give, nor intends to give at any time hereafter, any economic opportunity, future employment, gift, loan, gratuity, special discount, trip, favor, meal or service to a public servant in connection with the submitted offer.
 - D. The Offeror hereby certifies that the individual signing the submittal is an authorized agent for the Offeror and has the authority to bind the Offeror to the Contract.

- 14. WHERE TO SUBMIT PROPOSALS:** Competitive sealed proposals for the specified material or service shall be received electronically by the Business Services Department at <https://www.tucsonaz.gov/bso/> until the date and time cited.

Offerors shall submit their Proposal to the Business Services Department on or before the day and hour set for the Proposal Due Date identified above, as may be modified by amendments to this solicitation. Responses to this solicitation shall only be accepted via electronic submission through the City's online bidding system. - 15. LATE PROPOSALS:** Late proposals will be rejected.

- 16. OFFER AND ACCEPTANCE PERIOD:** In order to allow for an adequate evaluation, the City requires an offer in response to this solicitation to be valid and irrevocable for ninety (90) days after the proposal due date and time.

- 17. WITHDRAWAL OF PROPOSAL:** At any time prior to the specified solicitation due date and time, an offeror may formally withdraw the proposal by logging into the City's online bidding system and withdrawing the proposal they submitted. Telephonic or oral withdrawals shall not be considered.

- 18. DISCUSSIONS:** The City reserves the right to conduct discussions with offerors for the purpose of eliminating minor irregularities, informalities, or apparent clerical mistakes in the proposal in order to clarify an offer and assure full understanding of, and responsiveness to, solicitation requirements.

- 19. TAX OFFSET POLICY:** If applicable, in evaluating price proposals, the City shall include the amount of applicable business privilege tax, except that the amount of the City of Tucson business privilege tax shall not be included in the evaluation.

- 20. CONTRACT NEGOTIATIONS:** Exclusive or concurrent negotiations may be conducted with responsible offeror(s) for the purpose of altering or otherwise changing the conditions, terms and price of the proposed contract unless prohibited. Offerors shall be accorded fair and equal treatment in conducting negotiations and there shall be no disclosure of any information derived from proposals submitted by competing offerors. Exclusive or concurrent negotiations shall not constitute a contract award nor shall it confer any property rights to the successful offeror. In the event the City deems that negotiations are not progressing, the City may formally terminate these negotiations and may enter into subsequent concurrent or exclusive negotiations with the next most qualified firm(s).

III. GENERAL

A. Shortlist:

The City reserves the right to shortlist the offerors on all of the stated criteria. However, the City may determine that shortlisting is not necessary.

B. Interviews:

The City reserves the right to conduct interviews with some or all of the offerors at any point during the evaluation process. However, the City may determine that interviews are not necessary. In the event interviews are conducted, information provided during the interview process shall be taken into consideration when evaluating the stated criteria. The City shall not reimburse the offeror for the costs associated with the interview process.

C. Additional Investigations:

The City reserves the right to make such additional investigations as it deems necessary to establish the competence and financial stability of any offeror submitting a proposal.

D. Prior Experience:

Experiences with the City and entities that evaluation committee members represent and that are not specifically mentioned in the solicitation response may be taken into consideration when evaluating offers.

E. Multiple Awards:

To provide adequate contract coverage, at the City's sole discretion, multiple awards may be made.

SPECIAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. COOPERATIVE PURCHASING: Any Contract resulting from this solicitation shall be for the use of the City of Tucson. In addition, public and nonprofit agencies that have entered into a Cooperative Purchasing Agreement with the City of Tucson's Business Services Department are eligible to participate in any subsequent Contract. See http://www.tucsonprocurement.com/coop_partners.aspx and click on Cooperatives for a list of the public and nonprofit agencies that have currently entered into Cooperative Purchasing Agreements with the City of Tucson. Additionally, this contract is eligible for use by the Strategic Alliance for Volume Expenditures (SAVE) cooperative. See <http://www.mesaaz.gov/home/showdocument?id=23638> for a listing of participating agencies. The parties agree that these lists are subject to change.

Any orders placed to, or services required from, the successful Contractor(s) will be requested by each participating agency. Payment for purchases made under this agreement will be the sole responsibility of each participating agency. The Contractor may negotiate additional expenses incurred as a result of participating agencies' usage of this contract (i.e., freight charges, travel related expenses, etc.). The City shall not be responsible for any disputes arising out of transactions made by others.

The Contractor(s) will provide an electronic copy of the complete Contract to the City of Tucson Business Services Department upon receipt of the Notice of Intent to Award. At the City's request, the successful Contractor(s) may also be requested to provide an electronic copy of the complete Contract to a participating agency.

2. FOB DESTINATION FREIGHT PREPAID: Prices shall be FOB Destination Freight Prepaid to the delivery location designated. Contractor shall retain title and control of all goods until they are delivered and the Contract of coverage has been completed. All risk of transportation and all related charges shall be the responsibility of the Contractor. All claims for visible or concealed damage shall be filed by the Contractor. The City will assist the Contractor in arranging for inspection.

3. INSURANCE:

The Contractor agrees to:

A. Obtain insurance coverage of the types and amount required in this section and keep such insurance coverage in force throughout the life of this contract. All policies will contain an endorsement providing that written notice be given to the City at least thirty (30) calendar days prior to termination, cancellation, or reduction in coverage in any policy.

B. The Commercial General Liability, Commercial Automobile Liability and umbrella policies where applicable will include the City as an additional insured with respect to liability arising out of the performance of this contract. Such additional insured shall be covered to the full limits of liability purchased by the Contractor, even if those limits of liability are in excess of those required by this Contract. The Contractor agrees that the insurance hereunder will be primary and that any insurance carried by the City will be excess and not contributing.

- D. **CLAIMS MADE INSURANCE COVERAGE:** If any or part of the required insurance is written on a claims-made basis, any policy retroactive date must precede the date of the contract and the Contractor must maintain such coverage for a period not less than three (3) years following contract expiration, termination or cancellation.
- E. **ADDITIONAL INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS:** All Policies, excluding Employment Practices Liability and Professional Liability (Errors & Omissions), shall include or be endorsed to include the following provisions:
1. A waiver of subrogation endorsement in favor of the City of Tucson, for losses arising from work performed by or on behalf of the Contractor (Including Worker's Compensation).
 2. The insurance afforded the contractor shall be primary insurance and that any insurance carried by the City of Tucson and its agents, officials or employees shall be excess and not contributory.
 3. Coverage provided by the Contractor shall not be limited to the liability assumed under the indemnification provisions of this Contract.
- F. **NOTICE OF COVERAGE MODIFICATIONS:** Any changes material to compliance with this contract in the insurance policies above shall require (10) days written notice from the contractor to the City of Tucson. Such notice shall be sent directly to the Business Services Department – Procurement Division.
- G. **ACCEPTABILITY OF INSURERS:** Contractors insurance shall have an "A.M. Best" rating of not less than A-VII. The City of Tucson in no way warrants that the required minimum insurer rating is sufficient to protect the Contractor from potential insurer insolvency.

H. VERIFICATION OF COVERAGE: Contractor shall furnish the City of Tucson with certificates of insurance (ACORD form or equivalent approved by the City of Tucson) as required by this Contract. The certificates for each insurance policy are to be signed by an authorized representative.

All certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the City of Tucson before work commences. Each insurance policy required by this Contract must be in effect at or prior to commencement of work and remain in effect for the duration of the contract and two (2) years after completion. Failure to maintain the insurance policies as required by this Contract, or to provide evidence of renewal upon the City's request, is a material breach of contract.

All certificates required by this Contract shall be sent directly to the Business Services Department – Procurement Division.

The City of Tucson project/contract number and project description shall be noted on the certificate of insurance. The City of Tucson reserves the right to require complete copies of all insurance policies required by this Contract at any time.

H. SUBCONTRACTORS: Contractors' certificate(s) shall include all subcontractors as insureds under its policies **or** Contractor shall furnish to the City of Tucson separate certificates and endorsements for each subcontractor. All coverages for subcontractors shall be subject to the minimum requirements identified above.

I. EXCEPTIONS: In the event the Contractor or sub-contractor(s) is/are a public entity, then the Insurance Requirements shall not apply. Such public entity shall provide a Certificate of Self-Insurance.

4. PRICE ADJUSTMENT: The City will review fully documented requests for price adjustment after any Contract has been in effect for one (1) year. Any price adjustment will only be made at the time of Contract renewal and/or extension and will be a factor in the extension review process. The City will determine whether the requested price adjustment or an alternate option, is in the best interest of the City. Any price adjustment will be effective upon the effective date of the Contract extension.

5. TERM AND RENEWAL: The term of the Contract shall commence upon award and shall remain in effect for a period of one (1) year, unless terminated, canceled or extended as otherwise provided herein. The Contractor agrees that the City of Tucson shall have the right, at its sole option, to renew the Contract for four (4) additional one-year periods or portions thereof. In the event that the City exercises such rights, all terms, conditions and provisions of the original Contract shall remain the same and apply during the renewal period with the possible exception of price and minor scope additions and/or deletions.

STANDARD TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. **ADVERTISING:** Contractor shall not advertise or publish information concerning this Contract without prior written consent of the City's Director of Business Services.
2. **AFFIRMATIVE ACTION:** Contractor shall abide by the provisions of the Tucson Procurement Code Chapter 28, Article XII.
3. **AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT:** The Contractor shall comply with all applicable provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act (Public Law 101-336, 42 U.S.C. 12101, et seq.) and applicable Federal regulations under the Act.
4. **APPLICABLE LAW:** This Contract shall be governed, and the City and Contractor shall have all remedies afforded to each, by the Tucson Procurement Code and the law of the State of Arizona. State law claims shall be brought only in Pima County Superior Court.
5. **ASSIGNMENT-DELEGATION:** No right or interest in this Contract shall be assigned by the Contractor without prior written permission of the City, and no delegation of any duty of the Contractor shall be made without prior written permission of the City's Director of Business Services. The City shall not unreasonably withhold approval and shall notify the Contractor of the City's position by written notice.
6. **CHILD/SWEAT-FREE LABOR POLICY:** The Contractor shall comply with all applicable provisions of the United States Federal and State Child Labor and Worker's Right laws and agrees if called upon to affirm in writing, that they, and any subcontractor involved in the provision of goods to the City, are in compliance.
7. **CLEAN UP:** The Contractor shall at all times keep the contract area, including storage areas used by the Contractor, free from accumulation of waste material or rubbish and, prior to completion of the work, remove any rubbish from the premises and all tools, scaffolding, equipment and materials not property of the City. Upon completion of the repair, the Contractor shall leave the work and premises in clean, neat and workmanlike condition.
8. **COMMENCEMENT OF WORK:** The Contractor is cautioned not to commence any billable work or provide any material or service under this Contract until Contractor receives purchase order or is otherwise directed to do so, in writing, by the City.
9. **CONFIDENTIALITY OF RECORDS:** The Contractor shall establish and maintain procedures and controls that are acceptable to the City for the purpose of assuring that no information contained in its records or obtained from the City or from others in carrying out its functions under the Contract shall be used by or disclosed by it, its agents, officers, or employees, except as required to efficiently perform duties under the Contract. Persons requesting such information should be referred to the City. Information pertaining to individual persons shall not be divulged other than to employees or officers of Contractor as needed for the performance of duties under the Contract, unless otherwise agreed to in writing by the City.
10. **CONTRACT AMENDMENTS:** The Business Services Department has the sole authority to:
 - A. Amend the contract or enter into supplemental verbal or written agreements;
 - B. Grant time extensions or contract renewals;
 - C. Otherwise modify the scope or terms and provisions of the contract.

This Contract shall only be modified with the approval of the Business Services Department. Except in the case of a documented emergency, approval must be granted prior to performance. Any contract modification not explicitly approved by the Business Services Department through a written contract amendment or change order is performed at the sole risk of the Contractor and may not be eligible for payment by the City.

11. **CONTRACT:** The Contract shall be based upon the Request for Proposal issued by the City and the Offer submitted by the Contractor in response to the Request for Proposal. The offer shall substantially conform to the terms, conditions, specifications and other requirements set forth within the text of the Request for Proposal. The City reserves the right to clarify any contractual terms with the concurrence of the Contractor; however, any substantial non-conformity in the offer, as determined by the City, shall be deemed non-responsive and the offer rejected. The Contract shall contain the entire agreement between the City of Tucson and the Contractor relating to this requirement and shall prevail over any and all previous agreements, contracts, proposals, negotiations, purchase orders, or master agreements in any form.

- 12. DEFAULT IN ONE INSTALLMENT TO CONSTITUTE TOTAL BREACH:** Contractor shall deliver conforming materials in each installment or lot of this Contract and may not substitute nonconforming materials. Delivery of nonconforming materials, or default of any nature, may constitute breach of the Contract. Noncompliance may be deemed a cause for possible Contract termination.
- 13. DUPLEXED/RECYCLED PAPER:** In accordance with efficient resource procurement and utilization policies adopted by the City of Tucson, the Contractor shall ensure that, whenever practicable, all printed materials produced by the Contractor in the performance of this Contract are duplexed (two-sided copies), printed on recycled paper and labeled as such.
- 14. EQUAL PAY:** The Contractor shall comply with the applicable provisions of the Equal Pay Act of 1963 (Pub.L. 88-38, 29 U.S.C. section 206(d)); Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (Pub.L. 88-352, 42 U.S.C. 2000e *et seq.*; and, the Lily Ledbetter Fair Pay Act of 2009 (Pub.L. 111-2).
- 15. EXCLUSIVE POSSESSION:** All services, information, computer program elements, reports and other deliverables created under this Contract are the sole property of the City of Tucson and shall not be used or released by the Contractor or any other person except with prior written permission by the City.
- 16. FEDERAL IMMIGRATION LAWS AND REGULATIONS:** Contractor warrants that it complies with all Federal Immigration laws and regulations that relate to its employees and complies with A.R.S. § 23-214(A) and that it requires the same compliance of all subcontractors under this Contract. Contractor acknowledges that pursuant to A.R.S. § 41-4401 and effective September 30, 2008, a breach of this warranty is a material breach of this Contract subject to penalties up to and including termination of this Contract. The City retains the legal right to audit the records of the Contractor and inspect the papers of any employee who works for the Contractor to ensure compliance with this warranty and the Contractor shall assist in any such audit. The Contractor shall include the requirements of this paragraph in each contract with subcontractors under this Contract.

If the Contractor or subcontractor warrants that it has complied with the employment verification provisions prescribed by sections 274(a) and 274(b) of the Federal Immigration and Nationality Act and the E-verify requirements prescribed by A.R.S. § 23-214(A), the Contractor or subcontractor shall be deemed to be in compliance with this provision. The City may request proof of such compliance at any time during the term of this Contract by the Contractor and any subcontractor.

- 17. FORCE MAJEURE:** Except for payment of sums due, neither party shall be liable to the other nor deemed in default under this Contract if and to the extent that such party's performance of this Contract is prevented by reason of Force Majeure. The term "Force Majeure" means an occurrence that is beyond the control of the party affected and occurs without its fault or negligence. Force Majeure shall not include late performance by a subcontractor unless the delay arises out of a Force Majeure occurrence in accordance with this Force Majeure term and condition.

If either party is delayed at any time in the progress of the work by Force Majeure, the delayed party shall notify the other party in writing of such delay, as soon as is practical, of the commencement thereof and shall specify the causes of such delay in such notice. Such notice shall be hand-delivered or mailed certified-return receipt and shall make a specific reference to this article, thereby invoking its provisions. The delayed party shall cause such delay to cease as soon as practicable and shall notify the other party in writing when it has done so. The time of completion shall be extended by contract modification for a period of time equal to the time that results or effects of such delay prevent the delayed party from performing in accordance with this Contract.

- 18. GRATUITIES:** The City may, by written notice to the Contractor, terminate this Contract if it is found that gratuities, in the form of entertainment, gifts, meals or otherwise, were offered or given by the Contractor or any agent or representative of the Contractor, to any officer or employee of the City amending, or the making of any determinations with respect to the performing of such Contract. In the event this Contract is terminated by the City pursuant to this provision, the City shall be entitled, in addition to any other rights and remedies, to recover or withhold from the Contractor the amount of the gratuity.
- 19. HUMAN RELATIONS:** Contractor shall abide by the provisions of the Tucson City Code Chapter 28, Article XII.

- 20. INDEMNIFICATION:** To the fullest extent permitted by law, Contractor, its successors, assigns and guarantors, shall pay, defend, indemnify and hold harmless City of Tucson, its agents, representatives, officers, directors, officials and

employees from and against all allegations, demands, proceedings, suits, actions, claims, including claims of patent or copyright infringement, damages, losses, expenses, including but not limited to, attorney fees, court costs, and the cost of appellate proceedings, and all claim adjusting and handling expense, related to, arising from or out of or resulting from any actions, acts, errors, mistakes or omissions caused in whole or part by Contractor relating to work, services and/or products provided in the performance of this Contract, including but not limited to, any Subcontractor or anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them or anyone for whose acts any of them may be liable and any injury or damages claimed by any of Contractor's and Subcontractor's employees. It is agreed that Contractor will be responsible for primary loss investigation, defense and judgment costs where this indemnification is applicable. The Contractor agrees to waive all rights of subrogation against the City of Tucson, its agents, representatives, officers, directors, officials, employees and volunteers for losses arising from the work performed by the Contractor for the City of Tucson.

Contractor is responsible for compliance with the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA), for its employees in accordance with 26 CFR §54. 4980H. Additionally, Contractor is responsible for all applicable IRS reporting requirements related to ACA. If Contractor or any of Contractor's employees is certified to the City as having received a premium tax credit or cost sharing reduction which contributes to or triggers an assessed penalty against the City, or Contractor fails to meet reporting requirements pursuant to section 6056 resulting in a penalty to City, Contractor indemnifies City from and shall pay any assessed tax penalty.

21. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR: It is understood that each party shall act in its individual capacity and not as an agent, employee, partner, joint venturer, or associate of the other. An employee or agent of one party shall not be deemed or construed to be the employee or agent of the other party for any purpose.

The Contractor shall not be entitled to compensation in the form of salaries, holidays, paid vacation, sick days, or pension contributions by the City. The City of Tucson will not provide any insurance coverage to the Contractor, including Worker's Compensation coverage. The Contractor is advised that taxes, social security payments, and other withholdings shall not be withheld from a City payment issued under this Contract and that Contractor should make arrangements to directly pay such expenses. Contractor is responsible for compliance with the Affordable Care Act for Contractor and any of Contractor's employees.

22. INSPECTION AND ACCEPTANCE: All material or service is subject to final inspection and acceptance by the City. Material or service failing to conform to the specifications of this Contract shall be held at the Contractor's risk and may be returned to the Contractor. If returned, all costs are the responsibility of the Contractor. Noncompliance may be deemed a cause for possible Contract termination.

23. INTERPRETATION-PAROL EVIDENCE: This Contract is intended by the parties to be a final expression of their agreement and is intended also as a complete and exclusive statement of the terms of this agreement. No course of prior dealings between the parties and no usage of the trade shall be relevant to supplement or explain any term used in the Contract. Acceptance or consent in the course of performance under this Contract shall not be relevant to determine the meaning of this Contract even though the accepting or consenting party has knowledge of the nature of the performance and the opportunity to object.

24. ISRAEL BOYCOTT DIVESTMENTS: Acceptance of the contract warrants that the vendor is in compliance with A.R.S. § 35-393 and does not participate in a boycott of Israel as that term is defined within A.R.S. § 35-393.

25. LICENSES: Contractor shall maintain in current status all Federal, State, and local licenses and permits required for the operation of the business conducted by the Contractor as applicable to this Contract.

26. LIENS: All materials, services, and other deliverables supplied to the City under this Contract shall be free of all liens other than the security interest. Security interest shall extinguish upon full payment made by the City. Upon the City's request, the Contractor shall provide a formal release of all liens.

27. NO REPLACEMENT OF DEFECTIVE TENDER: Every tender of materials must fully comply with all provisions of this Contract. If a tender is made which does not fully comply, this shall conform to the termination clause set forth within this document.

28. NON-EXCLUSIVE CONTRACT: Any contract resulting from this solicitation shall be awarded with the understanding and agreement that it is for the sole convenience of the City of Tucson. The City reserves the right to obtain like goods or services from another source when necessary.

29. OVERCHARGES BY ANTITRUST VIOLATIONS: The City maintains that, in actual practice, overcharges resulting from antitrust violations are borne by the purchaser. Therefore, to the extent permitted by law, the Contractor hereby assigns to the City any and all claims for such overcharges as to the materials or services used to fulfill the Contract.

30. PAYMENT: The City's preferred method of payment is via credit card. The City will issue a Purchase Order and, in some cases, either provide a credit card for payment at the time of ordering or pay subsequent invoices by credit card upon receipt of goods or services in good order. However, not all City employees will possess a credit card and, therefore, the City reserves the right to make payment by check as it deems necessary.

Unless payment is made by credit card at time of order or point of sale, a separate invoice shall be issued for each shipment of material or service performed, and no payment shall be issued prior to receipt of material or service and correct invoice. The invoice shall not be dated prior to the receipt of goods or completion of services.

The City shall make every effort to process payment for the purchase of materials or services within twenty-one (21) calendar days after receipt of materials or services and a correct invoice.

The Contractor's payment terms shall apply to all purchases and to all payment methods.

31. PROTECTION OF GOVERNMENT PROPERTY: The Contractor shall use reasonable care to avoid damaging existing buildings, equipment, and vegetation (such as trees, shrubs, and grass) on City property. If the Contractor fails to do so and damages such property, the Contractor shall replace or repair the damage at no expense to the City, as determined and approved by the City's Director of Business Services. If the Contractor fails or refuses to make such repair or replacement, the City will determine a cost and the Contractor shall be liable for the cost thereof, which may be deducted from the Contract price.

32. PROVISIONS REQUIRED BY LAW: Each and every provision of law and any clause required by law to be in the Contract shall be read and enforced as though it were included herein, and if through mistake or otherwise any such provision is not inserted, or is not correctly inserted, then upon the application of either party the Contract shall be amended to make such insertion or correction.

33. RECORDS: Internal control over all financial transactions related to this Contract shall be in accordance with sound fiscal policies. Contractor shall maintain books, records, documents, and other evidence directly pertinent to the performance of the Work under this Contract in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and practices consistently applied and other applicable local, state or federal regulations.

Contractor shall, at all times during the term of this Contract and for a period of three years after the completion of this Contract, maintain such records, together with such supporting or underlying documents and materials.

Contractor shall ensure City has these rights with Contractor's employees, agents, assigns, successors, and subcontractors, and the obligations of these rights shall be explicitly included in any subcontracts or agreements formed between the Contractor and any subcontractors to the extent that those subcontracts or agreements relate to fulfillment of the Contractor's obligations to City.

34. RIGHT TO AUDIT: The City and its authorized representatives shall have the right, upon reasonable written notice to Contractor, to cause an audit to be made of the Contractor's books and records which relate to its operations under this Contract. The audit shall be limited to the term of this Contract. The City shall have the right to examine and to make copies of or extracts from all financial and related records (in whatever form they may be kept, whether written, electronic, or other) relating to or pertaining to this Contract kept by or under the control of the Contractor, including, but not limited to those kept by the Contractor, its employees, agents, assigns, successors and subcontractors. Such records shall include, but not be limited to, accounting records, subcontractor records, payment vouchers and invoices.

The Contractor shall at any time requested by City, whether during or after completion of this Contract, and at Contractor's own expense make such records available for inspection and audit (including copies and extracts of records as required) by City. Such records shall be made available to City during normal business hours at the Contractor's office, place of business, an agreed to location, mailed or provided electronically.

If, as a result of such audit, the Contractor is liable to the City for the payment of any sum, Contractor shall promptly pay such sum to the City together with interest thereon at the rate of one percent (1%) per month from the date such

sums should have been paid. Payment shall be made within 90 days from presentation of City's findings to Contractor.

If the audit discovers substantive findings related to fraud, misrepresentation, or non-performance, City may recoup the costs of the audit work from the Contractor. The City's rights under this provision shall survive the expiration or termination of the Contract.

- 35. RIGHT TO ASSURANCE:** Whenever one party to this Contract has reason to question, in good faith, the other party's intent to perform, the former party may demand that the other party give a written assurance of this intent to perform. In the event that a demand is made and no written assurance is given within five (5) days, the demanding party may treat this failure as the other party's intent not to perform and as a cause for possible Contract termination.
- 36. RIGHT TO INSPECT:** The City may, at reasonable times, and at the City's expense, inspect the place of business of a Contractor or subcontractor which is related to the performance of any Contract as awarded or to be awarded.
- 37. RIGHTS AND REMEDIES:** No provision in this document or in the Contractor's proposal shall be construed, expressly or by implication, as a waiver by either party of any existing or future right and/or remedy available by law in the event of any claim, default or breach of contract. The failure of either party to insist upon the strict performance of any term or condition of the Contract, to exercise or delay the exercise of any right or remedy provided in the Contract or by law, or to accept materials or services required by this Contract or by law shall not be deemed a waiver of any right of either party to insist upon the strict performance of the Contract.
- 38. SEVERABILITY:** The provisions of this Contract are severable to the extent that any provision or application held to be invalid shall not affect any other provision or application of the Contract which may remain in effect without the valid provision or application.
- 39. SHIPMENT UNDER RESERVATION PROHIBITED:** No tender of a bill of lading shall operate as a tender of the materials. Non-compliance shall conform to the termination clause set forth within this document.
- 40. SUBCONTRACTS:** No subcontract shall be entered into by the Contractor with any other party to furnish any of the material/service specified herein without the advance written approval of the City's Director of Business Services. All subcontracts shall comply with Federal and State laws and regulations which are applicable to the services covered by the subcontract and shall include all the terms and conditions set forth herein which shall apply with equal force to the subcontract, as if the subcontractor were the Contractor referred to herein. The Contractor is responsible for contract performance whether or not subcontractors are used.
- 41. SUBSEQUENT EMPLOYMENT:** The City may terminate this Contract without penalty or further obligation pursuant to A.R.S. Section 38-511 if any person significantly involved in initiating, negotiating, securing, drafting, or creating the Contract, on behalf of the City, is or becomes, at any time while the Contract or any extension of the Contract is in effect, an employee of, or a contractor to, any other party to this Contract with respect to the subject matter of the Contract. Termination shall be effective when written notice from the City's Director of Business Services is received by the parties to this Contract, unless the notice specifies a later time.
- 42. TERMINATION OF CONTRACT:** This Contract may be terminated at any time by mutual written consent, or by the City, with or without cause, upon giving thirty (30) days written notice. The City, at its convenience, by written notice, may terminate this Contract, in whole or in part. If this Contract is terminated, the City shall be liable only for payment under the payment provisions of this Contract for services rendered and accepted material received by the City before the effective date of termination.

The City reserves the right to terminate the whole or any part of this Contract due to the failure of the Contractor to carry out any term or condition of the Contract. The City will issue a written ten (10) day notice of default to the Contractor for acting or failing to act as specified in any of the following:

In the opinion of the City, the Contractor provides personnel that do not meet the requirements of the Contract;

In the opinion of the City, the Contractor fails to perform adequately the stipulations, conditions or services/specifications required in this Contract;

In the opinion of the City, the Contractor attempts to impose personnel, materials, products or workmanship of an unacceptable quality;

The Contractor fails to furnish the required service and/or product within the time stipulated in the Contract;

In the opinion of the City, the Contractor fails to make progress in the performance of the requirements of the Contract;

The Contractor gives the City a positive indication that the Contractor will not or cannot perform to the requirements of the Contract.

Each payment obligation of the City created by this Contract is conditioned upon the availability of City, State and Federal funds that are appropriated or allocated for the payment of such an obligation. If funds are not allocated by the City and available for the continued purchase of the services and/or materials provided under this Contract, this Contract may be terminated by the City at the end of the period for which funds are available. The City will endeavor to notify the Contractor in the event that continued service will or may be affected by non-appropriation. No penalty shall accrue to the City in the event this provision is exercised, and the City shall not be obligated or liable for any future payments due or for any damages as a result of termination under this paragraph.

43. TITLE AND RISK OF LOSS: The title and risk of loss of material or service shall not pass to the City until the City actually receives the material or service at the point of delivery, unless otherwise provided within this Contract.

44. WARRANTIES: Contractor warrants that all material or service delivered under this Contract shall conform to the specifications of this Contract. Mere receipt of shipment of the material or service specified and any inspection incidental thereto by the City shall not alter or affect the obligations of the Contractor or the rights of the City under the foregoing warranties. Additional warranty requirements may be set forth in this document.

EXHIBIT A

RESPONSE FOR NATIONAL COOPERATIVE CONTRACT

1.0 Scope of National Cooperative Contract

Capitalized terms not otherwise defined herein shall have the meanings given to them in the Master Agreement or in the Administration Agreement between Supplier and OMNIA Partners.

1.1 Requirement

The City of Tucson (hereinafter defined and referred to as “Principal Procurement Agency”), on behalf of itself and the National Intergovernmental Purchasing Alliance Company, a Delaware corporation d/b/a OMNIA Partners, Public Sector (“OMNIA Partners”), is requesting proposals for Water Treatment Chemicals & Polymers. The intent of this Request for Proposal is any contract between Principal Procurement Agency and Supplier resulting from this Request for Proposal (“Master Agreement”) be made available to other public agencies nationally, including state and local governmental entities, public and private primary, secondary and higher education entities, non-profit entities, and agencies for the public benefit (“Public Agencies”), through OMNIA Partners’ cooperative purchasing program. The Principal Procurement Agency has executed a Principal Procurement Agency Certificate with OMNIA Partners, an example of which is included as Exhibit D, and has agreed to pursue the Master Agreement. Use of the Master Agreement by any Public Agency is preceded by their registration with OMNIA Partners as a Participating Public Agency in OMNIA Partners’ cooperative purchasing program. Registration with OMNIA Partners as a Participating Public Agency is accomplished by Public Agencies entering into a Master Intergovernmental Cooperative Purchasing Agreement, an example of which is attached as Exhibit C, and by using the Master Agreement, any such Participating Public Agency agrees that it is registered with OMNIA Partners, whether pursuant to the terms of the Master Intergovernmental Purchasing Cooperative Agreement or as otherwise agreed to. The terms and pricing established in the resulting Master Agreement between the Supplier and the Principal Procurement Agency will be the same as that available to Participating Public Agencies through OMNIA Partners.

All transactions, purchase orders, invoices, payments etc., will occur directly between the Supplier and each Participating Public Agency individually, and neither OMNIA Partners, any Principal Procurement Agency nor any Participating Public Agency, including their respective agents, directors, employees or representatives, shall be liable to Supplier for any acts, liabilities, damages, etc., incurred by any other Participating Public Agency. Supplier is responsible for knowing the tax laws in each state.

This Exhibit A defines the expectations for qualifying Suppliers based on OMNIA Partners’ requirements to market the resulting Master Agreement nationally to Public Agencies. Each section in this Exhibit A refers to the capabilities, requirements, obligations, and prohibitions of competing Suppliers on a national level in order to serve Participating Public Agencies through OMNIA Partners.

These requirements are incorporated into and are considered an integral part of this RFP. OMNIA Partners reserves the right to determine whether or not to make the Master Agreement awarded by the Principal Procurement Agency available to Participating Public Agencies, in its sole and absolute discretion, and any party submitting a response to this RFP acknowledges that

any award by the Principal Procurement Agency does not obligate OMNIA Partners to make the Master Agreement available to Participating Procurement Agencies.

1.2 Marketing, Sales and Administrative Support

During the term of the Master Agreement OMNIA Partners intends to provide marketing, sales, partnership development and administrative support for Supplier pursuant to this section that directly promotes the Supplier's products and services to Participating Public Agencies through multiple channels, each designed to promote specific products and services to Public Agencies on a national basis.

OMNIA Partners will assign the Supplier a Director of Partner Development who will serve as the main point of contact for the Supplier and will be responsible for managing the overall relationship between the Supplier and OMNIA Partners. The Director of Partner Development will work with the Supplier to develop a comprehensive strategy to promote the Master Agreement and will connect the Supplier with appropriate stakeholders within OMNIA Partners including, Sales, Marketing, Contracting, Training, and Operations & Support.

The OMNIA Partners marketing team will work in conjunction with Supplier to promote the Master Agreement to both existing Participating Public Agencies and prospective Public Agencies through channels that may include:

- A. Marketing collateral (print, electronic, email, presentations)
- B. Website
- C. Trade shows/conferences/meetings
- D. Advertising
- E. Social Media

The OMNIA Partners sales teams will work in conjunction with Supplier to promote the Master Agreement to both existing Participating Public Agencies and prospective Public Agencies through initiatives that may include:

- A. Individual sales calls
- B. Joint sales calls
- C. Communications/customer service
- D. Training sessions for Public Agency teams
- E. Training sessions for Supplier teams

The OMNIA Partners contracting teams will work in conjunction with Supplier to promote the Master Agreement to both existing Participating Public Agencies and prospective Public Agencies through:

- A. Serving as the subject matter expert for questions regarding joint powers authority and state statutes and regulations for cooperative purchasing

- B. Training sessions for Public Agency teams
- C. Training sessions for Supplier teams
- D. Regular business reviews to monitor program success
- E. General contract administration

Suppliers are required to pay an administrative fee of 3% of the greater of the Contract Sales under the Master Agreement and Guaranteed Contract Sales under this Request for Proposal. Supplier will be required to execute the OMNIA Partners Administration Agreement (Exhibit B).

1.3 Estimated Volume

The dollar volume purchased under the Master Agreement is estimated to be approximately \$65M annually. While no minimum volume is guaranteed to Supplier, the estimated annual volume is projected based on the current annual volumes among the Principal Procurement Agency, other Participating Public Agencies that are anticipated to utilize the resulting Master Agreement to be made available to them through OMNIA Partners, and volume growth into other Public Agencies through a coordinated marketing approach between Supplier and OMNIA Partners.

1.4 Award Basis

The basis of any contract award resulting from this RFP made by Principal Procurement Agency will, at OMNIA Partners' option, be the basis of award on a national level through OMNIA Partners. If multiple Suppliers are awarded by Principal Procurement Agency under the Master Agreement, those same Suppliers will be required to extend the Master Agreement to Participating Public Agencies through OMNIA Partners. Utilization of the Master Agreement by Participating Public Agencies will be at the discretion of the individual Participating Public Agency. Certain terms of the Master Agreement specifically applicable to the Principal Procurement Agency (e.g. governing law) are subject to modification for each Participating Public Agency as Supplier, such Participating Public Agency and OMNIA Partners shall agree without being in conflict with the Master Agreement. Participating Agencies may request to enter into a separate supplemental agreement to further define the level of service requirements over and above the minimum defined in the Master Agreement (i.e. invoice requirements, order requirements, specialized delivery, diversity requirements such as minority and woman owned businesses, historically underutilized business, governing law, etc.) ("Supplemental Agreement"). It shall be the responsibility of the Supplier to comply, when applicable, with the prevailing wage legislation in effect in the jurisdiction of the Participating Agency. It shall further be the responsibility of the Supplier to monitor the prevailing wage rates as established by the appropriate department of labor for any increase in rates during the term of the Master Agreement and adjust wage rates accordingly. Any supplemental agreement developed as a result of the Master Agreement is exclusively between the Participating Agency and the Supplier (Contract Sales are reported to OMNIA Partners).

All signed Supplemental Agreements and purchase orders issued and accepted by the Supplier may survive expiration or termination of the Master Agreement. Participating Agencies' purchase orders may exceed the term of the Master Agreement if the purchase order is issued prior to the expiration of the Master Agreement. Supplier is responsible for reporting all sales

and paying the applicable administrative fee for sales that use the Master Agreement as the basis for the purchase order, even though Master Agreement may have expired.

1.5 Objectives of Cooperative Program

This RFP is intended to achieve the following objectives regarding availability through OMNIA Partners' cooperative program:

- A. Provide a comprehensive competitively solicited and awarded national agreement offering the Products covered by this solicitation to Participating Public Agencies;
- B. Establish the Master Agreement as the Supplier's primary go to market strategy to Public Agencies nationwide;
- C. Achieve cost savings for Supplier and Public Agencies through a single solicitation process that will reduce the Supplier's need to respond to multiple solicitations and Public Agencies need to conduct their own solicitation process;
- D. Combine the aggregate purchasing volumes of Participating Public Agencies to achieve cost effective pricing.

2.0 REPRESENTATIONS AND COVENANTS

As a condition to Supplier entering into the Master Agreement, which would be available to all Public Agencies, Supplier must make certain representations, warranties and covenants to both the Principal Procurement Agency and OMNIA Partners designed to ensure the success of the Master Agreement for all Participating Public Agencies as well as the Supplier.

2.1 Corporate Commitment

Supplier commits that (1) the Master Agreement has received all necessary corporate authorizations and support of the Supplier's executive management, (2) the Master Agreement is Supplier's primary "go to market" strategy for Public Agencies, (3) the Master Agreement will be promoted to all Public Agencies, including any existing customers, and Supplier will transition existing customers, upon their request, to the Master Agreement, and (4) that the Supplier has read and agrees to the terms and conditions of the Administration Agreement with OMNIA Partners and will execute such agreement concurrent with and as a condition of its execution of the Master Agreement with the Principal Procurement Agency. Supplier will identify an executive corporate sponsor and a separate national account manager within the RFP response that will be responsible for the overall management of the Master Agreement.

2.2 Pricing Commitment

Supplier commits the not-to-exceed pricing provided under the Master Agreement pricing is its lowest available (net to buyer) to Public Agencies nationwide and further commits that if a Participating Public Agency is eligible for lower pricing through a national, state, regional or local or cooperative contract, the Supplier will match such lower pricing to that Participating Public Agency under the Master Agreement.

2.3 Sales Commitment

Supplier commits to aggressively market the Master Agreement as its go to market strategy in this defined sector and that its sales force will be trained, engaged and committed to offering the Master Agreement to Public Agencies through OMNIA Partners nationwide. Supplier commits that all Master Agreement sales will be accurately and timely reported to OMNIA Partners in accordance with the OMNIA Partners Administration Agreement. Supplier also commits its sales force will be compensated, including sales incentives, for sales to Public Agencies under the Master Agreement in a consistent or better manner compared to sales to Public Agencies if the Supplier were not awarded the Master Agreement.

ADMINISTRATION AGREEMENT

THIS ADMINISTRATION AGREEMENT (this “**Agreement**”) is made this ___ day of _____, 20___, between National Intergovernmental Purchasing Alliance Company, a Delaware corporation d/b/a OMNIA Partners, Public Sector (“**OMNIA Partners**”), and _____ (“**Supplier**”).

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the _____ (the “**Principal Procurement Agency**”) has entered into a Master Agreement effective _____, Agreement No _____, by and between the Principal Procurement Agency and Supplier, (as may be amended from time to time in accordance with the terms thereof, the “**Master Agreement**”), as attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by reference as though fully set forth herein, for the purchase of _____ (the “**Product**”);

WHEREAS, said Master Agreement provides that any or all public agencies, including state and local governmental entities, public and private primary, secondary and higher education entities, non-profit entities, and agencies for the public benefit (collectively, “**Public Agencies**”), that register (either via registration on the OMNIA Partners website or execution of a Master Intergovernmental Cooperative Purchasing Agreement, attached hereto as Exhibit B) (each, hereinafter referred to as a “**Participating Public Agency**”) may purchase Product at prices stated in the Master Agreement;

WHEREAS, Participating Public Agencies may access the Master Agreement which is offered through OMNIA Partners to Public Agencies;

WHEREAS, OMNIA Partners serves as the contract administrator of the Master Agreement on behalf of Principal Procurement Agency;

WHEREAS, Principal Procurement Agency desires OMNIA Partners to proceed with administration of the Master Agreement; and

WHEREAS, OMNIA Partners and Supplier desire to enter into this Agreement to make available the Master Agreement to Participating Public Agencies and to set forth certain terms and conditions governing the relationship between OMNIA Partners and Supplier.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the payments to be made hereunder and the mutual covenants contained in this Agreement, OMNIA Partners and Supplier hereby agree as follows:

DEFINITIONS

1. Capitalized terms used in this Agreement and not otherwise defined herein shall have the meanings given to them in the Master Agreement.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

2. The Master Agreement and the terms and conditions contained therein shall apply to this Agreement except as expressly changed or modified by this Agreement. Supplier acknowledges and agrees that the covenants and agreements of Supplier set forth in the solicitation and Supplier’s response thereto resulting in the Master Agreement are incorporated herein and are an integral part hereof.

3. OMNIA Partners shall be afforded all of the rights, privileges and indemnifications afforded to Principal Procurement Agency by or from Supplier under the Master Agreement, and such rights, privileges and indemnifications shall accrue and apply with equal effect to OMNIA Partners, its agents, employees, directors, and representatives under this Agreement including, but not limited to, Supplier's obligation to obtain appropriate insurance.

4. OMNIA Partners shall perform all of its duties, responsibilities and obligations as contract administrator of the Master Agreement on behalf of Principal Procurement Agency as set forth herein, and Supplier hereby acknowledges and agrees that all duties, responsibilities and obligations will be undertaken by OMNIA Partners solely in its capacity as the contract administrator under the Master Agreement.

5. With respect to any purchases by Principal Procurement Agency or any Participating Public Agency pursuant to the Master Agreement, OMNIA Partners shall not be: (i) construed as a dealer, re-marketer, representative, partner or agent of any type of the Supplier, Principal Procurement Agency or any Participating Public Agency; (ii) obligated, liable or responsible for any order for Product made by Principal Procurement Agency or any Participating Public Agency or any employee thereof under the Master Agreement or for any payment required to be made with respect to such order for Product; and (iii) obligated, liable or responsible for any failure by Principal Procurement Agency or any Participating Public Agency to comply with procedures or requirements of applicable law or the Master Agreement or to obtain the due authorization and approval necessary to purchase under the Master Agreement. OMNIA Partners makes no representation or guaranty with respect to any minimum purchases by Principal Procurement Agency or any Participating Public Agency or any employee thereof under this Agreement or the Master Agreement.

6. OMNIA Partners shall not be responsible for Supplier's performance under the Master Agreement, and Supplier shall hold OMNIA Partners harmless from any liability that may arise from the acts or omissions of Supplier in connection with the Master Agreement.

7. WITHOUT LIMITING THE GENERALITY OF THE FOREGOING, OMNIA PARTNERS EXPRESSLY DISCLAIMS ALL EXPRESS OR IMPLIED REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES REGARDING OMNIA PARTNERS' PERFORMANCE AS A CONTRACT ADMINISTRATOR OF THE MASTER AGREEMENT. OMNIA PARTNERS SHALL NOT BE LIABLE IN ANY WAY FOR ANY SPECIAL, INCIDENTAL, INDIRECT, CONSEQUENTIAL, EXEMPLARY, PUNITIVE, OR RELIANCE DAMAGES, EVEN IF OMNIA PARTNERS IS ADVISED OF THE POSSIBILITY OF SUCH DAMAGES.

TERM OF AGREEMENT; TERMINATION

8. This Agreement shall be in effect so long as the Master Agreement remains in effect, provided, however, that the provisions of Sections 3 – 8 and 12 – 23, hereof and the indemnifications afforded by the Supplier to OMNIA Partners in the Master Agreement, to the extent such provisions survive any expiration or termination of the Master Agreement, shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

NATIONAL PROMOTION

9. OMNIA Partners and Supplier shall publicize and promote the availability of the Master Agreement's products and services to Public Agencies and such agencies' employees. Supplier shall require each Public Agency to register its participation in the OMNIA Partners program by either registering on the OMNIA Partners website (www.omniapartners.com/publicsector), or executing a Master Intergovernmental Cooperative Purchasing Agreement prior to processing the Participating Public Agency's first sales order.

Upon request, Supplier shall make available to interested Public Agencies a copy of the Master Agreement and such price lists or quotes as may be necessary for such Public Agencies to evaluate potential purchases.

10. Supplier shall provide such marketing and administrative support as set forth in the solicitation resulting in the Master Agreement, including assisting in development of marketing materials as reasonably requested by Principal Procurement Agency and OMNIA Partners. Supplier shall be responsible for obtaining permission or license of use and payment of any license fees for all content and images Supplier provides to OMNIA Partners or posts on the OMNIA Partners website. Supplier shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless OMNIA Partners for use of all such content and images including copyright infringement claims. Supplier and OMNIA Partners each hereby grant to the other party a limited, revocable, non-transferable, non-sublicensable right to use such party's logo (each, the "**Logo**") solely for use in marketing the Master Agreement. Each party shall provide the other party with the standard terms of use of such party's Logo, and such party shall comply with such terms in all material respects. Both parties shall obtain approval from the other party prior to use of such party's Logo. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the parties understand and agree that except as provided herein neither party shall have any right, title or interest in the other party's Logo. Upon termination of this Agreement, each party shall immediately cease use of the other party's Logo.

ADMINISTRATIVE FEE, REPORTING & PAYMENT

11. An "Administrative Fee" shall be defined and due to OMNIA Partners from Supplier in the amount of ___ percent (___%) ("**Administrative Fee Percentage**") multiplied by the total purchase amount paid to Supplier, less refunds, credits on returns, rebates and discounts, for the sale of products and/or services to Principal Procurement Agency and Participating Public Agencies pursuant to the Master Agreement (as amended from time to time and including any renewal thereof) ("**Contract Sales**"). From time to time the parties may mutually agree in writing to a lower Administrative Fee Percentage for a specifically identified Participating Public Agency's Contract Sales.

12. Supplier shall provide OMNIA Partners with an electronic accounting report monthly, in the format prescribed by OMNIA Partners, summarizing all Contract Sales for each calendar month. The Contract Sales reporting format is provided as Exhibit C ("**Contract Sales Report**"), attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. Contract Sales Reports for each calendar month shall be provided by Supplier to OMNIA Partners by the 10th day of the following month. Failure to provide a Contract Sales Report within the time and manner specified herein shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement and if not cured within thirty (30) days of written notice to Supplier shall be deemed a cause for termination of the Master Agreement, at Principal Procurement Agency's sole discretion, and/or this Agreement, at OMNIA Partners' sole discretion.

13. Administrative Fee payments are to be paid by Supplier to OMNIA Partners at the frequency and on the due date stated in Section 12, above, for Supplier's submission of corresponding Contract Sales Reports. Administrative Fee payments are to be made via Automated Clearing House (ACH) to the OMNIA Partners designated financial institution identified in Exhibit D. Failure to provide a payment of the Administrative Fee within the time and manner specified herein shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement and if not cured within thirty (30) days of written notice to Supplier shall be deemed a cause for termination of the Master Agreement, at Principal Procurement Agency's sole discretion, and/or this Agreement, at OMNIA Partners' sole discretion. All Administrative Fees not paid when due shall bear interest at a rate equal to the lesser of one and one-half percent (1 1/2%) per month or the maximum rate permitted by law until paid in full.

14. Supplier shall maintain an accounting of all purchases made by Participating Public Agencies under the Master Agreement. OMNIA Partners, or its designee, in OMNIA Partners' sole discretion, reserves the right to compare Participating Public Agency records with Contract Sales Reports submitted by Supplier for a period of four (4) years from the date OMNIA Partners receives such report. In addition, OMNIA Partners

may engage a third party to conduct an independent audit of Supplier's monthly reports. In the event of such an audit, Supplier shall provide all materials reasonably requested relating to such audit by OMNIA Partners at the location designated by OMNIA Partners. In the event an underreporting of Contract Sales and a resulting underpayment of Administrative Fees is revealed, OMNIA Partners will notify the Supplier in writing. Supplier will have thirty (30) days from the date of such notice to resolve the discrepancy to OMNIA Partners' reasonable satisfaction, including payment of any Administrative Fees due and owing, together with interest thereon in accordance with Section 13, and reimbursement of OMNIA Partners' costs and expenses related to such audit.

GENERAL PROVISIONS

15. This Agreement, the Master Agreement and the exhibits referenced herein supersede any and all other agreements, either oral or in writing, between the parties hereto with respect to the subject matter hereto and no other agreement, statement, or promise relating to the subject matter of this Agreement which is not contained or incorporated herein shall be valid or binding. In the event of any conflict between the provisions of this Agreement and the Master Agreement, as between OMNIA Partners and Supplier, the provisions of this Agreement shall prevail.

16. If any action at law or in equity is brought to enforce or interpret the provisions of this Agreement or to recover any Administrative Fee and accrued interest, the prevailing party shall be entitled to reasonable attorney's fees and costs in addition to any other relief to which it may be entitled.

17. This Agreement and OMNIA Partners' rights and obligations hereunder may be assigned at OMNIA Partners' sole discretion to an affiliate of OMNIA Partners, any purchaser of any or all or substantially all of the assets of OMNIA Partners, or the successor entity as a result of a merger, reorganization, consolidation, conversion or change of control, whether by operation of law or otherwise. Supplier may not assign its obligations hereunder without the prior written consent of OMNIA Partners.

18. All written communications given hereunder shall be delivered by first-class mail, postage prepaid, or overnight delivery on receipt to the addresses as set forth below.

19. If any provision of this Agreement shall be deemed to be, or shall in fact be, illegal, inoperative or unenforceable, the same shall not affect any other provision or provisions herein contained or render the same invalid, inoperative or unenforceable to any extent whatever, and this Agreement will be construed by limiting or invalidating such provision to the minimum extent necessary to make such provision valid, legal and enforceable.

20. This Agreement may not be amended, changed, modified, or altered without the prior written consent of the parties hereto, and no provision of this Agreement may be discharged or waived, except by a writing signed by the parties. A waiver of any particular provision will not be deemed a waiver of any other provision, nor will a waiver given on one occasion be deemed to apply to any other occasion.

21. This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and shall be binding upon OMNIA Partners, the Supplier and any respective successor and assign thereto; subject, however, to the limitations contained herein.

22. This Agreement will be construed under and governed by the laws of the State of Delaware, excluding its conflicts of law provisions and any action arising out of or related to this Agreement shall be commenced solely and exclusively in the state or federal courts in Williamson County Tennessee.

23. This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which is an original but all of which, together, shall constitute but one and the same instrument. The exchange of copies of this Agreement and of signature pages by facsimile, or by .pdf or similar electronic transmission, will constitute effective execution and delivery of this Agreement as to the parties and may be used in lieu of the original Agreement for all purposes. Signatures of the parties transmitted by facsimile, or by .pdf or similar electronic transmission, will be deemed to be their original signatures for any purpose whatsoever.

MASTER INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATIVE PURCHASING AGREEMENT, EXAMPLE

MASTER INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATIVE PURCHASING AGREEMENT

This Master Intergovernmental Cooperative Purchasing Agreement (this “**Agreement**”) is entered into by and between those certain government agencies that execute a Principal Procurement Agency Certificate (“**Principal Procurement Agencies**”) with National Intergovernmental Purchasing Alliance Company, a Delaware corporation d/b/a OMNIA Partners, Public Sector and/or Communities Program Management, LLC, a California limited liability company d/b/a U.S. Communities (collectively, “**OMNIA Partners**”) to be appended and made a part hereof and such other public agencies (“**Participating Public Agencies**”) who register to participate in the cooperative purchasing programs administered by OMNIA Partners and its affiliates and subsidiaries (collectively, the “**OMNIA Partners Parties**”) by either registering on the OMNIA Partners website (www.omniapartners.com/publicsector or any successor website), or by executing a copy of this Agreement.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, after a competitive solicitation and selection process by Principal Procurement Agencies, in compliance with their own policies, procedures, rules and regulations, a number of suppliers have entered into “**Master Agreements**” (herein so called) to provide a variety of goods, products and services (“**Products**”) to the applicable Principal Procurement Agency and the Participating Public Agencies;

WHEREAS, Master Agreements are made available by Principal Procurement Agencies through the OMNIA Partners Parties and provide that Participating Public Agencies may purchase Products on the same terms, conditions and pricing as the Principal Procurement Agency, subject to any applicable federal and/or local purchasing ordinances and the laws of the State of purchase; and

WHEREAS, in addition to Master Agreements, the OMNIA Partners Parties may from time to time offer Participating Public Agencies the opportunity to acquire Products through other group purchasing agreements.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises contained in this Agreement, and of the mutual benefits to result, the parties hereby agree as follows:

1. Each party will facilitate the cooperative procurement of Products.
2. The Participating Public Agencies shall procure Products in accordance with and subject to the relevant federal, state and local statutes, ordinances, rules and regulations that govern Participating Public Agency’s procurement practices. The Participating Public Agencies hereby acknowledge and agree that it is the intent of the parties that all provisions of this Agreement and that Principal Procurement Agencies’ participation in the program described herein comply with all applicable laws, including but not limited to the requirements of 42 C.F.R. § 1001.952(j), as may be amended from time to time. The Participating Public Agencies further acknowledge and agree that they are solely responsible for their compliance with all applicable “safe harbor” regulations, including but not limited to any and all obligations to fully and accurately report discounts and incentives.

3. The Participating Public Agency represents and warrants that the Participating Public Agency is not a hospital or other healthcare provider and is not purchasing Products on behalf of a hospital or healthcare provider.

4. The cooperative use of Master Agreements shall be in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Master Agreements, except as modification of those terms and conditions is otherwise required by applicable federal, state or local law, policies or procedures.

5. The Principal Procurement Agencies will make available, upon reasonable request, Master Agreement information which may assist in improving the procurement of Products by the Participating Public Agencies.

6. The Participating Public Agency agrees the OMNIA Partners Parties may provide access to group purchasing organization ("**GPO**") agreements directly or indirectly by enrolling the Participating Public Agency in another GPO's purchasing program provided the purchase of Products through the OMNIA Partners Parties or any other GPO shall be at the Participating Public Agency's sole discretion.

7. The Participating Public Agencies (each a "**Procuring Party**") that procure Products through any Master Agreement or GPO Product supply agreement (each a "**GPO Contract**") will make timely payments to the distributor, manufacturer or other vendor (collectively, "**Supplier**") for Products received in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Master Agreement or GPO Contract, as applicable. Payment for Products and inspections and acceptance of Products ordered by the Procuring Party shall be the exclusive obligation of such Procuring Party. Disputes between Procuring Party and any Supplier shall be resolved in accordance with the law and venue rules of the State of purchase unless otherwise agreed to by the Procuring Party and Supplier.

8. The Procuring Party shall not use this Agreement as a method for obtaining additional concessions or reduced prices for purchase of similar products or services outside of the Master Agreement. Master Agreements may be structured with not-to-exceed pricing, in which cases the Supplier may offer the Procuring Party and the Procuring Party may accept lower pricing or additional concessions for purchase of Products through a Master Agreement.

9. The Procuring Party shall be responsible for the ordering of Products under this Agreement. A non-procuring party shall not be liable in any fashion for any violation by a Procuring Party, and, to the extent permitted by applicable law, the Procuring Party shall hold non-procuring party harmless from any liability that may arise from the acts or omissions of the Procuring Party.

10. WITHOUT LIMITING THE GENERALITY OF THE FOREGOING, THE OMNIA PARTNERS PARTIES EXPRESSLY DISCLAIM ALL EXPRESS OR IMPLIED REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES REGARDING ANY PRODUCT, MASTER AGREEMENT AND GPO CONTRACT. THE OMNIA PARTNERS PARTIES SHALL NOT BE LIABLE IN ANY WAY FOR ANY SPECIAL, INCIDENTAL, INDIRECT, CONSEQUENTIAL, EXEMPLARY, PUNITIVE, OR RELIANCE DAMAGES, EVEN IF THE OMNIA PARTNERS PARTIES ARE ADVISED OF THE POSSIBILITY OF SUCH DAMAGES. FURTHER, THE PROCURING PARTY ACKNOWLEDGES AND AGREES THAT THE OMNIA PARTNERS PARTIES SHALL HAVE NO LIABILITY FOR ANY ACT OR OMISSION BY A SUPPLIER OR OTHER PARTY UNDER A MASTER AGREEMENT OR GPO CONTRACT.

11. This Agreement shall remain in effect until termination by either party giving thirty (30) days' written notice to the other party. The provisions of Paragraphs 6 - 10 hereof shall survive any such termination.

12. This Agreement shall take effect upon (i) execution of the Principal Procurement Agency Certificate, or (ii) registration on the OMNIA Partners website or the execution of this Agreement by a Participating Public Agency, as applicable.

- (a)(1) The Federal financial assistance that a non-Federal entity receives directly from a Federal awarding agency or indirectly from a pass-through entity, as described in § 200.101 Applicability; or
- (2) The cost-reimbursement contract under the Federal Acquisition Regulations that a non-Federal entity receives directly from a Federal awarding agency or indirectly from a pass-through entity, as described in § 200.101 Applicability.
- (b) The instrument setting forth the terms and conditions. The instrument is the grant agreement, cooperative agreement, other agreement for assistance covered in paragraph (b) of § 200.40 Federal financial assistance, or the cost-reimbursement contract awarded under the Federal Acquisition Regulations.
- (c) Federal award does not include other contracts that a Federal agency uses to buy goods or services from a contractor or a contract to operate Federal government owned, contractor operated facilities (GOCOs).
- (d) See also definitions of Federal financial assistance, grant agreement, and cooperative agreement.

Non-Federal entity means a state, local government, Indian tribe, institution of higher education (IHE), or nonprofit organization that carries out a Federal award as a recipient or subrecipient.

Nonprofit organization means any corporation, trust, association, cooperative, or other organization, not including IHEs, that:

- (a) Is operated primarily for scientific, educational, service, charitable, or similar purposes in the public interest;
- (b) Is not organized primarily for profit; and
- (c) Uses net proceeds to maintain, improve, or expand the operations of the organization.

Obligations means, when used in connection with a non-Federal entity's utilization of funds under a Federal award, orders placed for property and services, contracts and subawards made, and similar transactions during a given period that require payment by the non-Federal entity during the same or a future period.

Pass-through entity means a non-Federal entity that provides a subaward to a subrecipient to carry out part of a Federal program.

Recipient means a non-Federal entity that receives a Federal award directly from a Federal awarding agency to carry out an activity under a Federal program. The term recipient does not include subrecipients.

Termination means the ending of a Federal award, in whole or in part at any time prior to the planned end of period of performance.

For any subcontracting opportunities, Contractor must take the following Affirmative steps:

1. Placing qualified small and minority businesses and women's business enterprises on solicitation lists;
2. Assuring that small and minority businesses, and women's business enterprises are solicited whenever they are potential sources;
3. Dividing total requirements, when economically feasible, into smaller tasks or quantities to permit maximum participation by small and minority businesses, and women's business enterprises;
4. Establishing delivery schedules, where the requirement permits, which encourage participation by small and minority businesses, and women's business enterprises; and
5. Using the services and assistance, as appropriate, of such organizations as the Small Business Administration and the Minority Business Development Agency of the Department of Commerce.

Prevailing Wage Requirements

When applicable, the awarded Contractor (s) and any and all subcontractor(s) agree to comply with all laws regarding prevailing wage rates including the Davis-Bacon Act, applicable to this solicitation and/or Participating Public Agencies. The Participating Public Agency shall notify the Contractor of the applicable pricing/prevailing wage rates and must apply any local wage rates requested. The Contractor and any subcontractor(s) shall comply with the prevailing wage rates set by the Participating Public Agency.

Federal Requirements

If products and services are issued in response to an emergency or disaster recovery the items below, located in this FEMA Special Conditions section of the Federal Funds Certifications, are activated and required when federal funding may be utilized.

2 C.F.R. § 200.326 and 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II, Required Contract Clauses

1. Termination for Convenience:

The right to terminate this Contract for the convenience of the Participating Public Agency is retained by the Participating Public Agency. In the event of a termination for convenience by the Participating Public Agency, the Participating Public Agency shall, at least ten (10) calendar days in advance, deliver written notice of the termination for convenience to Contractor. Upon Contractor's receipt of such written notice, Contractor immediately shall cease the performance of the Work and shall take reasonable and appropriate action to secure and protect the Work then in place. Contractor shall then be paid by the Participating Public Agency, in accordance with the terms and provisions of the Contract Documents, an amount not to exceed the actual labor costs incurred, the actual cost of all materials installed and the actual cost of all materials stored at the project site or away from the project site, as approved in writing by the Participating Public Agency but not yet paid for and which cannot be returned, and actual, reasonable and documented demobilization costs, if any,

paid by Contractor and approved by the Participating Public Agency in connection with the Scope of Work in place which is completed as of the date of termination by the Participating Public Agency and that is in conformance with the Contract Documents, less all amounts previously paid for the Work. No amount ever shall be owed or paid to Contractor for lost or anticipated profits on any part of the Scope of Work not performed or for consequential damages of any kind.

2. Equal Employment Opportunity:

The Participating Public Agency highly encourages Contractors to implement Affirmative Action practices in their employment programs. This means Contractor should not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, pregnancy, sexual orientation, political belief or affiliation, age, disability or genetic information.

During the performance of this contract, the contractor agrees as follows:

(1) The contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin. The contractor will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment, without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following: Employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided by the contracting officer setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.

(2) The contractor will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the contractor, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin.

(3) The contractor will not discharge or in any other manner discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because such employee or applicant has inquired about, discussed, or disclosed the compensation of the employee or applicant or another employee or applicant. This provision shall not apply to instances in which an employee who has access to the compensation information of other employees or applicants as a part of such employee's essential job functions discloses the compensation of such other employees or applicants to individuals who do not otherwise have access to such information, unless such disclosure is in response to a formal complaint or charge, in furtherance of an investigation, proceeding, hearing, or action, including an investigation conducted by the employer, or is consistent with the contractor's legal duty to furnish information.

(4) The contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which it has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding, a notice to be provided by the agency contracting officer, advising the labor union or workers' representative of the contractor's commitments under section 202 of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.

(5) The contractor will comply with all provisions of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.

(6) The contractor will furnish all information and reports required by Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and by the rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to his books, records, and accounts by the contracting agency and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations, and orders.

(7) In the event of the contractor's non-compliance with the nondiscrimination clauses of this contract or with any of such rules, regulations, or orders, this contract may be canceled, terminated or suspended in whole or in part and the contractor may be declared ineligible for further Government contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and such other sanctions may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, or by rule, regulation, or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.

(8) The contractor will include the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (8) in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to section 204 of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor. The contractor will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as may be directed by the Secretary of Labor as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance: *Provided*, however, that in the event the contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such

direction, the contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.

3. "During the performance of this contract, the contractor agrees as follows:

- (1) The contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. The contractor will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following: Employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.
- (2) The contractor will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the contractor, state that all qualified applicants will receive considerations for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, or national origin.
- (3) The contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which he has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding, a notice to be provided advising the said labor union or workers' representatives of the contractor's commitments under this section, and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.
- (4) The contractor will comply with all provisions of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.
- (5) The contractor will furnish all information and reports required by Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and by rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to his books, records, and accounts by the administering agency and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations, and orders.
- (6) In the event of the contractor's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination clauses of this contract or with any of the said rules, regulations, or orders, this contract may be canceled, terminated, or suspended in whole or in part and the contractor may be declared ineligible for further Government contracts or federally assisted construction contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and such other sanctions as may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, or by rule, regulation, or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.
- (7) The contractor will include the portion of the sentence immediately preceding paragraph (1) and the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (7) in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to section 204 of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor. The contractor will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as the administering agency may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions, including sanctions for noncompliance: Provided, however, That in the event a contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction by the administering agency the contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States."

4. Davis Bacon Act and Copeland Anti-Kickback Act.

- a. Applicability of Davis-Bacon Act. The Davis-Bacon Act only applies to the emergency Management Preparedness Grant Program, Homeland Security Grant Program, Nonprofit Security Grant Program,

Tribal Homeland Security Grant Program, Port Security Grant Program, and Transit Security Grant Program. **It does not apply to other FEMA grant and cooperative agreement programs, including the Public Assistance Program.**

- b. All prime construction contracts in excess of \$2,000 awarded by non-Federal entities must include a provision for compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. §§ 3141-3144 and 3146-3148) as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations at 29 C.F.R. Part 5 (Labor Standards Provisions Applicable to Contracts Covering Federally Financed and Assisted Construction)). See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II, ¶ D.
- c. In accordance with the statute, contractors must be required to pay wages to laborers and mechanics at a rate not less than the prevailing wages specified in a wage determination made by the Secretary of Labor. In addition, contractors must be required to pay wages not less than once a week.
- d. The non-Federal entity must place a copy of the current prevailing wage determination issued by the Department of Labor in each solicitation. The decision to award a contract or subcontract must be conditioned upon the acceptance of the wage determination. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the Federal awarding agency.
- e. In contracts subject to the Davis-Bacon Act, the contracts must also include a provision for compliance with the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act (40 U.S.C. § 3145), as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations at 29 C.F.R. Part 3 (Contractors and Subcontractors on Public Building or Public Work Financed in Whole or in Part by Loans or Grants from the United States). The Copeland Anti- Kickback Act provides that each contractor or subrecipient must be prohibited from inducing, by any means, any person employed in the construction, completion, or repair of public work, to give up any part of the compensation to which he or she is otherwise entitled. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to FEMA.
- f. The regulation at 29 C.F.R. § 5.5(a) does provide the required contract clause that applies to compliance with both the Davis-Bacon and Copeland Acts. However, as discussed in the previous subsection, the Davis-Bacon Act does not apply to Public Assistance recipients and subrecipients. **In situations where the Davis-Bacon Act does not apply, neither does the Copeland "Anti-Kickback Act."** However, for purposes of grant programs where both clauses do apply, FEMA requires the following contract clause:

"Compliance with the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act.

- (1) Contractor. The contractor shall comply with 18 U.S.C. § 874, 40U.S.C. § 3145, and the requirements of 29 C.F.R. pt. 3 as may be applicable, which are incorporated by reference into this contract.
- (2) Subcontracts. The contractor or subcontractor shall insert in any subcontracts the clause above and such other clauses as the FEMA may by appropriate instructions require, and also a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime contractor shall be responsible for the compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with all of these contract clauses
- (3) Breach. A breach of the contract clauses above may be grounds for termination of the contract, and for debarment as a contractor and subcontractor as provided in 29 C.F.R. § 5.12."

5. Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act.

- a. Applicability: This requirement applies to all FEMA grant and cooperative agreement programs.
- b. Where applicable (see 40 U.S.C. § 3701), all contracts awarded by the non-Federal entity in excess of \$100,000 that involve the employment of mechanics or laborers must include a provision for compliance with 40 U.S.C. §§ 3702 and 3704, as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations at 29 C.F.R. Part 5. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II, ¶ E.

- c. Under 40 U.S.C. § 3702, each contractor must be required to compute the wages of every mechanic and laborer on the basis of a standard work week of 40 hours. Work in excess of the standard work week is permissible provided that the worker is compensated at a rate of not less than one and a half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of 40 hours in the work week.
- d. The requirements of 40 U.S.C. § 3704 are applicable to construction work and provide that no laborer or mechanic must be required to work in surroundings or under working conditions which are unsanitary, hazardous or dangerous. These requirements do not apply to the purchases of supplies or materials or articles ordinarily available on the open market, or contracts for transportation or transmission of intelligence.
- e. The regulation at 29 C.F.R. § 5.5(b) provides the required contract clause concerning compliance with the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act:

“Compliance with the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act.

- (1) Overtime requirements. No contractor or subcontractor contracting for any part of the contract work which may require or involve the employment of laborers or mechanics shall require or permit any such laborer or mechanic in any workweek in which he or she is employed on such work to work in excess of forty hours in such workweek unless such laborer or mechanic receives compensation at a rate not less than one and one-half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of forty hours in such workweek.
- (2) Violation; liability for unpaid wages; liquidated damages. In the event of any violation of the clause set forth in paragraph (1) of this section the contractor and any subcontractor responsible therefor shall be liable for the unpaid wages. In addition, such contractor and subcontractor shall be liable to the United States (in the case of work done under contract for the District of Columbia or a territory, to such District or to such territory), for liquidated damages. Such liquidated damages shall be computed with respect to each individual laborer or mechanic, including watchmen and guards, employed in violation of the clause set forth in paragraph (1) of this section, in the sum of \$10 for each calendar day on which such individual was required or permitted to work in excess of the standard workweek of forty hours without payment of the overtime wages required by the clause set forth in paragraph (1) of this section.
- (3) Withholding for unpaid wages and liquidated damages. The (write in the name of the Federal agency or the loan or grant recipient) shall upon its own action or upon written request of an authorized representative of the Department of Labor withhold or cause to be withheld, from any moneys payable on account of work performed by the contractor or subcontractor under any such contract or any other Federal contract with the same prime contractor, or any other federally-assisted contract subject to the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act, which is held by the same prime contractor, such sums as may be determined to be necessary to satisfy any liabilities of such contractor or subcontractor for unpaid wages and liquidated damages as provided in the clause set forth in paragraph (2) of this section.
- (4) Subcontracts. The contractor or subcontractor shall insert in any subcontracts the clauses set forth in paragraph (1) through (4) of this section and also a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime contractor shall be responsible for compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with the clauses set forth in paragraphs (1) through (4) of this section.”

6. Rights to Inventions Made Under a Contract or Agreement.

- a. Stafford Act Disaster Grants. This requirement **does not apply to the Public Assistance**, Hazard Mitigation Grant Program, Fire Management Assistance Grant Program, Crisis Counseling Assistance and Training Grant Program, Disaster Case Management Grant Program, and Federal Assistance to Individuals and Households – Other Needs Assistance Grant Program, as

FEMA awards under these programs do not meet the definition of "funding agreement."

- b. If the FEMA award meets the definition of "funding agreement" under 37 C.F.R. § 401.2(a) and the non-Federal entity wishes to enter into a contract with a small business firm or nonprofit organization regarding the substitution of parties, assignment or performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under that "funding agreement," the non-Federal entity must comply with the requirements of 37 C.F.R. Part 401 (Rights to Inventions Made by Nonprofit Organizations and Small Business Firms Under Government Grants, Contracts and Cooperative Agreements), and any implementing regulations issued by FEMA. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II, ¶ F.
 - c. The regulation at 37 C.F.R. § 401.2(a) currently defines "funding agreement" as any contract, grant, or cooperative agreement entered into between any Federal agency, other than the Tennessee Valley Authority, and any contractor for the performance of experimental, developmental, or research work funded in whole or in part by the Federal government. This term also includes any assignment, substitution of parties, or subcontract of any type entered into for the performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under a funding agreement as defined in the first sentence of this paragraph.
7. Clean Air Act and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act. Contracts of amounts in excess of \$150,000 must contain a provision that requires the contractor to agree to comply with all applicable standards, orders, or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. §§ 7401-7671q) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33 U.S.C. §§ 1251-1387). Violations must be reported to FEMA and the Regional Office of the Environmental Protection Agency. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II, ¶ G.
- a. The following provides a sample contract clause concerning compliance for contracts of amounts in excess of \$150,000:

"Clean Air Act
 - (1) The contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 7401 et seq.
 - (2) The contractor agrees to report each violation to the (name of the state agency or local or Indian tribal government) and understands and agrees that the (name of the state agency or local or Indian tribal government) will, in turn, report each violation as required to assure notification to the (name of recipient), Federal Emergency Management Agency, and the appropriate Environmental Protection Agency Regional Office.
 - (3) The contractor agrees to include these requirements in each subcontract exceeding \$150,000 financed in whole or in part with Federal assistance provided by FEMA.
Federal Water Pollution Control Act
 - (1) The contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended, 33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.
 - (2) The contractor agrees to report each violation to the (name of the state agency or local or Indian tribal government) and understands and agrees that the (name of the state agency or local or Indian tribal government) will, in turn, report each violation as required to assure notification to the (name of recipient), Federal Emergency Management Agency, and the appropriate Environmental Protection Agency Regional Office.
 - (3) The contractor agrees to include these requirements in each subcontract exceeding \$150,000 financed in whole or in part with Federal assistance provided by FEMA."
8. Debarment and Suspension.
- a. Applicability: This requirement applies to all FEMA grant and cooperative agreement programs.

- b. Non-federal entities and contractors are subject to the debarment and suspension regulations implementing Executive Order 12549, *Debarment and Suspension* (1986) and Executive Order 12689, *Debarment and Suspension* (1989) at 2 C.F.R. Part 180 and the Department of Homeland Security's regulations at 2 C.F.R. Part 3000 (Non procurement Debarment and Suspension).
- c. These regulations restrict awards, subawards, and contracts with certain parties that are debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded from or ineligible for participation in Federal assistance programs and activities. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II, ¶ H; and *Procurement Guidance for Recipients and Subrecipients Under 2 C.F.R. Part 200 (Uniform Rules): Supplement to the Public Assistance Procurement Disaster Assistance Team (PDAT) Field Manual* Chapter IV, ¶ 6.d, and Appendix C, ¶ 2 [hereinafter *PDAT Supplement*]. A contract award must not be made to parties listed in the SAM Exclusions. SAM Exclusions is the list maintained by the General Services Administration that contains the names of parties debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded by agencies, as well as parties declared ineligible under statutory or regulatory authority other than Executive Order 12549. SAM exclusions can be accessed at www.sam.gov. See 2 C.F.R. § 180.530; *PDAT Supplement*, Chapter IV, ¶ 6.d and Appendix C, ¶ 2.
- d. In general, an "excluded" party cannot receive a Federal grant award or a contract within the meaning of a "covered transaction," to include subawards and subcontracts. This includes parties that receive Federal funding indirectly, such as contractors to recipients and subrecipients. The key to the exclusion is whether there is a "covered transaction," which is any non-procurement transaction (unless excepted) at either a "primary" or "secondary" tier. Although "covered transactions" do not include contracts awarded by the Federal Government for purposes of the non-procurement common rule and DHS's implementing regulations, it does include some contracts awarded by recipients and subrecipient.
- e. Specifically, a covered transaction includes the following contracts for goods or services:
 - (1) The contract is awarded by a recipient or subrecipient in the amount of at least \$25,000.
 - (2) The contract requires the approval of FEMA, regardless of amount.
 - (3) The contract is for federally required audit services.
 - (4) A subcontract is also a covered transaction if it is awarded by the contractor of a recipient or subrecipient and requires either the approval of FEMA or is in excess of \$25,000.
- d. The following provides a debarment and suspension clause. It incorporates an optional method of verifying that contractors are not excluded or disqualified:

"Suspension and Debarment

- (1) This contract is a covered transaction for purposes of 2 C.F.R. pt. 180 and 2 C.F.R. pt. 3000. As such the contractor is required to verify that none of the contractor, its principals (defined at 2 C.F.R. § 180.995), or its affiliates (defined at 2 C.F.R. § 180.905) are excluded (defined at 2 C.F.R. § 180.940) or disqualified (defined at 2 C.F.R. § 180.935).
- (2) The contractor must comply with 2 C.F.R. pt. 180, subpart C and 2 C.F.R. pt. 3000, subpart C and must include a requirement to comply with these regulations in any lower tier covered transaction it enters into.
- (3) This certification is a material representation of fact relied upon by (insert name of subrecipient). If it is later determined that the contractor did not comply with 2 C.F.R. pt. 180, subpart C and 2 C.F.R. pt. 3000, subpart C, in addition to remedies available to (name of state agency serving as recipient and name of subrecipient), the Federal Government may pursue available remedies, including but not limited to suspension and/or debarment.
- (4) The bidder or proposer agrees to comply with the requirements of 2 C.F.R. pt. 180, subpart C and

2 C.F.R. pt. 3000, subpart C while this offer is valid and throughout the period of any contract that may arise from this offer. The bidder or proposer further agrees to include a provision requiring such compliance in its lower tier covered transactions.”

9. Byrd Anti-Lobbying Amendment.

- a. Applicability: This requirement applies to all FEMA grant and cooperative agreement programs.
- b. Contractors that apply or bid for an award of \$100,000 or more must file the required certification. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II, ¶ I; 44 C.F.R. Part 18; *PDAT Supplement*, Chapter IV, 6.c; Appendix C, ¶ 4.
- c. Each tier certifies to the tier above that it will not and has not used Federal appropriated funds to pay any person or organization for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a member of Congress, officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with obtaining any Federal contract, grant or any other award covered by 31 U.S.C. § 1352. Each tier must also disclose any lobbying with non-Federal funds that takes place in connection with obtaining any Federal award. Such disclosures are forwarded from tier to tier up to the non-Federal award. See *PDAT Supplement*, Chapter IV, ¶ 6.c and Appendix C, ¶ 4.
- d. The following provides a Byrd Anti-Lobbying contract clause:

“Byrd Anti-Lobbying Amendment, 31 U.S.C. § 1352 (as amended)

Contractors who apply or bid for an award of \$100,000 or more shall file the required certification. Each tier certifies to the tier above that it will not and has not used Federal appropriated funds to pay any person or organization for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a member of Congress, officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with obtaining any Federal contract, grant, or any other award covered by 31 U.S.C. § 1352. Each tier shall also disclose any lobbying with non-Federal funds that takes place in connection with obtaining any Federal award. Such disclosures are forwarded from tier to tier up to the recipient.”

APPENDIX A, 44 C.F.R. PART 18 – CERTIFICATION REGARDING LOBBYING

Certification for Contracts, Grants, Loans, and Cooperative Agreements (To be submitted with each bid or offer exceeding \$100,000)

The undersigned [Contractor] certifies, to the best of his or her knowledge, that:

1. Public Agency Instructions

This page provides guidance to public agencies entering into contracts with business entities that are required to file Political Contribution Disclosure forms with the agency. **It is not intended to be provided to contractors.** What follows are instructions on the use of form local units can provide to contractors that are required to disclose political contributions pursuant to N.J.S.A. 19:44A-20.26 (P.L. 2005, c. 271, s.2). Additional information on the process is available in Local Finance Notice 2006-1 (http://www.nj.gov/dca/divisions/dlgs/resources/lfns_2006.html). Please refer back to these instructions for the appropriate links, as the Local Finance Notices include links that are no longer operational.

1. The disclosure is required for all contracts in excess of \$17,500 that are **not awarded** pursuant to a “fair and open” process (N.J.S.A. 19:44A-20.7).
2. Due to the potential length of some contractor submissions, the public agency should consider allowing data to be submitted in electronic form (i.e., spreadsheet, pdf file, etc.). Submissions must be kept with the contract documents or in an appropriate computer file and be available for public access. **The form is worded to accept this alternate submission.** The text should be amended if electronic submission will not be allowed.
3. The submission must be **received from the contractor and** on file at least 10 days prior to award of the contract. Resolutions of award should reflect that the disclosure has been received and is on file.
4. The contractor must disclose contributions made to candidate and party committees covering a wide range of public agencies, including all public agencies that have elected officials in the county of the public agency, state legislative positions, and various state entities. The Division of Local Government Services recommends that contractors be provided a list of the affected agencies. This will assist contractors in determining the campaign and political committees of the officials and candidates affected by the disclosure.
 - a. The Division has prepared model disclosure forms for each county. They can be downloaded from the “County PCD Forms” link on the Pay-to-Play web site at <http://www.nj.gov/dca/divisions/dlgs/programs/lpcl.html#12>. They will be updated from time-to-time as necessary.
 - b. A public agency using these forms **should edit them to properly reflect the correct legislative district(s)**. As the forms are county-based, **they list all legislative districts** in each county. **Districts that do not represent the public agency should be removed from the lists.**
 - c. Some contractors may find it easier to provide a single list that covers all contributions, regardless of the county. These submissions are appropriate and should be accepted.
 - d. The form may be used “as-is”, subject to edits as described herein.
 - e. The “Contractor Instructions” sheet is intended to be provided with the form. It is recommended that the Instructions and the form be printed on the same piece of paper. The form notes that the Instructions are printed on the back of the form; where that is not the case, the text should be edited accordingly.
 - f. The form is a Word document and can be edited to meet local needs, and posted for download on web sites, used as an e-mail attachment, or provided as a printed document.
5. It is recommended that the contractor also complete a “Stockholder Disclosure Certification.” This will assist the local unit in its obligation to ensure that contractor did not make any prohibited contributions to the committees listed on the Business Entity Disclosure Certification in the 12 months prior to the contract (See Local Finance Notice 2006-7 for additional information on this obligation at http://www.nj.gov/dca/divisions/dlgs/resources/lfns_2006.html). A sample Certification form is part of this package and the instruction to complete it is included in the Contractor Instructions. NOTE: This section is not applicable to Boards of Education.

C. 271 POLITICAL CONTRIBUTION DISCLOSURE FORM

Contractor Instructions

Business entities (contractors) receiving contracts from a public agency that are NOT awarded pursuant to a “fair and open” process (defined at N.J.S.A. 19:44A-20.7) are subject to the provisions of P.L. 2005, c. 271, s.2 (N.J.S.A. 19:44A-20.26). This law provides that 10 days prior to the award of such a contract, the contractor shall disclose contributions to:

- any State, county, or municipal committee of a political party
- any legislative leadership committee*
- any continuing political committee (a.k.a., political action committee)
- any candidate committee of a candidate for, or holder of, an elective office:
 - of the public entity awarding the contract
 - of that county in which that public entity is located
 - of another public entity within that county
 - or of a legislative district in which that public entity is located or, when the public entity is a county, of any legislative district which includes all or part of the county

The disclosure must list reportable contributions to any of the committees that exceed \$300 per election cycle that were made during the 12 months prior to award of the contract. See N.J.S.A. 19:44A-8 and 19:44A-16 for more details on reportable contributions.

N.J.S.A. 19:44A-20.26 itemizes the parties from whom contributions must be disclosed when a business entity is not a natural person. This includes the following:

- individuals with an “interest” ownership or control of more than 10% of the profits or assets of a business entity or 10% of the stock in the case of a business entity that is a corporation for profit
- all principals, partners, officers, or directors of the business entity or their spouses
- any subsidiaries directly or indirectly controlled by the business entity
- IRS Code Section 527 New Jersey based organizations, directly or indirectly controlled by the business entity and filing as continuing political committees, (PACs).

When the business entity is a natural person, “a contribution by that person’s spouse or child, residing therewith, shall be deemed to be a contribution by the business entity.” [N.J.S.A. 19:44A-20.26(b)] The contributor must be listed on the disclosure.

Any business entity that fails to comply with the disclosure provisions shall be subject to a fine imposed by ELEC in an amount to be determined by the Commission which may be based upon the amount that the business entity failed to report.

The enclosed list of agencies is provided to assist the contractor in identifying those public agencies whose elected official and/or candidate campaign committees are affected by the disclosure requirement. It is the contractor’s responsibility to identify the specific committees to which contributions may have been made and need to be disclosed. The disclosed information may exceed the minimum requirement.

The enclosed form, a content-consistent facsimile, or an electronic data file containing the required details (along with a signed cover sheet) may be used as the contractor’s submission and is disclosable to the public under the Open Public Records Act.

The contractor must also complete the attached Stockholder Disclosure Certification. This will assist the agency in meeting its obligations under the law. **NOTE: This section does not apply to Board of Education contracts.**

* N.J.S.A. 19:44A-3(s): “The term “legislative leadership committee” means a committee established, authorized to be established, or designated by the President of the Senate, the Minority Leader of the Senate, the Speaker of the General Assembly or the Minority Leader of the General Assembly pursuant to section 16 of P.L.1993, c.65 (C.19:44A-10.1) for the purpose of receiving contributions and making expenditures.”
